### Plants of the Week

#### Sweet Basil

Basil adds flavor to a variety of dishes, and can be cultivated in your own garden! Plant sweet basil after the last frost in full sun. It is a heat loving annual herb. Pinch off the center shoot to promote bunching and prevent early flowering. The best time to harvest is just as the flowers bud. Cut off branches and leaves for use at this time and also the flower stalks to keep your plant productive.

# Beware ransomware

**CEDAR CITY** – Lurking in the shadows of the Dark Web, the online underground, is code that enables any technologically savvy user to create a virtual

Ransomware is often contracted via email attachments, but can also be spread through popups, advertising links and by simply visiting certain websites – even legitimate sites that have been secretly infected.

army of ransomware that will infonap your system. And for a price, you might get it back.

Colby Gower, owner of A+ Psychlone Computers in Cedar City, says ransomware is the most terrifying malware he has encountered in his 30-year career. It locks users out of their infected system unless the person or company pays a ransom fee.

“That’s some nasty, nasty stuff,” Gower said. “Ransomware is semi-organized crime. It started as very effective organized crime, but not too long ago somebody released to the Dark Web the actual code to create ransomware, so now anybody can access this chunk of software that allows them to manipulate ransomware to their benefit. And, the person that created

Bitcoin, Gower said, which makes locating its perpetrators virtually impossible. With no central bank to control Bitcoin, it’s a form of digital currency that is nearly untraceable. It

has seen eight instances of ransomware in Cedar City. All but one, he said, paid the ransom. In one case, he was able to circumvent the ransomware to restore the computer. Gower said he believes that case was an early, unsophisticated version of ransomware.

“The scariest one I’ve seen here in Cedar,” Gower said, “was a word document, which really was just a word

what they did. And, as soon as they did, the ransomware went online, downloaded the payload, and started encrypting.”

This company, like most, according to Gower, used a Network Attached storage (NAS). An NAS is a unit containing multiple hard drives. All of a company’s computers are typically

# Good Samaritan honored during city council meeting

**CEDAR CITY** – Carla Ferguson, the Wal-Mart employee who was instrumental in helping identify the three individuals who vandalized Park Discovery a few weeks ago, was honored during the May 4 Cedar City Council meeting.

Police Chief Bob Allinson publicly thanked Ferguson, who remembered selling the cans of spray paint to the individuals. Thanks to her courage, memory and additional security camera footage, authorities were able to successfully locate and apprehend the vandals.

“We did not have any initial leads in that investigation and she took it upon herself to get involved,” Allinson said. “As a police department we wanted to take this opportunity to have Carla come here so you could express your appreciation and the citizens could know what a great job she did for us.”

Allinson also presented Ferguson with a special police challenge coin. The traditional coin, which many organizations carry, represents safety, service, and unity among the police force and the citizens they serve and protect.

Discussion also continued about amending the current animal ordinance to allow people to own more than two dogs. Currently, there are two proposed changes on the table. The first proposal, a sportsman’s permit, would allow up to three dogs per residence and would require each to be licensed with the city and registered with either the United Kennel Club (UKC) or the American Kennel Club (AKC) and have appropriate facilities to maintain the dogs.

The second proposal for increasing the number of dogs is a “hardship permit.” Along with licensing, registration and appropriate facilities, there would also be at least a \$100 fee, along with other to-be-discussed stipulations, as well as causes for permits to be revoked for non-compliance.

While initially it seemed the council was leaning toward raising the total number to three dogs, several concerned community members had a bone to pick with other issues.

There was a controversy over whether or not kenneling made dogs more aggressive, and therefore more liable to bark and also become dangerous and difficult to catch should they escape.

There were concerns about the size of the yard versus the number of animals living there. Mayor Maile Wilson said she received a letter from the AKC objecting to an ordinance that requires dogs to be registered in order to acquire more dogs.

In the end, the complicated issues about allowing more paws in Cedar City gave the council pause as to whether to leave the ordinance how it is and focus more on enforcement.

Council member Fred Rowley said he had heard from enough community members about the negative challenges of amending the ordinance, alone with the many complexities and difficulties brought up, that he was willing to leave ordinance as is.

Council member Terri Hartley agreed that the discussion has become too complex.

“We’ve just run into too many issues with limiting the ordinance to AKC dogs and everyone wanting to just make it a three-dog limit,” she said, but added that, “Overwhelmingly people are saying, “No, please don’t do that” and we’re here to represent the citizens.”

The council plans to vote on the issue at the May 11 meeting.

### Placing emphasis on the wrong things makes us look silly

The state's tourism officials open up the public's wallet to promote Utah's spectacular scenery, adventurous recreation, and reasonable accommodations for visitors wanting a vibrant nightlife.

Yet during my recent trip to California, the emphasis was on none of the three. Instead I was asked about the BYU rape victims/honor code controversy and the liquor police making a mess of a silly infraction during the hit movie "Deadpool."

Both stories earned front page (and, in the case of CNN.com front-screen) coverage. Both made Utah look like a third



world-thinking banana republic.

In the BYU case, school officials were caught in the vortex of unintended consequence. Some two dozen women spoke of being threatened with Honor Code violations and school expulsion if they reported being raped (In the most horrific tale, a now 34-year old woman reported being

raped and trapped in a man's bedroom for an entire weekend. When she told her ecclesiastical leader, she claims she was told that if she became pregnant as a result of the rape, she would be kicked out of BYU).

The solution should be obvious. BYU can either keep or rescind the Honor Code – that's the school's

(and the LDS Church's) business. But any semi-literate, rational-thinking adult should understand that stepping a toe over the Honor Code line and being victimized by a rapist are not equal transgressions.

Breaking curfew or drinking a beer is more analogous to driving 5 miles over the speed limit, whereas rape is "Breaking Bad" behavior. When confronted with the two, the smart, compassionate religious leader knows when to blink. Our legal system reacts similarly. If a drunk driver plows into a pedestrian, the judge doesn't

# Utah Foster Care honors Foster Mother of the Year

**CEDAR CITY** – The late U.S. President, Herbert Hoover, once said, “Children are our greatest natural resource.” Utah Foster Care wants to encourage adults to make a change in the lives of those children placed into the foster care program.

In honor of National Foster Care Month, community members in Cedar City gathered for two events last week to celebrate foster families and foster parents, and to raise awareness of Iron County’s desperate need for more of them.

The May 2 and 3 events were sponsored by the Department of Child and Family Services in partnership with the Paiute Indian Tribe. The events gave thanks to current foster parents and allowed those pondering that life-changing choice to interact with them and their foster children by asking questions and seeing foster parenting up close.

Members from Utah Foster Care, Amy Bates

and Ben Ashcraft, were also there to answer any questions about the journey of becoming a foster parent.

Bates, a foster parent herself for more than 15 years, knows well the challenges and joys of that journey.

“It’s incredibly hard, but it’s incredibly worth it,” she said. “Having that kind of impact on a child is huge and seeing that child go back to their home and be successful and know you were a part of that is a wonderful thing.”

And for any worried about taking on such a responsibility, she added compassionately, “You don’t have to be perfect, just be willing to be flexible and willing to love.”

Also at this year’s event, Cedar City Mayor Maile Wilson awarded the Foster Mother of the Year Award to the DCFS nominated foster mom Josie Spencer. Along with her supportive husband, Ike, Spencer has taken care of more than 20 foster children during the past six years and has even adopted one into their

family.

Prior to presenting the award, Wilson began by reading an anonymously written and heartfelt poem about foster parenting.

“No I’m not their mother, but my role is just strong,” she read. “I nurture them and keep them safe, though it may not be for long. I know someday the time will come when we will have to part, but I know each child I care for is forever in my heart.”

She also read a nomination letter, which included a quote from a TED Talk by Rita Pierson, that said, “Every child deserves a champion, an adult who will never give up on them, who understands the power of connection, and insists that they become the best that they can possibly be.” The letter continued, “Josie has been that person to all of the children that have come into her heart and home.”

# Utah governor kicks off Military Appreciation Month by signing bills to benefit service members

**UTAH** - In 1999 Congress designated the month of May as National Military Appreciation Month to ensure the nation was given the opportunity to publically demonstrate their appreciation for the many sacrifices and successes made by our service men and women, past and present.

Every year the president of the United States makes a proclamation, reminding Americans of the important role the U.S. Armed Forces have played in the history and development of our country.

According to [www.military.com](http://www.military.com), the month of May was selected because it has the most days set aside for celebrating and commemorating the achievements of the Armed Services. These days include Loyalty Day, which was established in 1921, Victory in Europe (VE) Day, commemorating the end of World War II in Europe on May 8, 1945, Armed Forces Day, created in 1949, Military Spouse Appreciation Day, established in 1984, and of course Memorial

Day.

Memorial Day is the only federal holiday in May and is celebrated on the last Monday of the month. The Memorial Day holiday dates back to the Civil War era. Traditionally the holiday recognizes those who have died in service to the nation.

According to a press release from Utah State Gov. Gary Herbert's office, the governor kicked off Military Appreciation Month by signing three military bills to benefit current service members as well as veterans during a kickoff ceremony on May 4 at the State Capitol Building.

During the ceremony, Herbert signed House Bill 98, sponsored by Rep. Paul Ray and sponsored on the floor by Sen. Peter Knudson. The bill provides for a death gratuity of \$100,000 for the families of a National Guard member who dies while on state active duty. The bill appropriates to the National Guard Death Benefit Account as an ongoing appropriation from the General Fund, according to the release.

House Bill 135, sponsored by Rep. Lynn



Hemingway and sponsored on the floor by Sen. Gene Davis, provides free admission to state parks for certain disabled veterans. It requires the Board of Parks and Recreation to make rules granting that free admission.

Senate Bill 35 was sponsored by Sen. Peter Knudson and sponsored on the floor by Rep. Paul Ray. This bill provides for a special group license plate for veterans of a campaign or combat

theater.

Others attending the signing of the bills were Major General Jefferson Burton, of the Utah National Guard, Brigadier General Kenneth Gammon, of the Utah National Guard, Utah National Guard soldiers and airmen, Gary Harter, the executive director for the Dept. of Veteran and Military Affairs, as well as Ray, Knudson and Hemingway.

connected to their NAS, which allows each access to shared documents. The NAS also allows for malware, like ransomware, to infect all computers and information connected to it.

"There is no foreseeable end to this. It can only get worse," Gower said.

Gower said there are two keys that allow the description of ransomware infected systems; one key allows the ransomware to activate, and the other is what is offered in return for the ransom. However, according to FBI reports, users rarely get the key to unlock their systems from the hackers' encryption, even after paying the ransom.

"There's no way to stop this," Gower said, "There is no way to block it from

coming in, and there are very few ransoms out that have been decrypted before they have gotten really out of hand. Most people actually have to pay to have their data unencrypted."

Gower said the Dark Web ransomware engines train prospective hackers not to charge too much unless targeting large companies like hospitals.

But, there is a way around it, Gower said. Users should create backups that are not plugged in to their system. If users store information on an external drive, Gower recommends they consider the amount of information they are willing to lose. Some of his clients back their systems up daily, but for home computers users, a weekly or monthly backup may be sufficient. With a backup, an infected computer can be easily restored via reformatting.

# Cedar City thanks public safety responders during inaugural appreciation day

**CEDAR CITY** – Community members in the Cedar City area gathered at Main Street Park May 7 to give thanks to members of the Cedar City Police Department, Cedar City Fire Department, Iron County Sheriff's Office, SUU Police, and volunteer fire departments from surrounding communities during the first ever Public Safety Responder Appreciation Day.

Ron Lewis, of New Harmony, recently approached Cedar City Mayor Maile Wilson and the Cedar City Council to propose the establishment of an annual day of appreciation. As an active member of the local American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Iron County Veterans Coalition and a retired Navy captain, Lewis understands the sacrifices and commitment offered by public safety responders.

On a return trip from his second tour of duty in Vietnam in 1968, Lewis was confronted by a group of protestors in San Francisco who yelled at him and spit on his uniform.

"They started yelling at me that I was a warmonger, that I was a baby killer," Lewis said. "One of the security guards came up and got in front of me between the (protesters) and said, 'there's nothing we can do ... they have a right to protest.'"

"Really, you can be against armed conflict or you can be against the police officers, but you don't take it out on the whole community," he added. "With all that's going on in American today, especially all the anti-police demonstrations, public outcry and everything else, (people) completely overlook the 99 percent of the good things police departments do to keep us all safe. The freedoms we enjoy in this country have a lot to do with their service, and that includes the fire fighters."

Wilson kicked off the event by reading a proclamation designating the day as Public Responder Appreciation Day throughout

the city. Fire trucks, police cars and other public safety vehicles lined the street east of the park as officials greeted children and families who wanted to get a closer look.

There was a police K-9 demonstration, during which an officer wearing a protective arm sleeve posed as a criminal and was apprehended by a SWAT dog. Fun-Time Inflatables provided a bounce house for the kids and lunch was served to community members, who had a chance to personally greet many public safety responders and thank them with hand-written messages and drawings on a community message board.

Funding for the event came from various local service organizations and different private donors.

"The community needs to let (public safety responders) know that we do support what they do, that they do have our backing, and their families too," Lewis said. "They just deserve that support."

## Cedar Disability Awareness/Action Team searching for volunteers

**CEDAR CITY** – The Cedar Disability Awareness/Action Team (CDA/AT) is looking for volunteers for this summer's July Jamboree event.

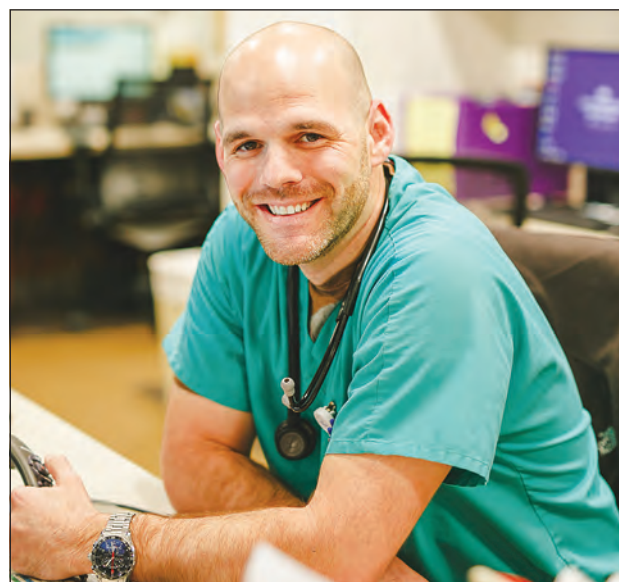

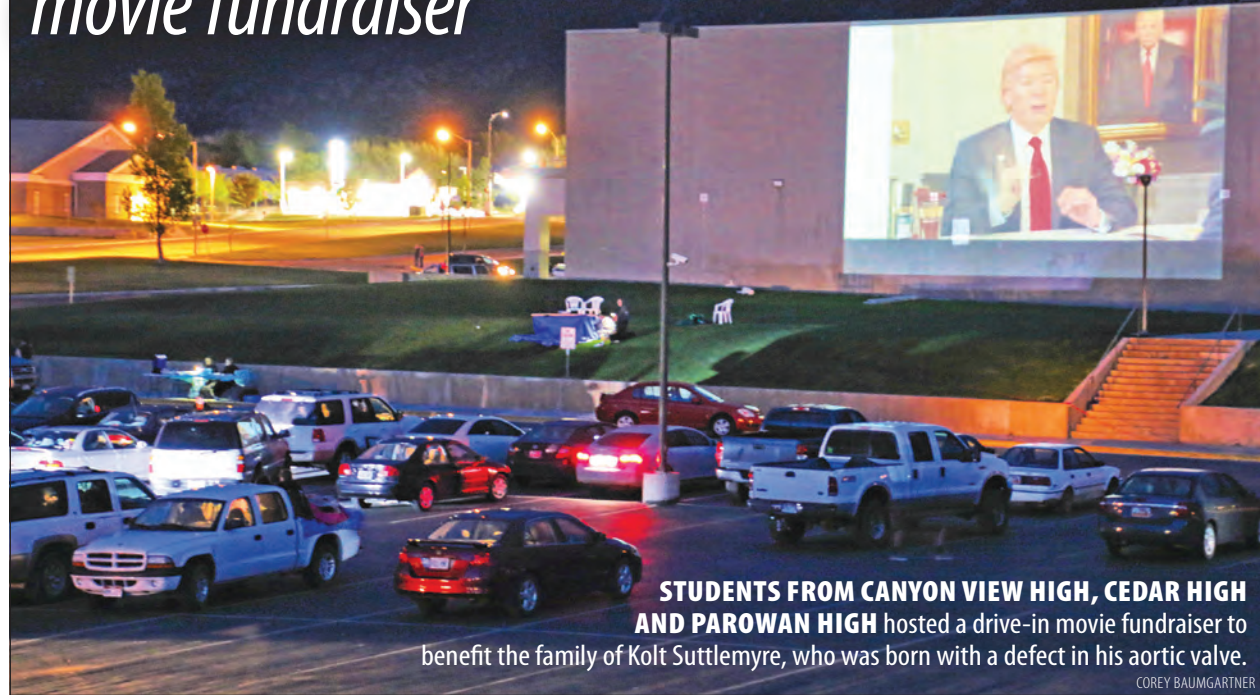

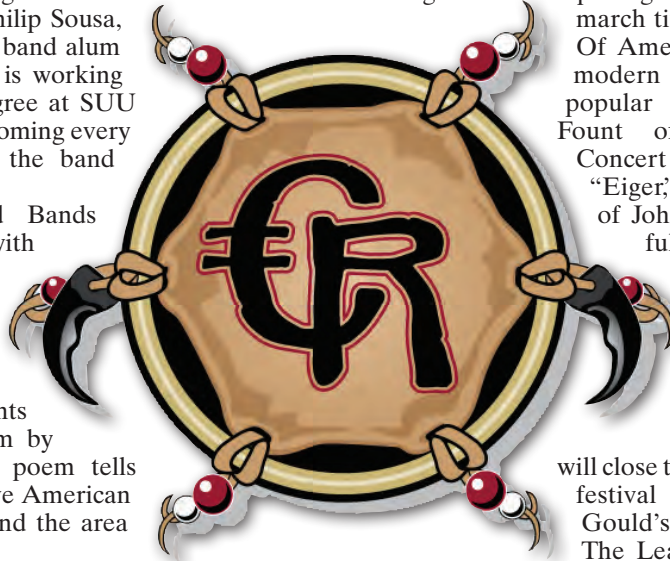
The program will open with the "Star Spangled Banner," performed by the combined Symphonic, Concert, JV Bands, and Percussion Ensemble.

### William Rees Palmer

Hi, I am Logan William Nelson, age 10, and I will talk about my ancestor William Rees Palmer. I chose this ancestor because I was named after him. I will tell you about my ancestor in this order; first I will tell you about his early years, next I will talk about his mid life, finally I will talk about the end of his life.

William Rees Palmer was born in a hole (literally, a hole – their home was an underground hole) in Wales and lived there for a few years. He immigrated from Wales to America, so he could get baptized into the LDS church. He is my great, great, grandpa. He milked and herded the cows as one of his chores when he was younger, which led to him having his first job. He herded cows as his first job and was paid 25 cents an hour.

For fun, he played the five string guitar and the five string banjo, he sang songs and played them with his family. When he was 8 years old he lost his eye to lye and could never see from that eye again. When he was 9 he almost fell in a well that was 90 ft. deep and 25 ft. high with water, my great, great, grandfather was lucky to be alive. My great, great, grandfather could really find trouble. Once he cut his friends hair at recess, but when the bell rang there was still a strip of hair left that had not been cut, all of the kids laughed and the teacher got really mad.

When he was older, he worked 8 years for the Co-op store and never had a vacation. He would get off once a month on Saturday. He would ride his horse to Virgin, Utah to see a young lady named Kate. On his 24th birthday he got married to Kate in the Saint George Temple. His boss gave him four days off to get married, those were the only days he got off in 8 years.

In October 1918, there was an epidemic of influenza. Many people in Cedar City were upset that the local Indians would not wear masks and they wanted to forbid them to come to town. If they didn’t come to town, they would not have food. William suggested that someone should go check on them regularly. He was given the assignment.

The LDS church gave him local tithes to help buy food for the Indians, because the city would not give any money for it. Through all this he became very good friends with the Paiute Indians. He was the first white man initiated into their tribe. He was given an Indian name “Tucuban,” it means friend. He collected a lot of their histories and legends and he wrote and published the book “Why The North Star Stands Still.”

William Rees Palmer was a pretty awesome guy. I am proud to be related to him. I liked learning that my ancestor was friends with the Indians and wrote a book about their legends. It is important to learn about our ancestors, because then we understand our family history better.

Partly because of the increase in population and also that the trend is an increase in riding, which is causing a snowball effect. 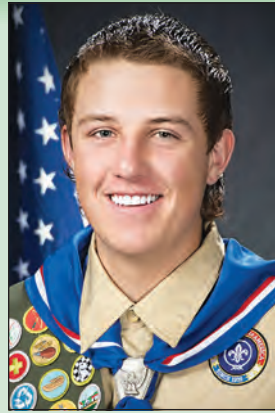

## Community members pray with praise during National Day of Prayer

**CEDAR CITY** - Each year the Cedar Area Interfaith Alliance joins with others from the community and around the nation in a special prayer meeting and breakfast to bow their heads and lift their hearts for the protection and direction of our nation.

with the congregational hymns, "As I Have Loved You" and "God Bless America."

While everyone enjoyed a traditional breakfast, President Allan D. Rau, director of the LDS Institute of Religion at SUU, introduced the morning's keynote speaker, Dane O. Leavitt from The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

"Prayer is the most powerful of languages. For it is to this language we turn when we need God's help. It is the language to which we turn when we are in despair, when we are in over our heads, when we are in pain, when we don't understand and struggle. Prayer is the language to which we also receive answers that

know the language, its power and peace."

Following Leavitt's remarks, specific prayers were offered up by community church leaders for Faith, Family, a Community in Unity and the Nation and Freedom.

And Jerry Van Iwaarden, of Westview Christian Center, evoked a patriotic spirit for the nation and freedom. "Our hearts overflow with thanksgiving because in the middle of dark and cloudy times, you have continued to preserve us and bless us beyond belief. We are still in America, a city set on a hill shining forth for all to see and to take hope from. "He has the disposition of a disciple of Jesus Christ," Rau said of Leavitt. "His blend of intelligence, ability, and compassion certainly qualify him to speak to us today."

# International Migratory Bird Day Festival coming to Cedar

**CEDAR CITY**— Celebrate migratory birds with family and friends at the International Migratory Bird Day Festival on May 14 at the West Canyon Park in Cedar City.

This family event is hosted by the Utah Division of Wildlife

Resources, Zion National Park Service, Southern Utah University, The Grind, Home Depot, Rocky Mountain Power, and the Bureau of Land Management Cedar City Field Office from 7 a.m. to noon.

This annual complimentary event marks the return of migratory birds to Southern Utah with informational booths, activities and exhibits.

This year the interactive bird banding presentation begins at 6:30 a.m. Biologists from the UDWR invite the public to watch as they capture birds with mist nests for banding. 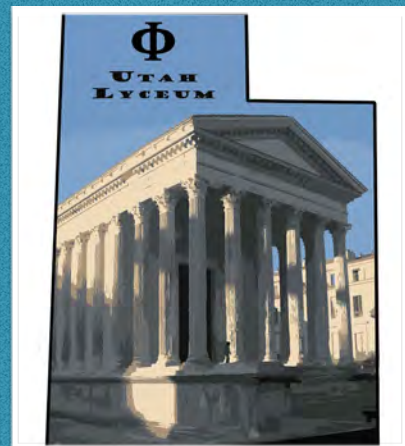

Connie's pride and greatest joy is her family.

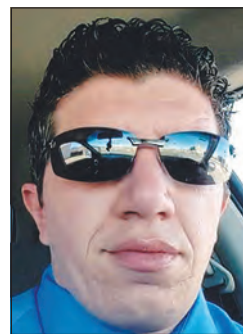

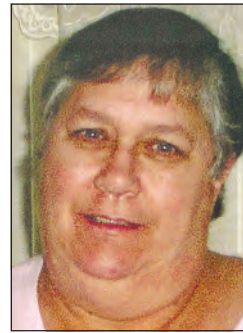

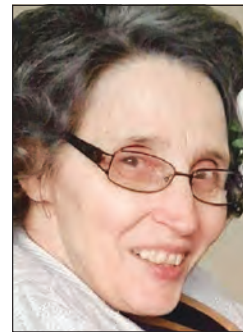

On a warm, windy afternoon May 5, Juan

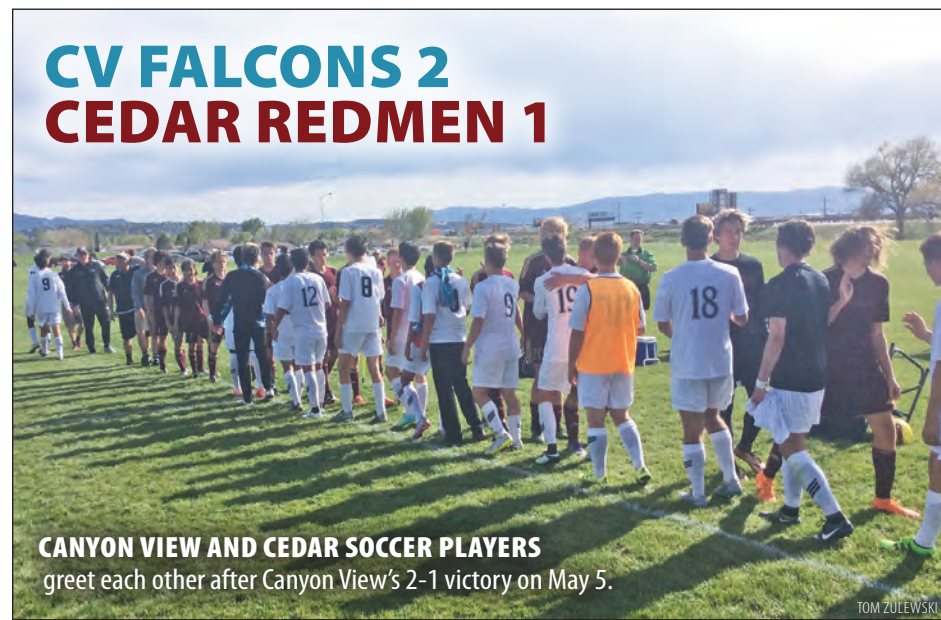
Ruiz changed the feeling and created new memories for the whole school to savor.

The Redmen put themselves in position for the

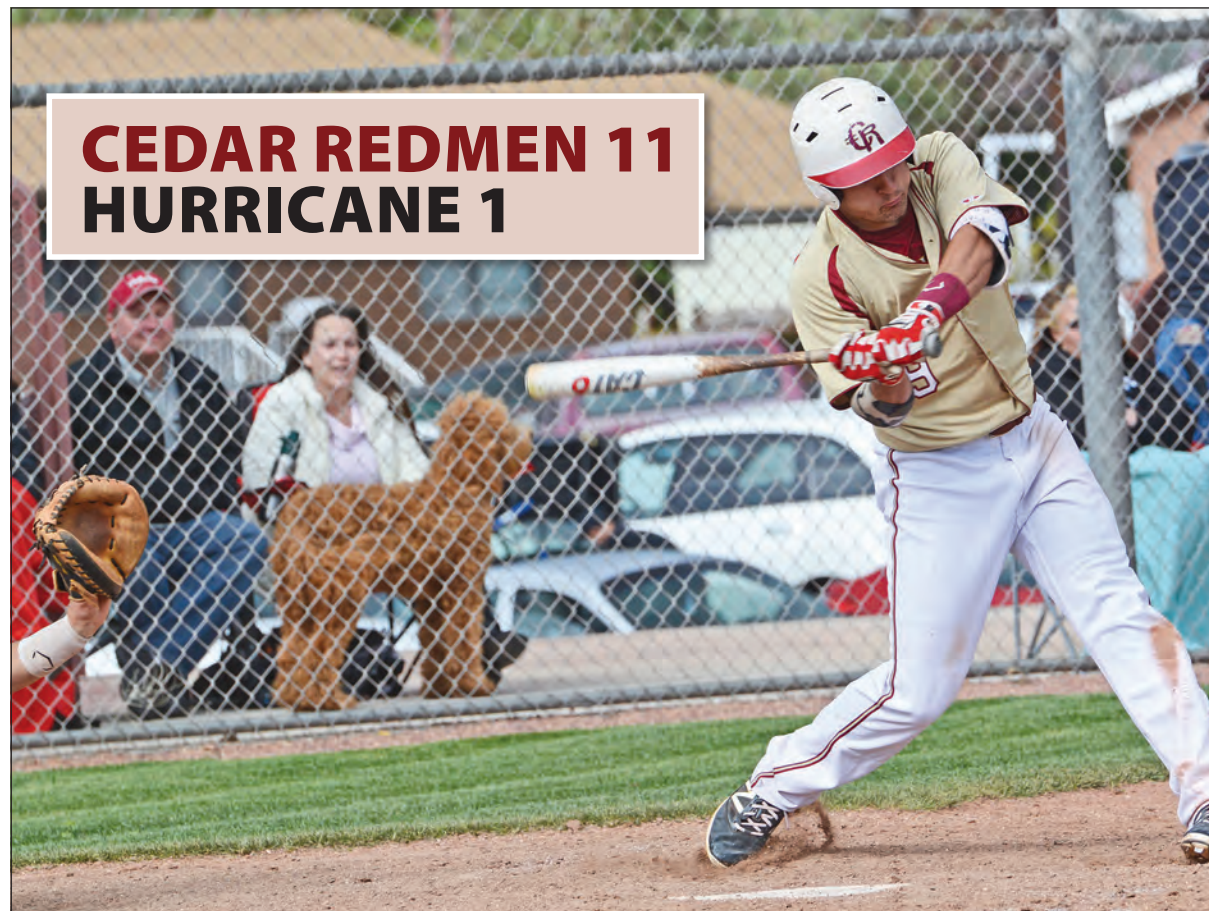
