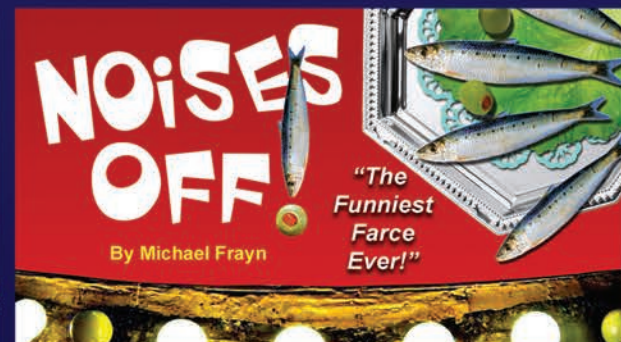

## Cedar City man dies in hiking accident

Cedar City man Shaw Trent Phillipsen died last Sunday after he was found in a rugged area in the hills just east of Cedar City by Iron County Search and Rescue Ropes Team, in conjunction

with the Utah Highway Patrol helicopter.

Phillipsen, 22, had been hiking in the area and was filed as a missing person at the beginning of last week after he could not be located Sunday afternoon.

He was located Wednesday and as detec-

tives processed the scene, Phillipsen's body was airlifted and transported to the Medical Examiner for further determination of the cause of death.

Cedar City Police Department thanked the efforts of the Iron County Sheriff's Office, Iron County

Search and Rescue, Utah Highway Patrol, Gold Cross Ambulance and SUU Aviation for their assistance and support during this effort.

"Our condolences go out to the Phillipsen family at this tragic time," the press release stated.

## Brian Head fire nears full containment, Great Basin crew works final day

Monday marked the final day for the Great Basin Incident Management Team 7 to work the Brian Head wild fire as it stood at 71,673 acres and contained at 95 percent that morning.

With 355 personnel working the fire,

which began June 17, a month later, the fire has been turned over to local units in hopes that the final five percent of the fire left for containment will come.

As the fires burns in the Panguitch Lake area, the crews continue to work as of Monday press time.

"Crews will continue to monitor smokes and remove hazards," a Brian

Head Fire Department update said. "The public will continue to see smoke coming out of the interior but there should be no reason to worry. Also dust devils will appear that look similar to smoke."

Air quality in the area is coming out good and recreation opportunities are available and open. Come and

support local businesses that have been impacted by the fire.

All evacuations have been lifted by the Garfield and Iron County Sheriffs. A Dixie National Forest closure is still in effect, the Dixie National Forest has opened south Panguitch Lake, North Panguitch Lake and White Bridge, according to the update.

# Cedar City Police Department seek suspects in robbery

The Cedar City Police Department seek two suspects in connection with an armed robbery at the Cash America at 622 S. Main St. in Cedar City.

Last Thursday, a male and female entered Cash America and demanded cash, according to a Cedar City Police Department press release.

“The male suspect said he was armed and displayed a weapon,” according to the release. “The clerk complied and the suspects left with an undisclosed amount of cash.”

The suspects left in a dark blue or black, passenger car with black rims. It was described as possibly a Ford Mustang or Pontiac Grand Am. There is a temporary tag in the window. There could be as many as four occupants in the vehicle.

The suspects were described as a black male and a black female, both wearing “trucker hats” and both wearing shorts. The male suspect was described as wearing “jeans shorts” and the female is described as wearing a straight lip ring and wearing “booty shorts” also known as really short shorts. She also has long hair, according to the press release.

Both suspects were described as being “short and stocky,” approximately five feet, seven inches. The suspects were last seen leaving northbound on Main Street.

Detectives have been in contact with officials from Advance America and received information that these same suspects were involved in four robberies at other Advance America stores in the Las Vegas area today.

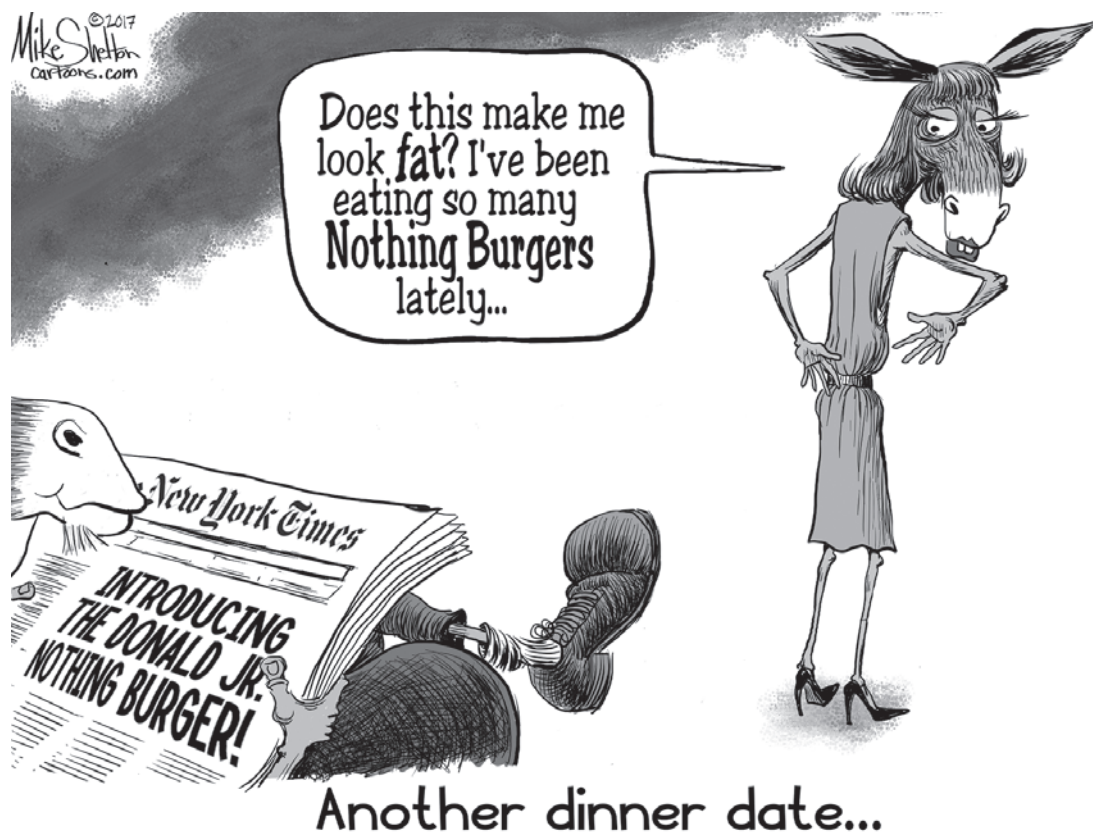

## Jazz fans save your outrage

**O**n Independence Day, Gordon Hayward declared his independence from the Utah Jazz. Let the howling begin.

A few set fire to their expensive Hayward jerseys...He was denounced as a traitor...Some sent online wishes the he become injured and not play next season...His gratitude and leadership abilities were questioned...People who seldom follow professional sports were wailing that Utah was once again being snubbed for their more bright and shiny competitors...The political career of Tanner Ainge, the son of Boston Celtics president, Danny Ainge, was slammed to the mat...There was more shaking of heads than when Roseanne Barr sang the national anthem.

As for me, I was amused by the commotion. Your neighbors often switch jobs and employers, yet for of us dismiss them as ungrateful and disloyal. We figure they have good reasons. And, in the case of Hayward, he has a much better chance of playing in the NBA finals with the Celtics than he did with the Jazz.

For the Jazz, it sucks. For the fans, it's a kick in the gut. Both will recover, just as both did when John Stockton retired to Spokane and Karl Malone chased his dream with the Lakers.

I just wish all the upset Jazz fans would channel their anger and concern into matters that actually impact their lives. A Utah Jazz win on a Gordon Hayward put-back didn't boost their retirement funds or pay their health insurance premium.

Hayward broke your heart? You should feel heartbroken that your congressional delegation is on board with a health care bill which report-

edly would increase by 72% the number of your neighbors who are uninsured. Don't feel sad for the Jazz. Feel sad for the thousands of M.S. and cancer victims who will lose treatment.

Concerned about the Jazz future? You should be more concerned about North Korea's launch of an intercontinental ballistic missile. A friend of mine recently cancelled three million-dollar business projects. He couldn't pick Hayward out of a police lineup, but he's nervous about a bellicose Trump starting a war in Asia.

Angry about the hefty salaries of professional athletes? You should be angry that our economic model and tax code has led to

some 2% of the most wealthy Americans receiving about 70% of the financial rebound since the 2008-2009 recession.

Frustrated that Hayward can readily leave Utah without a whimper? Compare that

to the 400,000 men, women, and children who have fled Mosul, Iraq in the last two months. Unlike Hayward, they have nowhere to go. Unlike Hayward, they have spent years dodging aerial bombardments, snipers, and car bombs.

I have a healthy interest in sports and I wish Hayward had stayed. He'll never become the idol in Boston that he would have become in Utah. He'll probably be seen as a pretty good player on a very good team.

But to Utah Jazz fans, don't let Hayward keep you up at night. Save your outrage for things that really matter.

# Vickers reports on legislative appropriation meeting, tax reform, education

Sen. Evan Vickers (R-UTAH) attended a Legislative appropriation meeting in tandem with the traditional policy interim meetings in June and reported the update for public knowledge.

"I am the Senate Chairman for Higher Education Appropriations, and also sit on the Natural Resources, Agriculture and Environmental Quality Appropriations Subcommittee, and both of those meetings happened during the June interim last month," Vickers said. "Efficiency is a key word we are mindfully applying at our Higher Education Appropriation meetings this year. We are scrutinizing the base budget in a number of areas, and actively looking for better ways to do things and in a more efficient manner."

Governor Gary Herbert has asked Vickers to serve on a committee/task force to look at developing our workforce, and more specifically, how to improve our higher education system, and make it more efficient, he said.

"This is not a blue-ribbon type committee where there are 50 or more members and the committee struggles to get something done," Vickers said. "This particular committee will have only around nine members, and we will be digging into some real possibilities of how to improve our higher education programs, institutions and facilities."

## Tax Reform

Another big topic he said the public may be hearing about a lot this year is tax reform. Vickers attended a special meeting in June which reviewed the principles of sound tax policy. I would like to highlight for you those principles:

**1. Simple** » Taxes should be easy for taxpayers to understand and comply with, and for taxing agencies to administer. Complicated taxation promotes conflict between taxpayers and tax administrators.

**2. Stable and Predictable** » Tax rates, revenues and administration should provide certainty of financial planning for government, individuals and businesses. The application and administration of tax policy should be predictable and consistent from year to year.

**3. Transparent** » Tax policies should not allow unnecessary government growth and spending. Sound tax policies should protect taxpayers from automatic or hidden tax increases, and from imposition of improper fees in lieu of taxes.

**4. Neutral** » Similarly-situated taxpayers should be taxed similarly. Tax policy should not be used to determine winners and losers between and among taxpayers, or unfairly shift tax burdens to/away from one or more classes of taxpayers. The sole purpose of a tax is to raise sufficient revenue to fund state priorities.

**5. Competitive** » Tax policies should be reviewed and updated to keep Utah competitive without violating the principles of simplicity, stability and neutrality.

**6. Tax the Final Product** » This simply means that we should tax the business output not the input, or, in other words, only tax a product when it is sold, not the products that go into producing it. Taxes on business inputs should be avoided.

**7. Exemptions** » Exemptions from tax should be based on clear, broad-based social philosophies or economic stimulation that meets the test of being readily apparent and objectively demonstrable.

**8. Contesting of Taxes** » The tax system needs to be accessible to the average taxpayer and be balanced and fair with no appearance of bias.

**9. Related** » In general, any new tax or fee revenue should benefit those who are paying the fee or tax.

**10. Revenue Sufficiency** » Government has a role to play in a healthy economy. The tax system should enable state government to fund essential services, while limiting the overall tax burden on Utah's citizens and businesses. Fiscal responsibility and efficient use of existing state revenues is critical.

**11. Broad Base and Low Rate** » Tax deductions, credits, exemptions and exclusions may be appropriate if they promote economic growth and development. The overriding tax policy mantra should follow "Broaden the base and lower the rate," which, if used, will allow for fair tax revenue that is spread across a broader base of goods and services.

## Recodification of Education Code

Vickers emphasized that education is always one of the big issues the Legislature considers every session.

"That means we see a lot of education bills, and education laws can get confusing and messy," he said. "The state education code is a collection of regulations, rules, or statutes, and the last time the education code was reviewed and cleaned up by the Utah Legislature, (many years ago), the code went from 400+ pages of code down to about 250 pages of code."

Remodifying simplifies and cleans up the code, and this year, the Education Interim Committee agreed to not make any major changes to the code with remodifying bills, but rather keep the bills focused on basic clean-up and updating, he said.

"The goal is to pass the bill early in the legislative session, and have all changes from the bill become effective immediately, so any new education bills during the session will work with the new code," Vickers said.

## DUI Law

He said the Transportation Committee continued its discussion of the implementation of the .05 Blood Alcohol Content-BAC law (HB155

from 2017). The committee heard from national representatives of the American Beverage Institute and the National Restaurants Association.

"They raised concerns that the DUI law negatively impacts Utah's image and could hurt tourism," Vickers said. "Senator Stuart Adams of Layton, one of the co-sponsors of the bill, said the bill discourages drunk driving, which saves lives."

## Expansion of State Parks

"During the most recent legislative session, we passed two bills encouraging consideration for creating a state park at Hole in the Rock and Little Sahara," he said. "To help with the consideration, a core group has been formed to review successful management models to learn how to adapt it for these sites. This core group involves local input and partners. Once the core groups have collected the pertinent information, they'll submit it to the state to consider whether they would like to take over the areas as state parks."

As a part-time legislature, Vickers said, they only have official interim meetings once a month.

"I am honored to represent you - my colleagues, friends, and neighbors - in the Utah State Senate," he concluded.

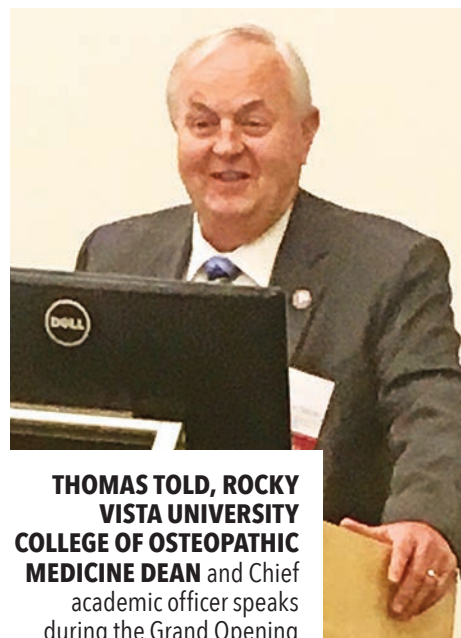

# Utah's second medical school opens doors in southern Utah

University of Utah has the first medical school and 112 years later, Rocky Vista University College of Osteopathic Medicine marks the second Utah has a second medical school to open in this state as its grand opening took place last Friday in Ivins, Utah.

The school may have just opened, but was 50 years in the making as Thomas Told, Rocky Vista University College of Osteopathic Medicine dean and Chief academic officer, had big dreams to open the school over the decades. Told grew up in rural Utah and had aspirations of opening a school in an area similar to where he grew up.

"I finished up my education in Northern Utah, but my heart was always down here," Told said. "People have to go elsewhere to train, and it shouldn't be that way. Every year, 400 students leave Utah to go elsewhere for careers."

In 2006, Rocky Vista University in Parker, Colorado opened, which Told joined and brought his vision to Utah with new campus marking the University's second campus.

"I had to go to Colorado first to make what I had been wanting for so long here in Utah," Told said.

With the opening of the Ivins campus, Rocky Vista University College of Osteopathic Medicine President and Chief Executive Officer Clinton Adams said the school will open opportunity for students within Utah to stay in their home state to complete their degrees and even remain in the state for their careers.

With school beginning Monday, more than 100 students are enrolled, more than 50 percent of them are from Utah universities, Vice Dean David Park said. The university, which is still under completion, will eventually be equipped to hand 250 students year-round when finished.

"We have interviewed nearly 300 top-tier applicants and gone through 2,000 plus applications and I can assure you

that the students coming here are truly exceptional," Park said.

He said the students come from 24 different countries and 50 percent of the applicants are from Utah schools including 26 from Brigham Young University, 14 from the University of Utah, 11 from Southern Utah University, 10 from Utah State University, 11 from Utah Valley University and five from Weber State University.

"Although this was our vision, this was not our bias in selection," he said. "These students were not chosen for their resident state, but by their rigorous academic standings. This is a testament to Utah's quality of students so today is a celebration of Utah's excellence education system."

Park asked those involved in Utah education to stand and be applauded.

The addition of the students, faculty and staff is something Ivins Mayor Chis Hart said he's most excited for, since the move-ins will provide a brightness and "forward-thinking" mindsets.

"We're a population of 10,000, and there are almost no communities of our size that can boast they have a medical school," Hart said. "So it gives us some bragging rights."

SUU President Scott L. Wyatt said he is proud to be a partner to the medical school.

"This medical school will stand as a monument of possibilities, a place of dreams that just having this located here is a constant reminder to the youth of southern Utah that they can actually go to

medical school," Wyatt said. "More people ... will stretch into this difficult profession."

The two-story, 104,000 square-foot school building includes two, 200-seat lecture halls, 36 study rooms, a simulation center, standardized patient rooms and a 9,000 square-foot library. The campus also has two student housing buildings.

Utah Governor Gary Herbert commented on the state's milestone via video message.

"As our state's population continues to grow, the need for physicians continues to grow (with it)," Gov. Gary Herbert said. "And starting today, more Utah students will be able to stay in their home state while pursuing their medical education."

Elder Steven E. Snow, general authority seventy of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, gave the dedicatory prayer blessing the faculty, students and the building that great things would come from the new medical school.

"We dedicate this site to be a safe place of learning," Snow said. "We bless this place to be safe from the ravages of nature. That these buildings will stand for generations, to bless those who will study here. We dedicate the foundation, the baring walls, all components of this structure to bear up under the pressures of time and external influences."

He dedicated the College of Osteopathic Medicine to be a place of service in the community and to all who visit it.

"We pray that this place will serve well the needs of faculty, staff and especially students, who will study and learn here," Snow said. "We dedicate this place to the teaching of medicine; may it always be a place of compassionate teaching and learning. We pray this school will bless the medical profession with well-trained and qualified physicians who will provide medical care to patients throughout the country."

He continued to pray that the school would be a blessing to graduates, that they would leave with much knowledge and having hearts full of compassion.

# Shirley Stahle remembered for her dedication, service to family

**BOUNTIFUL** — Memories of Shirley Stahle are tender after her passing last week.

Family members speak fondly of her wonderful cooking, her sensitive mothering and her compassionate serving as they recall the times they shared.

Shirley Ann Hall Stahle is the wife of Gail Stahle, owner and publisher of the Davis Clipper and Iron County Today. She died on Thursday, July 13 at the age of 79, after years dealing with miniature strokes, then larger strokes and seizures.

It had been just a few weeks ago that Gail and Shirley celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary, on May 31.

"My wife was a very quiet person, a very humble person," said Gail Stahle. "You couldn't find a person more simple but so loving in your whole life."

Gail and Shirley are the parents of seven children and grandparents to 29. They now have 15 great grandchildren, with two more on the way.

Lorie Matern remembers her mother's ability to care for each person.

"She was always involved in all of our lives individually," said Matern, "it was such a great attribute of hers."

Service was something that came naturally, she said. "It's just who she was."

"She was always providing service for someone – family members, parents, siblings, anyone," she said. "She loved to serve and she loved to cook – she blessed the lives of a lot of people through her yummy cooking."

One son talks of her chicken cordon bleu, another of her peach ice cream.

Gail Stahle remembers the years when he would work late into the night and early mornings printing for different entities.

"She would never complain, but would make sure there was always something to eat when I got home," he said. "She would keep the food warm and be waiting up for me."

Clark Stahle, a son, remembers the time the family moved from Arizona to Utah. Since Gail was already working in Utah, the plan was for Clark and

his mother to join him at the end of summer.

But in mid-summer, Clark told Shirley he was ready and the two loaded up a few belongings and drove to Utah.

"We had a lot of fun and talked the whole way," he said. "She was always there to listen. She was never one that would talk down to you or say what you were doing wrong. She was always there and helped you navigate through life and do it in your own way. But she was always there if needed."

Reed Stahle, another son, remembers her support of his baseball and basketball games as he was growing up.

"She would come to pretty much every game," he said. He remembers a time she was recovering from surgery and even though he considered himself "the strike out king," he promised her he'd hit a homerun.

He did hit a homerun that day "and she was so excited," he said. "She was very kind and just wanted us to do our best."

Shirley followed the Jazz closely, especially during the Malone/Stockton years, family members recall.

She loved music from the 50s and had a real green thumb, Reed remembers.

"She endured health problems but faced them positively," he said. "She had a firm faith in Jesus Christ and she taught us kids to try to live a life that would reflect that faith."

Gail and Shirley worked together in the Salt Lake Temple for 14 years.

When her health declined and she was in a care center, Gail would visit multiple times a day to help her with meals.

"My dad took care of her in a way that's so inspiring," said Reed.

A volunteer told Reed his father "was doing things right – doing things every man should do when his wife is in this situation."

The memories of working and serving together include the times they would both drive riding lawn mowers to mow the grass in their large Bountiful yard, according to Gail, and the support she gave him and others.

"She was a tremendous, wonderful mother," he said. "She was very lovely lady."

Some fires were due to careless fireworks, but even so we saw quite a spike. Furthermore, because 3 of the 11 fires were multi-family apartment fires the Red Cross had to set up shelters to accommodate the many families displaced as new housing options were explored. Other short term emergency needs that had to be addressed were food, infant supplies, clothing, prescription medication replacements, and even mental health services.

While the Red Cross has sufficient resources on hand to handle this volume of responses, it is important that the public be reminded that it is only through the generosity of donors and volunteers that we are able to help when these calls start rolling in.

Please help share the message that financial gifts of any size enable the Red Cross to not only help people such as those affected in these fires, but to also help Utahans prepare for, and recover from disasters big and small.

For example, this year the Red Cross in Utah has installed over 9,000 free smoke alarms as part of our national Home Fire Campaign. The overall goal is to reduce the number of deaths from home fire by 25 percent. within a five-year period. Smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire by 50 percent. So far over 260 lives have been saved the result of over 260,000 smoke alarms installed. The next phase of the campaign is called "Sound the Alarm" with the goal to install our millionth smoke alarm sometime during Home Fire Prevention month this October.

# 'Shakespeare In Love' a surprise of entertainment at the Festival

Only three theatres in the United States currently have permission to produce Lee Hall's stage adaptation of Marc Norman's and Tom Stoppard's screenplay "Shakespeare in Love" and Cedar City's own Utah Shakespeare

Festival is one of those theatres.

Despite the rarity of this show on stages in the U.S., I came to the Festival's opening night of "Shakespeare in Love" with low expectations. I just was not super excited. Halfway through the play I was still on the fence. As the play's final scene ended I was smiling. Turns out I liked it, like I would see it again liked it.

Will Shakespeare has writer's block on his new manuscript "Romeo and Ethel the Pirate's Daughter." With the theatre world breathing down his neck, Will needs inspiration. His friend and professional rival Kit Marlowe gives him a few poetical nudges but it is not until he meets Viola de Lesseps that his developing play starts to find its true poetry and adventure.

Viola is the up and coming bard's biggest fan

skills. Eventually, Will discovers Kent is actually Viola and they fall into a passionate affair. Will found his muse and while not all is happy endings for Will -- Romeo and Ethel the Pirate's Daughter becomes the success Romeo and Juliet, inspired by his love for Viola.

My conversion to the Oscar award winning-story line probably has something to do with the lead actors. Quinn Mattfeld as Will Shakespeare is genius and his leading lady Betsy Mugavero as Viola de Lesseps is equally fantastic. I am sure it can be daunting to take on the more than legendary bard but Mattfeld's impeccable comedic timing and stage presence brings Shakespeare to life.

But Mattfeld and Mugavero is not the only relationship with chemistry on the stage. Shane Kenyon's Kit Marlowe (Shakespeare's playwright contemporary) is the perfect friend and companion for Mattfeld's young Will. Their camaraderie was one of my favorite elements of the play. Who

and wants nothing more than to act. Unfortunately, it is illegal in Elizabethan England for women to appear on the stage. So, Viola takes on an alter ego as

the young man Thomas Kent and auditions for Romeo. When Kit and Will visit Viola's home to offer Thomas Kent the role of Romeo, Will sees Viola without her disguise and falls in love. Viola's night is not going so well as she is attending a ball where she discovers that her father has promised her to Virginia plantation owner Lord Wessex as his wife.

Will, however, is enamored and visits Viola's balcony later that night accompanied by his fellow playwright, Kit Marlowe. What ensues is a scene with echoes of Romeo and Juliet. Thomas Kent shows up for rehearsals the next day and wows the entire cast with his acting

knows if they were truly friends in real life. But now I certainly hope so.

This wonderful play that brings not only Shakespeare to life but the theater life of Elizabethan England is filled with a cast of talented actors who bring humor and drama to the Engelstad Theatre this season. The only thing that truly marred this experience for me was the four-person chorus singing interludes that were a jarring intrusion to the flow of the story. There were only a few times they made sense to the story line and at least once they seemed a little off in their harmonies. Fortunately, the story, the actors, the beautifully lighted set (Donna Ruzika, lighting designer) were enough to overcome these odd moments. It is possible that I will never see Shakespeare the same or at least not Romeo and Juliet.

On a sidenote: There is innuendo and adult language in this play. I would not recommend it for young children.

# Omaha poet Todd Robinson to read in Cedar City

Thanks to support from the Cedar City Arts Council, Omaha poet Todd Robinson will read from his works at Artisans Art Gallery at 7 p.m. on Wednesday. This reading is free and the public is invited to attend. An open Q&A and “meet and greet” reception with refreshments will follow the event.

Robinson, a larger-than-life figure affectionately known as “Toddfather” to many in his native Omaha, will have his second collection of poems published by Backwaters Press in 2018. Brent Spencer, author of *The Lost Son* and director of creative writing at Creighton University, notes that Robinson “writes with equal measures of wit and profundity about every moment of a life, from the tender to the tormented. His subjects are nature, pop culture, big ideas, and the tattered heart. If philosophy had a fist, it would look like a poem by Todd Robinson.”

For Robinson, the thrill of reading his work in

front of a live audience never gets old. As a poet who has given hundreds of readings, you might expect the process to be routine, but that’s not the case—as Robinson points out in a 2016 interview with *The Chapbook Interview*: “when I’m walking toward the microphone I’m almost in a dissociative fugue, the energy barely containable. I’ve probably read two hundred times, but it’s always the same frisson: time dilating, my heart thrashing, everything at once watery and crystalline . . . I prepare diligently for the audience’s sake, that they might enjoy my timbre and vision, but also for my own sake, because I can barely keep my hands on the tiller when I’m throttling down the whale-road of poesy.”

This event, a collaboration between Artisans Art Gallery, the Cedar City Arts Council, and Utah poetry magazine *Sugar House Review*, presents a terrific opportunity for writers and readers of Iron County to hear and meet a talented visiting poet in an informal, community setting.

Robinson’s poem, “Landscape, Still Life, Portrait,” first published in *A Dozen Nothing*, appears herein as a small sample of his exceptional work.

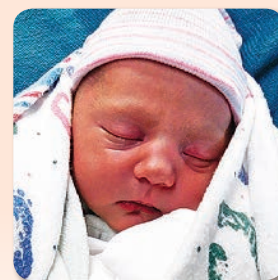

## Cedar Academy provides classic learning options

Cedar Academy, located at 401 S. Main St. Suite B, has opened with the options for children ages six to 18 to have a classic education.

A classic education, defined as a method that builds the experience of learning around the natural developmental stages of children.

“The methodology of teaching that students find at Cedar Academy is modeled after Dorothy Sayers’ ‘Lost Tools of Learning,’” Cedar City Academy Founder Michael Martin said.

Martin, who moved his family from Texas to Cedar City, has had the Academy in operation for three months now.

The school provides a year-round school schedule for its students.

Martin said the desire to become a part of education came after a few experiences he had with his own children.

He said his son wasn’t being challenged in school because he was getting straight A’s and his teacher was getting in trouble by his teacher for reading literature during math class.

Martin said that his daughter, Sarah, was also struggling.

“(The school faculty) told me she was reading too slow,” he said. “Then they told me she wasn’t comprehending anything when she was reading too fast.”

Martin decided to start teaching at home and make a different approach from the Public Education System. He saw the change in his children and decided to continue it.

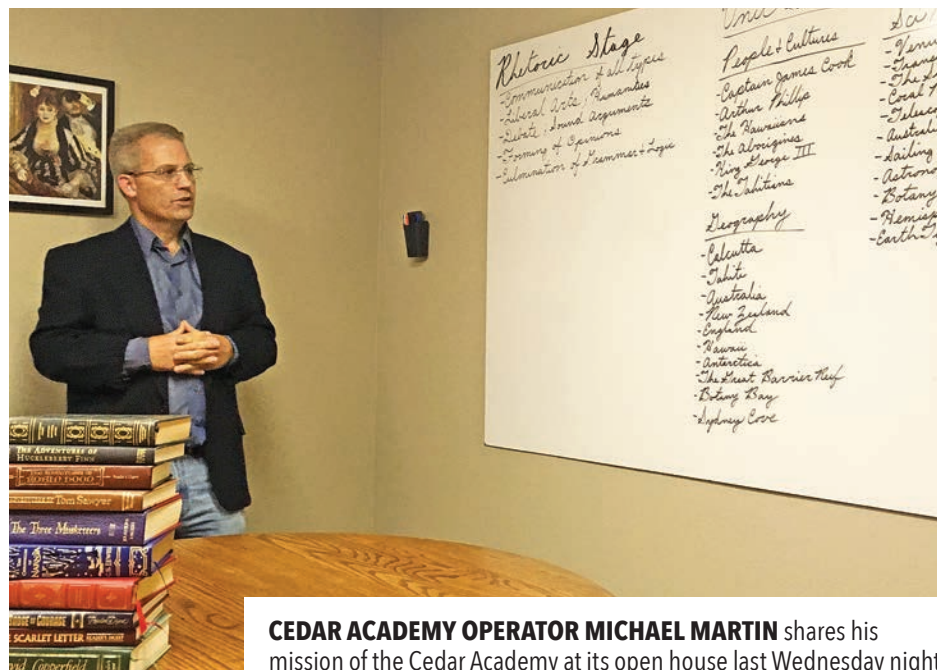
In reference to a classical education and within this context, education happens with the flow of childhood development, in three distinct phases known as The Trivium — which means “The Three-Way Path.”

“When children are young, they love to memorize,” according to Cedar Academy’s website. “It’s life-giving to them. When they grow to their middle school years, they argue and debate. They thrive within the process of discovery. As they mature into young adults, they want to determine their course and plan their movements. The Trivium becomes the framework for learning within classical education.”

During the Academy’s open house last Wednesday, Martin described the many things he thought were important within education that he has present at the school.

» **God, Family, Country** — Cedar Academy teaches the principles that made America the greatest nation of Earth, that the family is the core of society and God is always welcome. We encourage parents to take their God given responsibility for the education of their children to never interfere, but assist.

» **Student Centered** — Focus is on the student, not on subject or

grade level. While learning important techniques, students are encouraged to use those techniques on material that is of most interest to them.

» **Flex Schedule** — A schedule that works for your student and family and provides many benefits such as accommodates family vacations, work schedules and doesn’t allow for “burn out.”

» **Quality, not Quantity** — With integrated subjects, students are encouraged to dig deep into the material and take the time required for understanding and see how everything is interrelated.

» **Assess, don’t test** — We assess each student’s individual performance rather than testing. Assessments are more accurate, personal and students learn from education’s sake; not for just taking a test.

» **Skill Level, Not Grade Level** — Students are placed according to skill, not age. They advance at their own pace and interact with those of different ages but similar skill levels. This appropriately reflects society and requires less adjustment once they progress in life. It also avoids student frustration by being held back or pushed too hard to keep up. The goal is mastery. When they master something, they move on.

» **Home study, not Homework** — Students will want to continue learning at home, but when the family comes together students are encouraged to spend time with family.

» **Truth, Goodness and Beauty** — To find our purpose and to seek truth, in order to discover and to act on what is good and beautiful in this life.

game,” Snow Canyon head coach Ben Shakespeare said. “We saw him for a few pitches Thursday, and he closed us out in that game.”

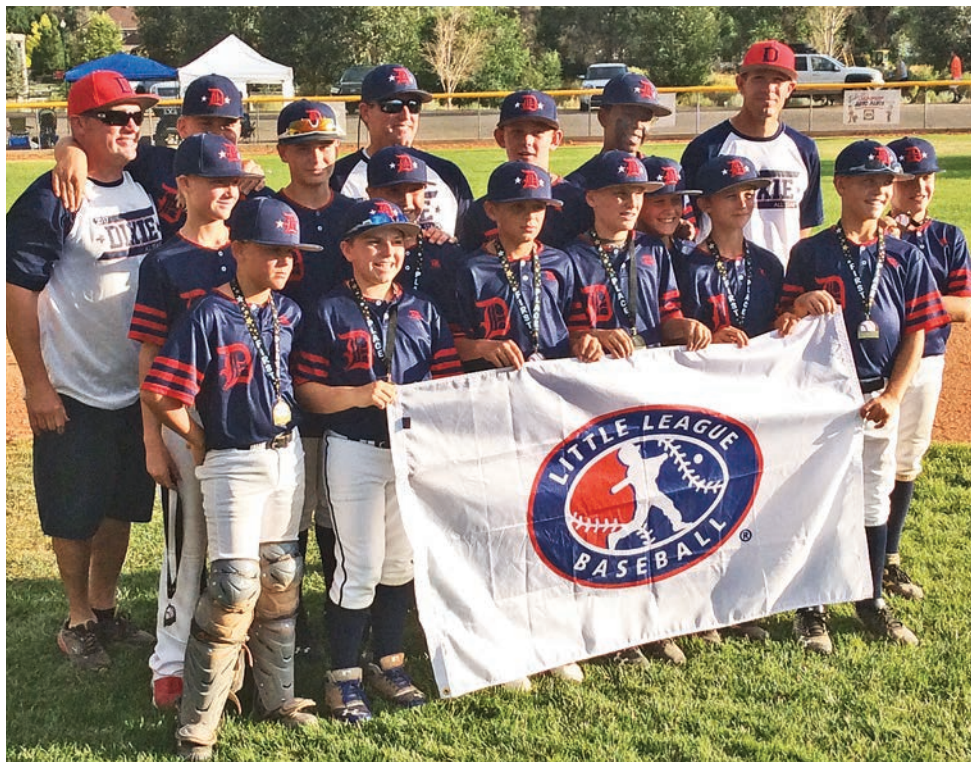

They will compete in the 2017 Charlotte Invite in Charlotte, North Carolina, the Fullerton/Riverside Classic in Fullerton and Riverside, California, and the Amy Svoboda Memorial Classic hosted by Air Force in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

SUU will also have a pair of non-conference home events, one against Utah Valley University on August 29 and one against Utah State University on September 15.

The T-Birds will open up Big Sky Conference action at home on September 21, when they will host the University of North Dakota Fighting Hawks inside the Centrum Arena.

"As excited as we are to compete in those three tournaments, which will be a good challenge for the team, we're really excited to have two in-state rivals come to the Centrum before Big Sky play begins," SUU head coach Craig Choate said.

The Southern Utah University Thunderbirds and the University of Utah Utes announced an agreement to play in 2024 in Salt Lake City.

"We are thrilled to get another opportunity to play the University of Utah," head coach Demario Warren said. "Our players love to play against the best programs in the nation and playing in

Rice-Eccles Stadium is an awesome experience. We look forward to the challenge and continued relationship with the University of Utah."

After meeting for the first time in school history on September 1, 2016 at Rice-Eccles Stadium, the Utah Utes pulled away with a season-opening 24-0 victory.

In August of 2016, SUU and Utah agreed to a game in 2022.

SUU's 2024 game against Utah will be the third meeting between the two teams.

The Big Sky Conference announced the members of the Spring 2017 Big Sky All-Academic

Team Wednesday morning and 62 Thunderbirds earned a spot on the list for their performance in the classroom. The total number includes five athletes from the men's and women's golf teams, nine from the softball team, 10 from the men's and women's tennis programs, and 38 men's and women's track and field athletes. The number of athletes being recognized is up 27 percent from last spring's

49 honorees.

"We are very proud of all 62 Thunderbirds being honored by the conference today," Interim Director of Athletics Debbie Corum said. "Their achievements in the classroom are a testament to the dedication that we as a department have when it comes to the success of our student-athletes."

To be eligible, a student-athlete must have participated in at least half of the team's competitions, achieved a 3.2 cumulative grade point average (on a 4.0 scale) at the conclusion of the most recently completed term, and completed at least one academic term at SUU.

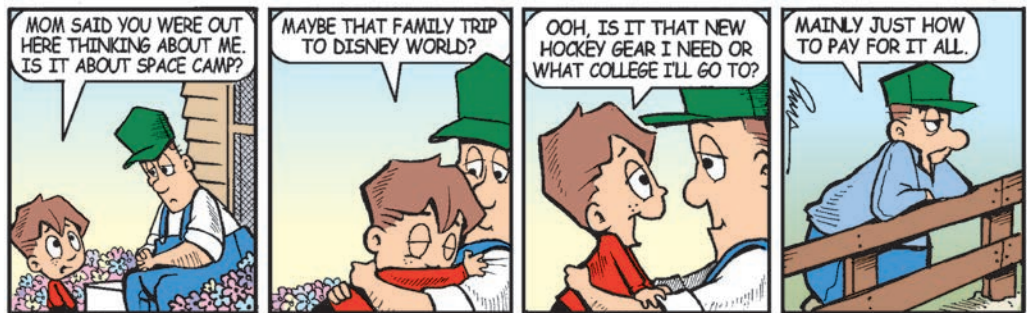

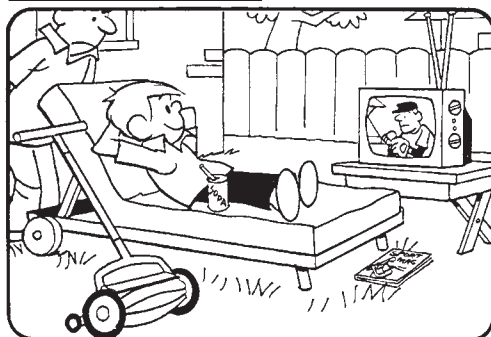

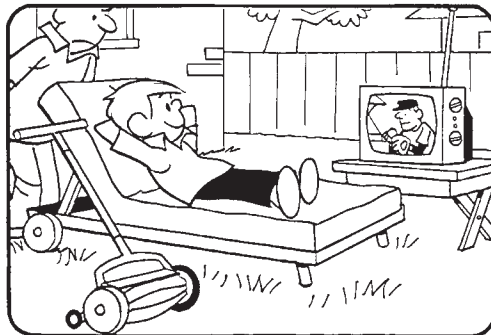
