Just under 1,400 names of local heroes that served in the armed services during World War II are listed on the memorial at Veterans Park in Cedar City. The 75th anniversary of the D-Day Invasion at Normandy (June 6, 1944) provides an opportunity to reflect on the service and sacrifices made not all that long ago by local people that we may still be able to learn more about.

Three weeks after the Normandy D-Day invasion of World War II, the Iron County Record, the weekly newspaper for Cedar City and surrounding areas, passed along the first word received in Cedar City from a local soldier participating in the invasion.

John P. Lamb wrote home to his parents, "Again we are back in the line. It is the same old war except it's fiercer and in a different kind of country. As you've heard, we of the 'Fighting First' made the assault; not an easy one and something that we will remember for a long time."

In the coming days, other accounts would trickle in from other soldiers that would paint a broader picture of Iron County's part in the war.

As he indicated in his letter, John Lamb was not new to battle. Nor were other soldiers from Southern Utah.

On Monday, March 3, 1941 nine months before the Pearl Harbor attack launched the United States into war, 122 officers and men of Battery "F" of the 222nd Field Artillery were mustered into active service at the National Guard armory in Cedar City. Among that number was John P. Lamb.

Two weeks later, Battery "F" was off to San Luis Obispo, California for regular military training. According to the Iron County Record, "At the end of the year they will be discharged from service unless congress takes some additional action in the meantime, as the result of emergencies that may exist."

In May of 1941, the Record reported that 36 men from Battery "F" had been transferred to other units. One of them was Corporal John Lamb. Members of Battery "F" went on to serve in many different units located all over the

world for the duration of the war.

In August 1942, Corporal Lamb went to officer training at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. Completing that, he was commissioned a second lieutenant and transferred to Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

After serving in North Africa for a time, Lieutenant Lamb participated in the invasion of Sicily in 1943.

In a letter home, dated 24 July 1943, he wrote: "We of the 1st Division landed in the Southeast sector of the Island near Gela on the morning following Sherm's birthday [a brother serving in the Army Air Corps]."

"I landed a few minutes after the initial assault wave, while the beach was still being shelled and the machine guns were still chattering."

"From the time I hit the water, which was chest deep, until I was 100 yards inland, I fell down at least 20 times, due to fatigue and sitting in the same position in my boat.

"My Radio crew and I continued inland with our radio to higher ground where I could obtain good observation and from then, which was about 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. in the afternoon, I directed gunfire on opportune targets that arose."

Lieutenant Lamb received a Silver Star medal for action in Sicily on July 27, 1943. Quoting from the Iron County Record, "According to the official report,

when heavy enemy fire prevented an infantry company from advancing, Lt. Lamb left a place of comparative safety, located an excellent observation post, and proceeded to direct accurate artillery fire on enemy strongholds. He remained in this exposed position despite determined enemy resistance until the infantry had attained its objective."

After his work in Sicily and his participation in the campaign on mainland Italy, Lieutenant Lamb was assigned to staff headquarters in England.

He stated that he liked his work, but sometimes didn't know how to act among the high ranking brass. "It is pretty rough going at times. Guess I was set out to be a field soldier," he wrote.

John Lamb continued to serve as a field soldier following Normandy.

In 1945 he received a Bronze Star for helping to coordinate artillery fire to breach the Siegfried Line, the major defensive line defending Germany from continued Allied advance.

John Prescott Lamb married Ms. Pixie Prentice in May 1945 in

England. Theirs was described as a match made in heaven, with love for horses, outdoors, travel and family. He continued in the army, retiring as a colonel in 1969. He then lived in Bothell, Washington, and died October 15, 2017 at the age of 95.

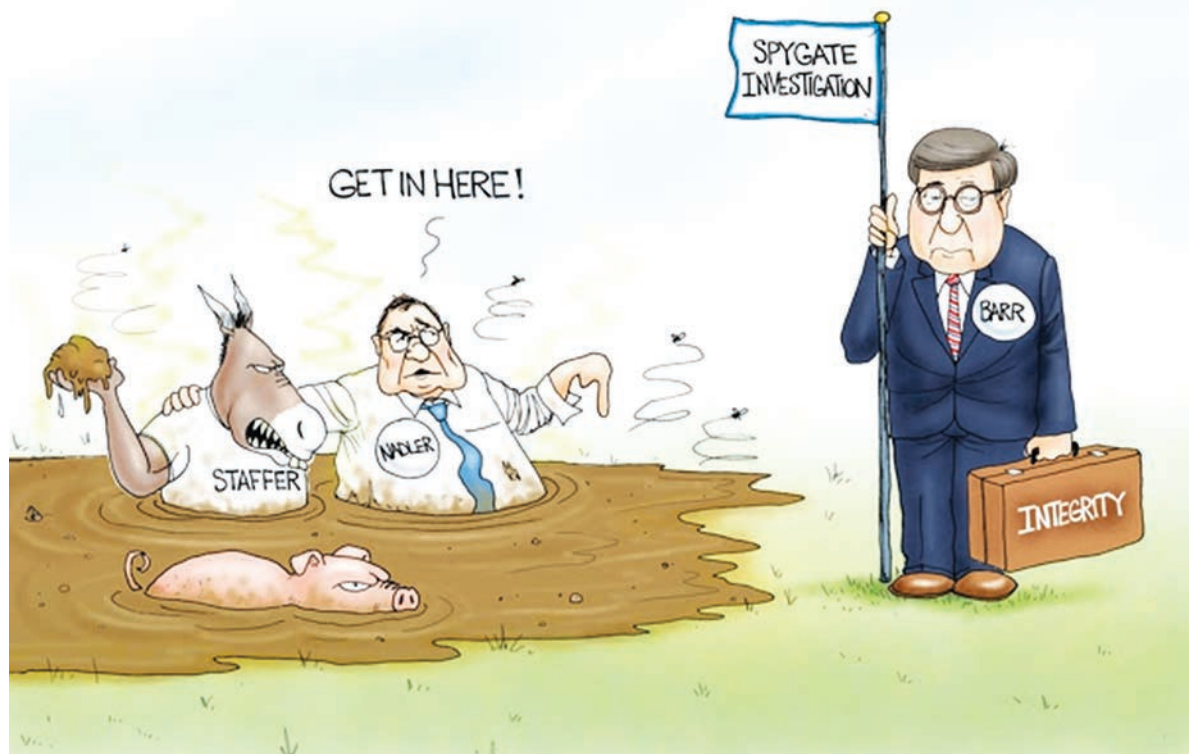

A Utah restaurant has a sign in the foyer: Be Kind. Be Generous. Be Thoughtful. Be Inspired. Be Understanding.

I can't think of a better menu for making a difference in the life of other people. Too bad we don't see this behavior in many of our elected officials who have a platform to create meaningful change.

But the five traits listed at the restaurant are epitomized by an immigrant – not one of our immigrants – who is receiving a small slice of publicity due to the National Basketball Association finals. He is both a reflection of the economic growth that comes to countries who welcome immigrants as well as the gratitude most immigrants show for their new home.

The man's name is Nav Bhatia, 67, and Indian immigrant who came to Toronto, Canada in his mid-30s. He arrived with an engineering degree, but when he found it difficult to find a job, partially due to his ethnicity, he took a swipe at selling cars. It clicked. He became general manager of the car lot, began buying other car dealerships, and

is today a multi-millionaire.

He also became a basketball fan. He attended his first Toronto Raptors NBA opener 24 years ago – and has never missed a game since. What other guy in a turban has attended 960 regular season and 50 playoff games?

But this column isn't about his addiction to the sport. It's about his

can all learn.

Some 20 years ago, for instance, he was getting his telephone fixed when a customer, seeing the Indian immigrant, referred to him as a cab driver. After all, aren't all strange-looking foreigners working low-wage jobs and potentially defrauding the welfare system?

According to USA Today, Bhatia “turned the episode into a positive.” He went to the Raptors management and bought 3,000 tickets, then gave them to a diverse section of Toronto's children: black, white, brown, rich, poor, Christian, Muslim, Sikh. He said he wanted “all kinds of kids to sit together and integrate with each other.”

Last month, he heard from another naysayer. During the Eastern Conference Finals with the Milwaukee Bucks, a Wisconsin man sent an offensive tweet about Bhatia's turban. Instead of getting angry, Bhatia contacted the man, took he and his son to dinner and presented them with NBA merchandise.

A famous man a long time ago urged his followers to “turn the other cheek.” A non-Christian immigrant best exemplifies that injunction. Last year he spent \$220,000 on tickets as part of his pay-it-forward campaign.

I can't speak for the Canadian prime minister, but I'll bet he's glad his country didn't stop Bhatia at the border.

We have a lot of great experiences and a lot of wonderful knowledge that we can share with each other."

## Utah Legislative Update

Hello friends and neighbors,

This incredibly wet and cold Spring has been on the minds of most of us lately. I heard on the news Utah has received 60% of its total annual rainfall in the last 83 days. While we have missed the sunshine, it's also good to note the abundance that comes from this kind of rainfall. I love seeing the green valleys and hills and all the life that comes from having this moisture.

While the Legislative session is not officially in, there is quite a bit of work we do for the rest of the year during what are called interim meetings. In May we returned to the Capitol for our first Interim Day meetings of the year. These meetings are held throughout the year, generally the third Wednesday of the month, and are open to the public, can be streamed live or listened to at a later date at [le.utah.gov](http://le.utah.gov).

Here are some of the big issues from this month's interim meetings:

### Tax Modernization Update

As you may recall, this past legislative session we considered HB 441, Tax Equalization and Reduction Act, which ultimately did not pass. To study the issue more in-depth, the Utah Legislature formed the Tax Restructuring and Equalization Task Force, which consists of appointed members from the Utah Senate, Utah House of Representatives and four non-voting members.

There is a structural imbalance with our current tax system. We are switching from being a largely goods-based consumer economy to more of a service-based consumer economy. Additionally, there is an increased demand on programs funded by the sales tax (General Fund) including Medicaid, transportation and public safety. Revenue needed to support essential programs are not keeping pace with the needs of our growing population. It is necessary to address structural funding imbalances that are occurring to prevent the problem escalating.

The task force is expected to complete a series of town hall meetings throughout the state in the coming months. The goal is to obtain feedback and suggestions from the public to help come up with a solution. After the town halls, the task force will discuss ideas shared from constituents throughout the state and consider how to best move forward to modernize our tax structure. Your input is valuable, and I encourage you to be engaged and take part in these discussions. The dates and locations for the town halls will be announced once finalized.

### U.S. Census

The U.S. Census is nearly upon us, but this upcoming census will be different than in years past as it will be administered online. The state Legislature did not create a specific line item for funding census advocacy this year during the legislative session. In the past we have relied on the federal government's efforts to accurately complete the census, but with the change to an online census, it is clear we need to be proactive in encouraging all residents to complete the census. The census is extremely important in understanding who is in our state and receiving the necessary representation and funding from our government. We are looking to appropriate somewhere between \$500,000 and \$1 million to the educating citizens about the census.

### E-Cigarettes

According to the Center for Disease Control, between 2000 and 2018 there was a 73 percent decrease in U.S. high school students who smoke cigarettes. However, there was a 78 percent increase in the number of U.S. high school students who use electronic cigarettes between 2017 and 2018. This is obviously a growing problem in

the U.S. and in Utah. As such, four different interim committees have been tasked with studying this issue throughout the year. In order to coordinate efforts, these committees have all selected delegates to participate in a working group studying e-cigarettes as a whole. Additionally, the Utah State Board of Education, Utah School Superintendents Association, Utah Department of Human Services, Utah Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice and the Department of Health have been asked to participate in the working group with legislators. The goal is for the working group to develop recommendations based on their study for possible legislative action before the next legislative session.

### Plurality

Plurality has been an issue in Utah since 2014. With a caucus/convention system, only two candidates advance to a primary election. The passage of SB 54, Elections Amendments, during the 2014 legislative session created an option for candidates to reach the primary election by gathering signatures. The two paths have the possibility of more than two candidates in a primary election and the chance a winner of a primary receiving less than 50 percent of the votes.

Methods used by other states to avoid a plurality include ranked-choice voting and run-off elections. The Government Operations Interim Committee will study possible solutions to this issue throughout the interim to help our state find a solution to this problem.

# I love the Postal Service

**M**y husband brought the mail in and dropped a little card in front of me. It was addressed to “Mom and Dad” and I glanced at the return address and saw that it was from our daughter in Las Vegas. So, without paying any more attention to the envelope, I opened it and read a sweet thank you note, but when I looked up, my husband was looking at me with a bemused expression on his face. “Did you see the address?” he asked. I glanced at the envelope and read \_\_\_\_\_ West \_\_\_\_\_ South, which is our street address and said, “What?” “Look again,” he encouraged.

Beneath the correct street address were the words, “Las Vegas, NV” and then the zip code 84720. It was postmarked May 10th and the current date was May 18th. That is a couple of days longer than it usually takes mail to go back and forth between us, but the amazing fact was that it made it at all! There was no note on the front or any direction to “return to sender”. The United States Postal Service just figured out that our daughter got distracted and delivered it to us without making a fuss.

I love the postal service.

I hear a lot of people complain every time there is an increase in postal rates, and there can be a lot of griping when a package takes an extra day to go across the country, but think of this: If I have an important message or, say, a bill payment that

must be made—yes, we still send checks by snail mail—I can walk it past the house next door and put it in a little magic slot in a sturdy metal box. Then some time when I am not looking, a secret courier retrieves it and transports it to my desired destination, where it is left in another sturdy metal box or a corporate mail room. # 'Avengers End Game':

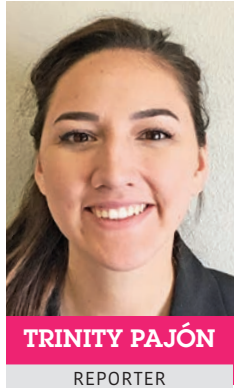
## WHAT A WAY TO CONCLUDE

# DEER PUBLIC:

## PLEASE DON'T TOUCH

*Here's our annual reminder for people to not touch fawns or elk calves if they find them while hiking or camping.*

**SALT LAKE CITY** — If you hike or camp in an area where deer live in Utah, don't be surprised if you come across a deer fawn, or maybe even an elk calf, during the early summer. This is the time of year when they are being born, which is why you may find one during your outdoor adventures.

If you do happen to see one in the wild, you probably won't see its mother. Not seeing its mother might lead you to believe that the animal has been abandoned. But that's rarely the case.

"Deer fawns are actually alone and isolated during their first weeks of life — and that's on purpose," Utah Division of Wildlife Resources big game coordinator Covy Jones said. "The mother knows that leaving the fawn alone is the best way to protect it from predators."

Newborn big game animals fall into two categories: followers and hiders. Followers include bison calves and bighorn sheep lambs, which follow their mothers shortly after they're born. Hiders, such as mule deer fawns and elk calves, do the opposite — they hide, alone, for most of the day.

During the day, a doe deer will reunite with its

fawn for a short time, to nurse it and care for it. Then, to draw attention away from where the fawn is hiding, the mother will leave the fawn. The doe will spend the rest of the day feeding and resting.

Fawns are born with a creamy brown coat that's covered with white spots. This camouflaged coat allows the fawn to blend in with its surroundings. And fawns don't give off much scent, so it's difficult for predators to smell them. Hiding is the best way for the fawn to stay safe. After two or three weeks, the fawn grows strong enough to start accompanying its mother.

So what should you do if you see a deer fawn or an elk calf that appears to be alone?

"Don't approach it," Jones said. "Watch it or take a photo of it from a distance, but don't approach it. In almost every case, the fawn has not been abandoned by its mother."

Finding and petting newly born animals is another problem because the animal's survival depends on it being left alone. If you touch it, you may leave your scent on the animal, which could draw predators to it.

Even if you don't touch the fawn, getting too close can cause the fawn to run away from you — and from its hiding place where its mother left it. Then, when the mother comes back to care for the fawn, it won't be there.

"Keeping your distance and not touching animals are the keys to keeping young animals alive," Jones said.

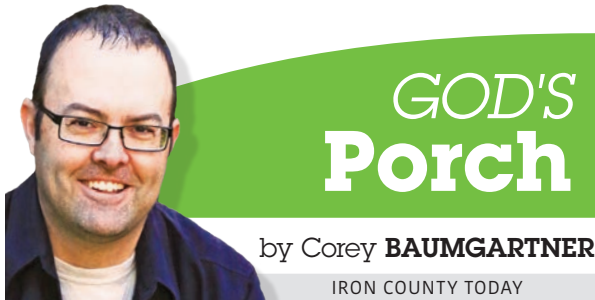
# Far from home

## William Roy Benson, Jr



William Roy Benson, Jr., a man who towered in the lives of all who loved him, passed away on Friday, May 24, 2019 at 83 years young. He was a strong vital man right up to his untimely end. Roy's dad, completely and unreasonably, insisted that at their tender age they were too young to marry. Jackie's parents, Ivan and Zelma, were undeterred. Perhaps they gave their permission a little too freely than would be acceptable today. They whisked their daughter and soon to be son-in-law off to Pioche, Nevada away from anyone who knew Roy Sr. there. # Power Driven Diesel takes 3rd in national competition

Todd Welch and William Terry, owners of Power Driven Diesel in Cedar City, competed in the Ultimate Callout Challenge last month in Indiana.

The UCC began four years ago and is an invitational competition with three main events that take place over three days. Competitors bring trucks from all over the country, and even some from neighboring countries, to answer the challenge. The first event is a drag race, followed by the dyno to measure power and then a sled pull.

“The thing that’s hard about the competition is a drag race truck and a sled pull truck are completely opposite of each other -- completely opposite vehicles,” Welch explained. “So to do well in both events is a real challenge. You want very lightweight components in your drag race, but your need very, very heavy duty components in the sled pull.”

Welch and Terry have competed in the UCC for three years. Welch drove the 1998 Dodge Ram 12-valve Cummins for all three events. He said one of the important aspects to the truck was the mechanical fuel injection system.

“In the sled pull world, the highest power trucks are mechanical injection,” he said. “For our first year,

we were the only mechanical truck in the whole entire field and that year we won the sled pull.”

Most of the work to build the truck was done at Power Driven Diesel, with Terry serving as the crew chief and managing the fueling and transmission and Welch designing the turbo and the engine. Several employees also contributed, including Dustin Prestwich, Conner Cleavland, Jamison Bernoudy, Myer Stump, Josh McCormack and Lonnon Jenson.

Since mechanical fuel injection is no longer common in vehicles, Welch hopes placing third overall in the UCC serves as a reminder for its beneficial qualities. He added that with the closure of the only drag strip in Utah, Cedar City might do well to implement drag races.

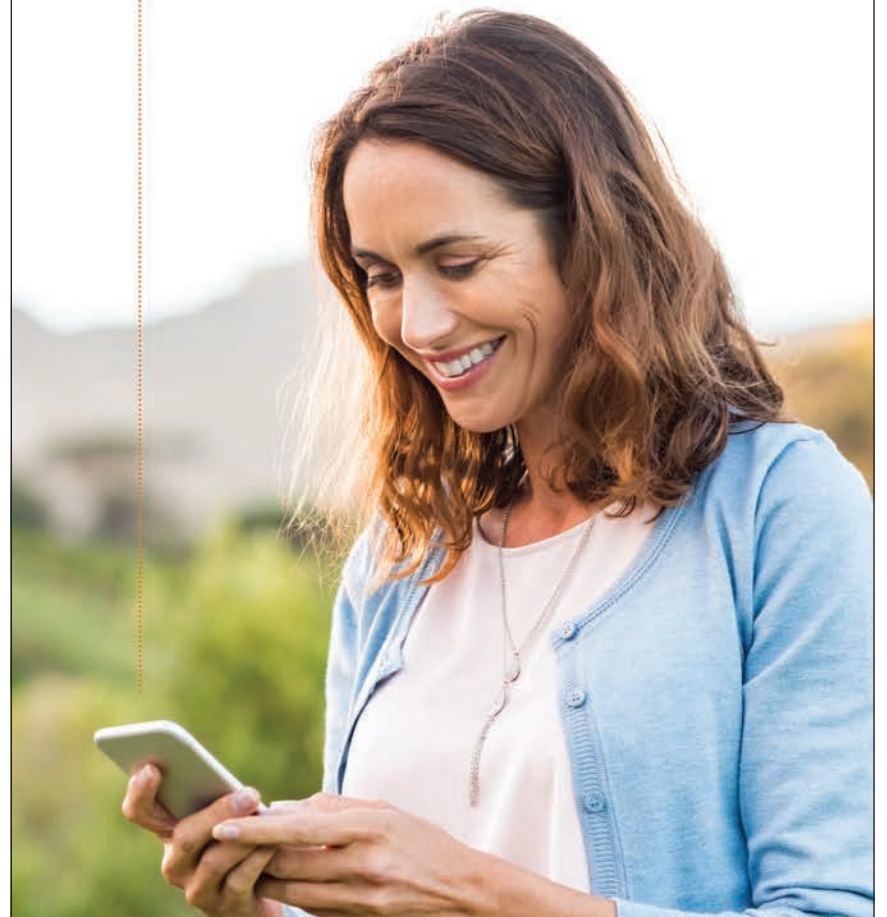

from a mummy with a ball in a tomb to throwing hand-size balls down an arcade-style lane (not very well, but that's not the point). It's a good time for everyone. Admission is \$9 with a senior discount available and the facility is open six days a week. It's located across the street from Six Flags over Texas amusement park and you can learn more at [bowlingmuseum.com](http://bowlingmuseum.com).

Later in the evening, it was off to the yard. I was able to purchase tickets and parking (who even knew that was possible?) online and store them on my phone. Once I arrived, it was easy to find a space and I headed inside. The walk to my seat was a bit long, but several ushers at the section entrances greeted me with warm smiles and a "hi! How you doing?"

It created a good vibe and made the walk a little less stressful.

As for the game, I came to appreciate getting spoiled in press boxes for the last two decades when I paid prices for my food and drink - \$7.75 for a souvenir cup of soda and \$8.25 for nachos as two examples.

But all was washed away with the game itself. Joey Gallo — the pride of Henderson, Nev. — atoned for an earlier error with a grand slam off Royals starter Danny Duffy that broke a 2-2 tie in the Rangers' six-run sixth inning and making a sliding catch in the outfield for the final out that preserved a 6-2 win.

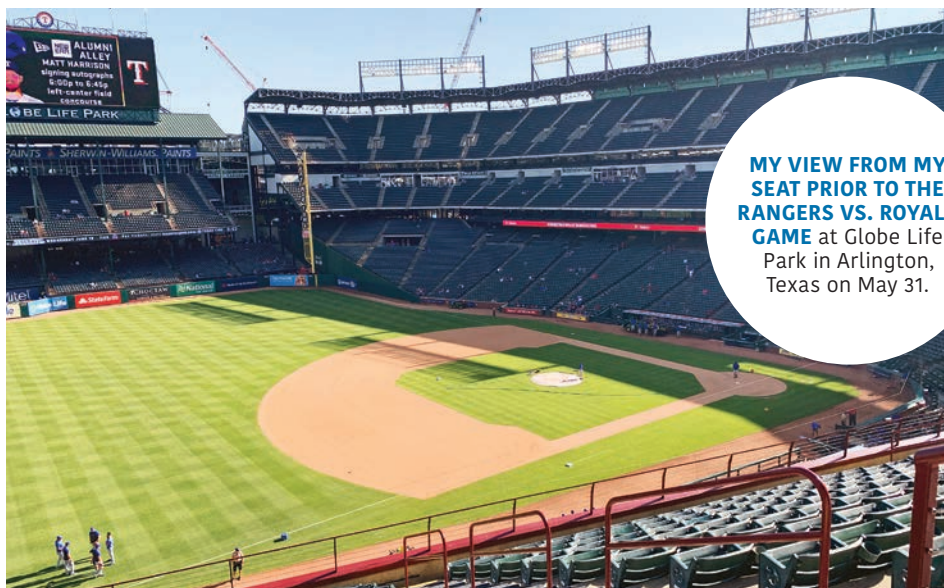
Following the game, I returned to the hotel — after getting stuck in a nice traffic jam — and got ready for an 11-hour car trip to St. Louis to see the rivalry game between the Cardinals and Chicago Cubs.

I arrived in fine shape, but about an hour later, the skies opened up and dumped rain fast and hard. Naturally, my instinct was to start praying I wouldn't get the game for Sunday washed out. The skies cleared overnight and the day at Busch Stadium turned out to be awesome.

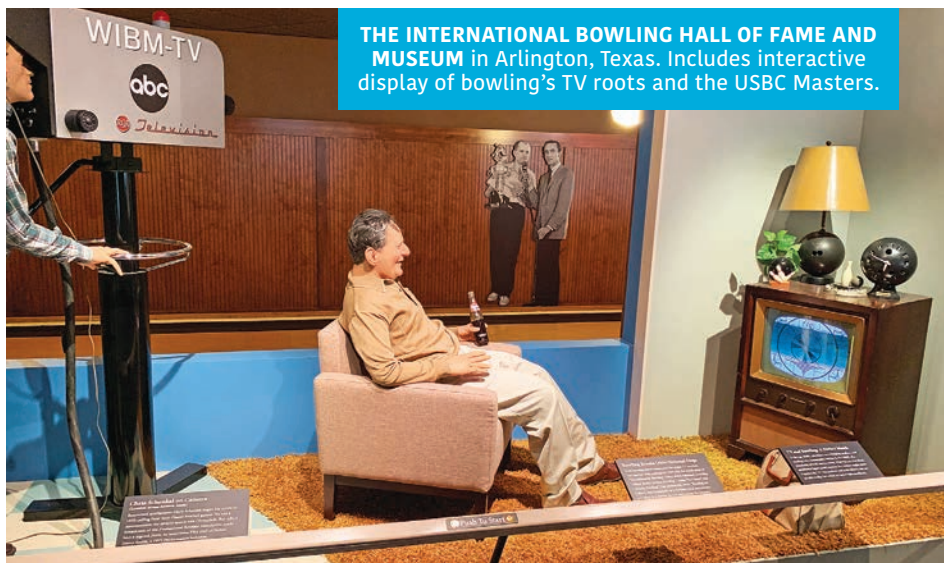
Word of advice: You can find parking at lots throughout downtown, and most are a short walk to the park's gates, the entrance of which is known as Ballpark Village. Along the sidewalk toward the gates in right field, there are a series of bricks that share pieces of the team's history. You can't help but stop and look.

One piece of advice: While tickets are pricier at Busch because the Cardinals are a consistently good draw, there's no need to get a parking pass online. I did. I made a \$33 mistake, but I'll live.

The game turned out to be an interesting pitcher's duel. Cardinals

starter Adam Wainwright couldn't find the plate at times, but his defense bailed him out of several tight spots with three double plays that killed Cubs threats. Wainwright walked seven but struck out eight in eight innings and allowed only two hits in a 126-pitch effort.

Closer Jordan Hicks left a mess on the table as the Cubs scored once in the top of the ninth, but John Grant got the final two outs of a 2-1 Cardinals win that completed a series sweep.

Once the final out was recorded, there was no need to hustle away. I took in the Cardinals Hall of Fame and Museum located in Cardinals Nation, which is on the second floor of the building outside the center-field gates. Admission is \$12, and the history lessons are more than worth the price of admission.

Two cities down, five to go. More to come next week as the journey continues.

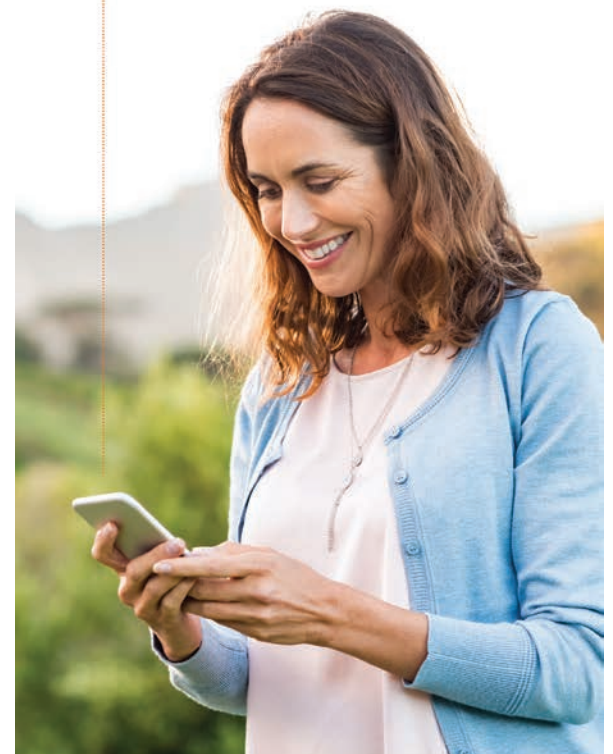

## Apple-Cranberry Cobbler

Recipe courtesy of Wilton

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 5 apples, peeled, cored and cut into 1/2-inch thick slices
- 1 1/2 cups fresh or frozen cranberries
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 container (10.2 ounces) refrigerated home-style biscuits, quartered
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 2 tablespoons sparkling sugar

Heat oven to 375 °F.

Prepare pie pan with nonstick cooking spray.

In large bowl, mix apple slices, cranberries, lemon juice and vanilla extract.

In small bowl, whisk sugar, cornstarch and cinnamon. Stir into fruit mixture.

Spoon mixture into prepared pan. Cover with foil. Bake on cookie sheet 40-45 minutes. Remove from oven.

Toss biscuits in melted butter. Distribute cut biscuits over fruit.

Sprinkle biscuits with sparkling sugar. Return to oven and bake 18-20 minutes. Remove from oven.

Let cool 15 minutes before serving.
