# FATAL PLANE CRASH IN CEDAR CITY

Early last Sunday morning, Cedar Communication was advised of an aircraft in distress 5 miles south of the Cedar City Regional

Airport. A few moments later, Cedar Communications was advised of an airplane which had crashed. It appears the aircraft struck a communications tower which is approximately 300 feet tall near 6500 W 4000 S, Cedar City.

Cedar City Fire Department, Gold

Cross Ambulance, Utah Highway Patrol and Iron County Sheriff's Office responded to the scene. Two adult males were located and pronounced dead at the scene. One is a 52-year-old male and the other is a 63-year-old male. Neither are from the Iron County

area. The NTSB and FAA has been notified and will be conducting an investigation.

The names of the victims are not being released at this time. Our thoughts and prayer are with the families of the victims at this time.

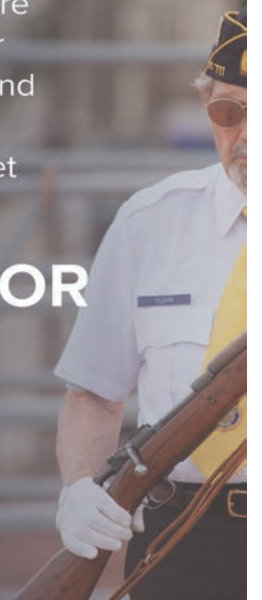

# Voters preparing for the poll position

It is only three months away from Election Day and in many states only two months away from voters casting early mail-in ballots. The polls are providing candidate preference numbers, intriguing fodder for news and political junkies.

The current surveys show Pres. Trump is in trouble. While incumbent presidents usually are granted a second term, Trump's prospects seem murky at best. Can he pull an upset and win? Of course he can – but the headwinds are brisk and unsettling.

As pointed out in this column numerous times, the “real election” occurs in a handful of states, not the country as a whole. There are not enough Democrats in North Dakota to fill a Little League baseball bleacher, and the chances that Republicans win in California are the same as Joe Biden selecting Sen. Mike Lee as his running mate. Texans will vote for Trump just as Oregonians will vote for Biden.

Trump won four years ago by squeaking out small victories in the normally Democratic bastions of Pennsylvania, Michigan, and Wisconsin while racking up slightly larger wins in Florida and Ohio, toss-up states. His problem in 2020 is that surveys show him trailing in the first three and barely surviving in the latter two.

Four years ago, the election was about Hillary. This year it's about Trump, not his opponent, and the only major voter blocs supporting him are white senior citizens

and the white male working class. If Biden even slices off 10% of Trump's support among these two groups, he waltzes into the White House.

While I personally thought Hillary

Clinton was one of the most qualified presidential candidates since the 1950s, a large swath of American voters disagreed. It is more difficult to send hate mail to Joe Biden, a seemingly nice guy with a working-class background who never received a handsome check from his daddy.

Republicans, of course, will say that the polls were wrong in 2016. But the current mood in America is more sour now than four years ago, and the Black Lives Matter movement will probably increase the turn-out of minority voters.

If you believe Trump will handily beat Joe Biden, answer this question: Do you know anybody who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016 but is voting for Donald Trump this year?

If so, Trump has a chance, but those voters must also reside in Michigan, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Florida, or Ohio.

## COVID-19/Legislative Update

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

These past few weeks I had the opportunity to read the history of my great-great grandparents, Thomas and Jane Vickers, who were early settlers of Nephi, Utah. Reading through the many difficulties that they faced from their emigration from England and Scotland to Utah, to raising and seeing children die, good crops and bad crops, illness, accidents, and living through the Depression, as well as many other trials, has helped put things in perspective for me with our current situation. I am grateful for my ancestors and many other pioneers who sacrificed so that I, my family and your families could have a better life. Now we need to navigate through this crisis so that our future families will also have a better life to look forward to.

As our state is still working to slow the spread of COVID-19 and return to a more normal way of life, we are headed in the right direction. Currently, Utah has the second-lowest unemployment rate in the nation, one of the lowest fatality rates in the country, and, while cases have increased, hospitalizations have remained relatively stable and are decreasing. In a recent health department message from Dr. Dave Blodgett of the Southwest Utah Public Health Department, he indicated that we are definitely seeing a downward trend in cases and hospitalizations in southwest Utah, too. These positive signs are encouraging as we continue to work together to overcome COVID-19

On Friday, July 31, the Utah Department of Health reported 631,309 total COVID-19 tests administered, 40,196 total positive cases, 28,130 estimated recovered cases, 2,377 total hospitalizations, 213 current hospitalizations and 304 total fatalities. The Southwest Utah Public Health Department reported 2,855 total positive cases including 28 new cases, 2,141 total recovered cases, 12 currently hospitalized and 24 total fatalities. Iron County

has 500 current cases; Beaver has 26 and Washington has 2,233 cases.

During Gov. Herbert's weekly COVID-19 briefing, Dr. Angela Dunn answered a series of questions individuals had from around the state about COVID-19. You can watch it at Governor Herbert's Facebook page. Gov. Herbert also issued an executive order adopting version 4.9 of the Phased Guidelines. The updates provide guidance for restaurants operating 24 hours per day and restaurants with buffet service. The order will remain in effect until August

7. The Legislature allocated \$25 million in CARES Act funding for a new COVID-19 Impacted Businesses Grant Program. The 'Shop in Utah' initiative began accepting applications yesterday and will provide grants to businesses negatively impacted by COVID-19.

It is hard to believe that we are already in August! This month we will see our students return to school during what is certainly a historic year. Our local school districts have led out in determining how to resume school in the

fall. I'm grateful to our school districts and our educators for working hard to create a variety of educational options for our students during this difficult time. The Utah Department of Health, in collaboration with the Utah State Board of Education, created a manual that will help parents, teachers and schools open safely and stay open during the 2020-21 school year. # Runner assaulted on trail in Cedar

On her way back to the parking lot a man hiding next to the trail jumped out and hit her in the head with a rock, knocking her to the ground. The women got back on her feet and escaped with only minor injuries. The attacker has been described as a male in his early forties, tall and skinny, shoulder length brown hair, wearing tan cargo shorts and a blue/white medical grade facemask.

Iron County Sheriff detectives are asking for help from anyone who frequently uses this trail, possibly lives nearby, or has seen a person in that area matching the above description to contact the Iron County Sheriff Office at 435-867-7500.

# A fun-filled Final Friday Art Walk

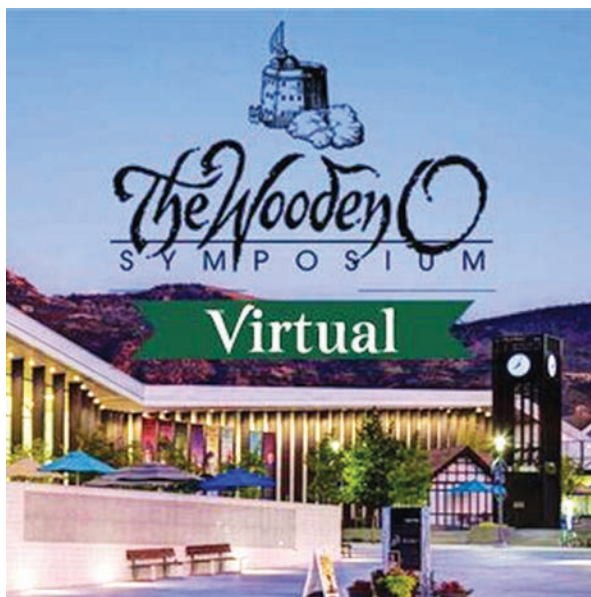

## Wooden O Symposium moves online for 2020

Scholars from across the United States and beyond will be gathering online August 3–4 for the nineteenth annual Wooden O Symposium sponsored by the Utah Shakespeare Festival and Southern Utah University. The topic of this year's symposium will be, appropriately, Shakespeare: Story and Adaptation. Now in its nineteenth year, the Wooden O Symposium is a cross-disciplinary conference exploring Medieval through Early Modern Studies through the text and performance of Shakespeare's plays.

The actors panel will feature Festival actors Betsy Mugavero, Quinn Mattfeld, and René Thornton Jr.

After the symposium, selected articles will be published in *The Journal of the Wooden O*. The journal is published annually by Southern Utah University Press in cooperation with the SUU Center for Shakespeare Studies and the Festival.

# RED ROCK FILM FEST PASSES GO ON SALE TODAY

Red Rock Film Club members and locals were given first choice of new films coming to the 14th Annual Red Rock Film Festival even though passes and ticket packages go public today, Wednesday, August 5.

Every year the Festival sells passes early for locals and members. Locals Passes went on sale Monday which is only open to residents of Utah. Registration is stressed this year with safety measures.

Festival Director Matt Marxteyn said, "In light of Covid-19, we encourage creating a ticket account now which is crucial to selecting your films later as a pass or package holder. We are trying to avoid people at the ticket counter at the last minute, which is why we are stressing online ticket sales."

Red Rock audiences can look forward to the Festival's long history of premieres and being the first to see a new film. Last year the Festival screened several film premieres such as Audience Award winner made in Southern Utah, "Links of Life" and Aglet Winner, "Galore" among others. Even older films such as its multi-award winner "Big Fish" (2018) is just now qualifying for an Academy Award this year.



The Festival is keeping it simple for locals with the Locals Pass which grants them access to over 50 films plus virtual access to a selection of films via a special online portal. Previously this was only available to the film industry. Several changes are also going in effect with types of screenings and new ticket packages.

Whereas the passes can include dozens of films, panel

discussions and priority access over a weekend or duration of the Festival, ticket packages are sold as a book of 5-10 vouchers that can be exchanged for a ticket.

The Festival's Orientation Screenings are being limited to sponsors, Film Club members and special promotions with the Briefs moving to 10-minute programs, and the new Boxers programs filling the 30-minute slot. Long-Johns are still full-length features.

Expecting more than 100 films, the Festival organization is also treating the main Festival and its Market as two separate events with their own tickets — the VIP Pass will grant access to both events. The Red Rock Film Festival will occur in Cedar City November 4-7 with headliners, premieres, competition films and panels. The RFM Conference is scheduled for St. George November 10-14 with non-competitive films, and seminars. # Self-Actualization of your Community!

## BUILDING MAIN STREET, NOT WALL STREET

Mother Teresa once said, "I alone cannot change the world, but I can cast a stone across the waters to create many ripples." To change a community, how might we learn from Mother Teresa and "Maslow's - Hierarchy of Needs"? Can this quote and Maslow apply equally to a community just as it might apply to each of us individually?

Maslow indicates we must meet the lower level of individual needs such as food, shelter and so forth before we can climb to the higher levels of the pyramid. I would suggest a community might likewise strive to first meet the basic needs of their citizens. Those community needs are much the same as individual needs. Instead of food, we strive for basic amenities such as police and fire. In lieu of basic shelter, it might be the ability to offer affordable housing. Those are but a couple basic entry points for a successful community. In other words, provide inexpensive ways for people to survive within your community by meeting their basic community needs. But just as Maslow taught, those are only short term, simple or basic needs; we should always strive for much loftier goals.

The real end game for the community is to achieve self-actualization by reaching the top level of the pyramid. That level is where you have the wishes of your heart's desire. Translated in community terms, that means higher wage opportunities that attract our younger generations. It means good roads, great parks and gathering places, local and unique shopping experiences and restaurants. Of course, the higher you go up the pyramid, the greater economic vitality that follows. As they say, rising water raises all the ships in the harbor, this is true of your community's vitality as well.

Unfortunately, too many communities are stuck on the lower levels of the pyramid. This can be due to various reasons, some controllable and some not quite as controllable. The lower end of Maslow's pyramid was never meant to be the end game and is a very short-term view or vision. We are only meant to pass through that portion of the pyramid on the way to the top of the pyramid, which comes with a much greater quality of life. How do communities come to realize the ultimate goal of self-actualization? We must first realize the real economic threats to our communities. By doing so, we can alter the course or path that we may be on. Many small towns are withering and dying as hyper-local businesses shut their doors giving way to big boxes, chains and online options. In the future, it won't only be smaller communities

withering, they will be joined by mid-sized communities that have failed to understand the true economic threats brewing on the horizon. These trends have only accelerated the past few months in the age of Covid.

The lower portion of Maslow's pyramid when referring to communities is the big boxes, chains and online options. Those assets are certainly needed to firm up the bottom of the pyramid, but will never move your community to self-actualization. Communities must understand to achieve community self-actualization, they must seek ways to capture hyper-local revenue from locally owned and operated businesses that will ultimately power the community forward. We must realize that local dollars spent at non hyper-local entities, while necessary at times, carry a 3-7X lower return or impact to their community than dollars spent at hyper-locally owned and operated businesses. Without understanding the real economic return on those hyper-local dollars, communities often make financial decisions that have long-term dire economic consequences.

Dollars spent hyper-locally are the life-blood of our community; it must flow freely to help maintain full health. The more wounds (non hyper-local spending) we have in our economic blood flow, the weaker our community immune systems become. Many communities fail to have a well-balanced economic eco-system that balances and provides equal incentives and so forth for local entrepreneurs. Without this equal emphasis on hyper-local business, the outflow of economic blood becomes economically stifling and the community slowly dies as city governments have less and less of a revenue base to work with each passing year.

The growing onslaught of online consumer options is getting even more competitive. With cities courting more and more big box and chains that move those valued local dollars to Wall Street rather than Main Street, they risk being out of balance and falling into the economic trap. Building the hyper-local business base is the only way out of what some refer to as the community death spiral. Shopping Truly-Local isn't simply a nice thing to do; it is essential for your city to survive in the future.

## Reds look to move up Region 9 ladder

# EVERYTHING OLD CAN BE NEW AGAIN

The high school football season is nine days away. In a prior universe, this may have been taken as a normal thing, something for athletes and parents to get excited over as they start up one of the annual rituals that mark the start of another school year.

But the 2020 season has a lot of curiosity and intrigue behind it as COVID-19 continues to tear through the fabric of what was once considered “normal.”

The good news here is that Cedar and Canyon View haven't been affected all that much when it comes to its football schedules. The Reds have their original schedule in tact that starts next Friday against Spanish Fork, but the Falcons had to look for two replacements when Nevada schools were forced to cancel all fall sports.

CV will welcome 2A schools Grand and Enterprise on Aug. 21 and 28.

Now comes the interesting part. Speaking with Cedar head football coach Josh Bennett last week, he expressed confidence that things will go somewhat smoothly when the Reds play their opener against the Dons.

Health checks are already in place for the players and visiting teams will do theirs before they get on the bus to travel. Fans and media will be temperature-checked prior to entry and mask wearing is highly recommended, although there is no set criteria as of this writing for how many fans will be allowed into the stands.

There is a full set of guidelines that was approved by the UHSAA on July 28 and can be found online at uhsaa.org. Among the other Region 9 programs that had to change schedules, Pine View will not play its opener at Ridgeline, but at Westlake High in Saratoga Springs. Cache County prohibited overnight travel for teams, forcing the move.

Dixie High lost a game against a team from Palm Desert when California pushed back all of its fall sports to next spring. The Flyers will have a bye week Aug. 28 as a result.

As for the national side...let's just say Major League Baseball is operating in chaos mode at the moment.

With no bubble in place, teams are traveling between cities with results that are getting uglier by the day. The Miami Marlins have already seen 18 of its 30 players on the roster sidelined by COVID.

That's exactly 60 percent, and that's insane. The team had to shut down for a full week, but was scheduled to return to play Monday at Baltimore.

The St. Louis Cardinals have had at least four players test positive and that has cost two games of their series against the Milwaukee Brewers. In a related item, Brewers center fielder Lorenzo Cain opted out of his 2020 season last week when he got news of the developments.

Cain will forgo an estimated \$5.9 million in salary he was scheduled to receive in this truncated season.

And let's talk about Commissioner Rob

Manfred for a moment, shall we? He went from threatening to pull the plug on the season July 31 if the outbreak isn't contained to this gem of a quote less than 24 hours later, as reported by [cbssports.com](http://cbssports.com):

“We are playing. The players need to be better, but I am not a quitter in general and there is no reason to quit now. We have had to be fluid, but it is manageable,” Manfred said in a tweet written by

Karl Ravech of ESPN.

Yikes, folks. It seems like no one's able to make up their minds here, and that's not good.

Progress has come slowly, and it's a good thing that our sports leagues are at least trying to make a concerted effort to return to play. When things are working as poorly as they are in Major League Baseball, it makes you wonder if the effort was really worth it.

It's better to be safe, even if it means sacrificing short-term losses for long-term enjoyment. Let's hope our high schools don't fall into the same trap MLB is facing now.

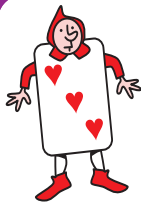

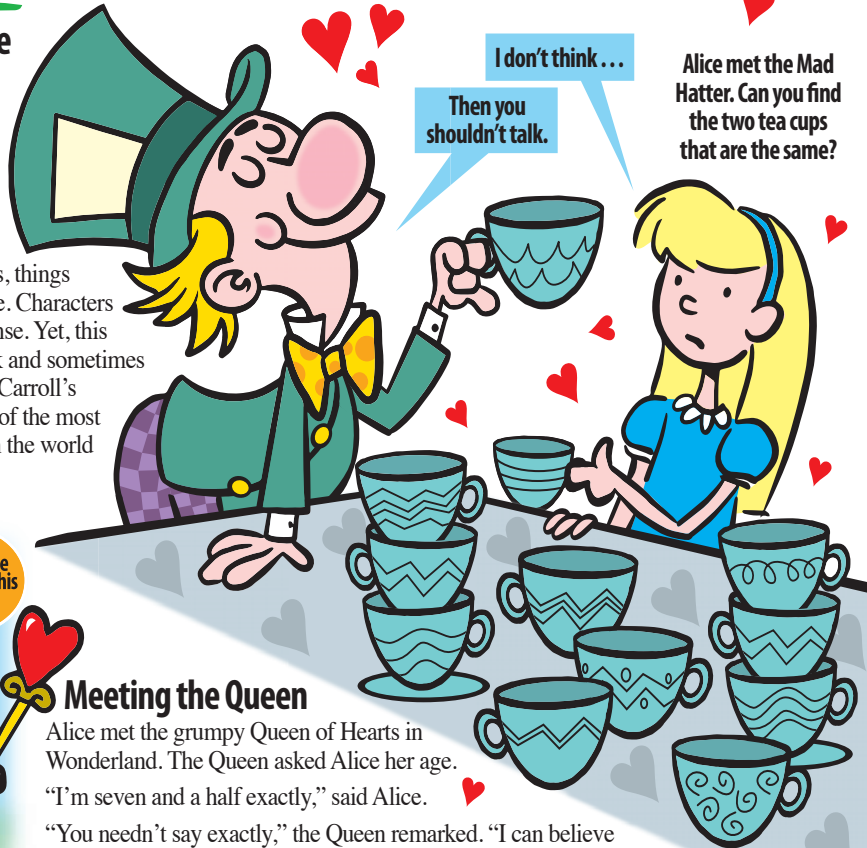
