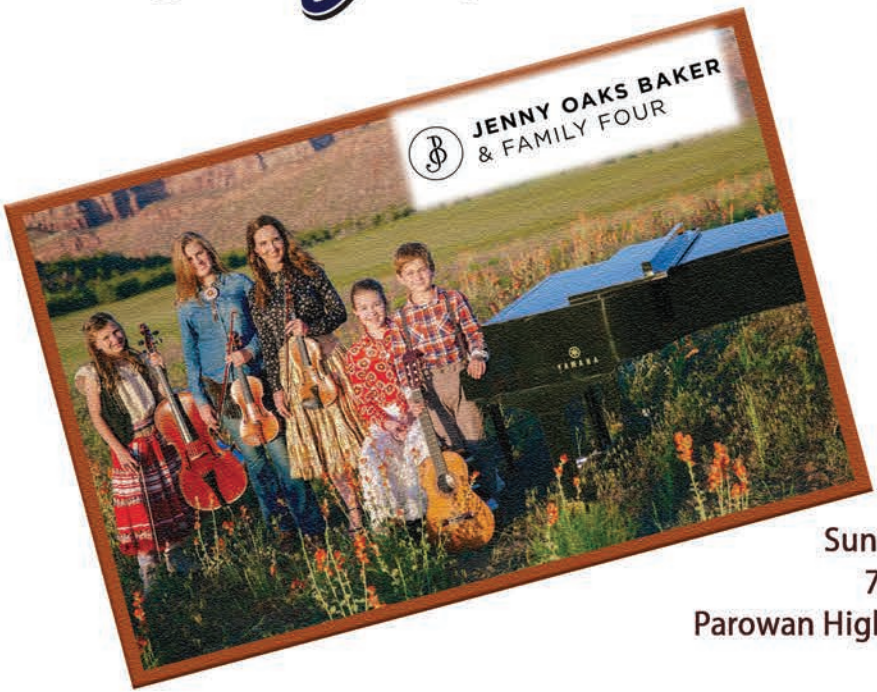

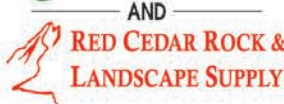

ALZHEIMER'S IN IRON COUNTY

DISEASE DISCUSSED AT INFORMATIONAL MEETING

Regional Manager for the Alzheimer's Association Mike Miller spoke last week at informational meeting to discuss the disease and encourage conversations.

Miller started by discussing the difference between dementia and Alzheimer's, explaining that Alzheimer's is a type of dementia and approximately 60 to 80 percent of dementia diagnoses are of Alzheimer's.

After a brief video with figures related to Alzheimer's and the intensive care required for patients with the disease, Miller said the Alzheimer's Association reached the two billion dollar milestone in money dedicated to research about the disease.

"We have reached the two billion dollar mark, being dedicated to

ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE IS NOT ONLY CONTINUING TO GET MORE ATTENTION, it's also getting more funding which means more breakthroughs and hopefully closer to finding a cure.

Alzheimer's research and just about eight or nine years ago it was only about 50 million dollars," he said. "Other big diseases like cancer and heart disease, HIV/AIDS, they've been at that two billion dollar mark for a number of years, they've seen breakthroughs in the research. In addition to looking at medicines that may help us with some of the ailments of the disease, we're also looking at lifestyle issues."

Miller showed another brief video that explains what Alzheimer's is: a

degenerative brain disease caused by abnormal protein fragments that accumulate in the brain and kill brain cells.

Miller also commented on the significant of getting a proper diagnosis of Alzheimer's so patients can be cared for properly and caregivers can understand how the disease will affect individuals.

"The behaviors are different with each type of dementia and the behaviors are helpful to be known for the caregivers and everybody in the family,

then they realize why they have to repeat five times where they're going or why somebody's all of the sudden wandering," he explained. "... Once the diagnosis has been made, then a caregiving plan comes into play."

Miller further discussed some of the behaviors associated with Alzheimer's, such as wandering and not sleeping through the night, as well as the importance of respite care for caregivers.

"If you try and be a caregiver 24/7, all of a sudden you need a caregiver yourself. It is a very time consuming and physically demanding job," Miller said. "You're on duty 24/7. ... You're physically trying to help your loved and you're getting barraged with all these mental challenges; stress, depression, lack of physical activity – the caregiver is all of a sudden under siege. Often, sadly to say, caregivers will pass away before their loved one."

He added that some of the things that can help reduce the risk of developing Alzheimer's are exercise, a well-rounded diet with little amounts

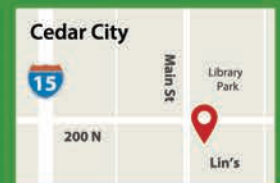

of processed foods, protecting the head from injuries, getting enough sleep and maintaining a systolic blood pressure of 120 or less.

Miller also encouraged those in attendance to be advocates and help inform others.

CAREGIVER SUPPORT GROUP COMING TO CEDAR

If you care for a person with Alzheimer's Disease or Dementia a caregiver support group will be available to you soon. Mike Miller, the regional manager for the Alzheimer's Association, and two group facilitators, John Donner and Famke Halma, prepared a presentation regarding the necessity for an Alzheimer's caregiver support group in Iron County.

Alzheimer's Disease is the sixth leading cause of death in the U.S. This

disabling disease is becoming more prevalent over time because our population is aging. 1 in 10 people over the age of 65 will show signs of the disease and 1 in 3 people over the age of 85 will show signs of Alzheimer's. There is currently no cure for this disease, only prescriptions that ease some of the symptoms. People as young as 30 years can have Alzheimer's. Typically, there are three unpaid caregivers per Alzheimer's patient.

According to Miller, "There is a certain amount of trauma in caregiving for Alzheimer's patients, unlike some other diseases Alzheimer's patients can forget who you are. Therefore, caregiving can be extremely difficult and stressful." 60% of caregivers for Alzheimer's patients report extreme stress and 36% of caregivers die before the Alzheimer's patient.

"Based on these statistics, there are multiple caregivers in this community going unnoticed and we hope to help and reach people in this community," said Famke Halma, a group facilitator with the Alzheimer's Association.

This Alzheimer's caregiver support group will be a confidential and educational group where people can share experiences they have had while caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's.

Cedar City Elections

I read Kristin Blake's article in the August 21st edition and I support her argument that we can do better than a 33% turnout rate. However, I have had an issue with elections in general for quite some time; is there really any such thing as a "non-partisan" elected position?

I consider myself to be fairly conservative. I just moved here 2 years ago and do not know the political positions of the folks that run for these offices. The best information that could be found online or in the papers, typically consisted of a 1 paragraph statement by the person running for office. In the mail I received 1 political ad from Mr. Dahlin, and of course it told me nothing about his views, whether liberal or conservative.

I can think of only 1 logical reason that a candidate would not declare his party affiliation and that would be to deceive the voters or at best confuse them. Who determines that any elected position is "non-partisan"? I strongly disagree with this, even (and perhaps especially) in the case of judgeships. Seeing what transpires in the Supreme Court, regional circuit courts (9th circuit of California), and state courts, no one can convince me that judges are non-partisan.

I voted, but I didn't feel satisfied that I selected the best candidates because I had no idea of who they were or what they stood for politically.

Lil Nas X Marks the Spat

Who knew that the controversy of Summer 2019 would be swirling around the definition of country music? Sure, the debate could have been immigration, the skyrocketing deficit, the cost and availability of health care of the devastating impact of opioids.

But look who is on the cover of last week's Time magazine: A red-suited gay black man wearing shimmering earrings and a cowboy hat. While he is not the face of country music, the 20-year old Lil Nas X has set a new entertainment record while ruffling feathers of country music DJs and millions of the genre's fans.

It all started four months ago when Lil Nas X, a fledgling rap music artist, released a country-tinged song called "Old Town Road." If you haven't heard it, you've been on a sabbatical to Mars. It is now the longest running number one song in music history, topping the Billboard charts for 19 weeks and has been streamed by fans more than one billion times.

The lyrics are hokey ("Riding on a horse, you can whip your Porsche") and many die-hard country fans dismiss the tune as a mockery of their beloved music. Many radio DJs agree and have refused to play the song, but it hasn't hurt its popularity even though the country score and the remix with Billy Ray Cyrus is being snubbed at the Country Music Awards.

Country's definition has always been slippery. Johnny Cash recorded songs from punk bands ("Hurt", "Rusty Cage") and Waylon Jennings covered the Rolling Stones ("Honky Tonk Woman") while a country song like "Me and Bobby McGee" became raucous rock 'n roll with Janis Joplin. Taylor Swift moved from slight pop country to dynamite pop whereas her contemporary, Colbie Caillat has moved from Top 40 to the lead singer of a country band. Even though country has its roots in folk music, country veteran Charlie Rich took a match to

the CMA Award's envelope when folkie John Denver was named Entertainer of the Year in the mid-1970s.

Country music started as the voice of rural America and blue-collar urban workers, but a Brad Paisley or Keith Urban concert today attracts as many people wearing Nordstrom labels as those wearing Wranglers. Even the themes have changed. "Don't come home a-drinking with loving on your mind" is old school compared to today's lyrics about veterans or spending lazy afternoons at the lake with an old-fashioned whiskey and a misty-eyed brunette.

Politics have also changed. Today's male country singers tend to side with Republican Party beliefs while the women (Marin Morris, Kacey Musgraves, etc.) live in the more liberal political camp. While Hank Williams Jr. rebukes liberals and

questions their patriotism, his son, Hank William III, sits on an opposite branch. Even the late Merle Haggard whose "Okie from Muskogee" became a conservative tribute and admitted he was voting for Hillary Clinton.

It is hard to take a side on the Lil Nas X controversy. Granted, just putting on a cowboy hat doesn't make a country singer, any more than Madonna's possessing a Book of Mormon would get her a Deseret Book appearance. Still, people like what they like, and if enough country fans pay to see Lil Nas X in concert, who cares if the song barely ranks in the Top 50 on the national country music charts?

If I had to guess, Lil Nas X will be a mere asterisk in music history, just like Sheb Wooley ("The Purple People Eater"), Tiffany, or Milli Vanilli. Americans have short attention spans, but it's nice to have a controversy in which so many people can take sides. Otherwise, we would have to argue about tariffs.

Cedar Council discusses new ice rink plans

At last week's city council meeting Dallin Staheli, General Manager of Staheli West, presented his new plan for the ice rink.

Staheli stated that the ice rink would be relocated to the west side of the property in relation to the Aquatic center.

According to Staheli, the building will be constructed with a steel frame and coated with stucco textured insulated panels.

In accordance with the original design, the facility will have an ice sheet with a roof, walls on the south, west and east sides and grand windows that look out into the parking lot.

Staheli stated that the facility will have the necessities such as a lobby area with a front desk, a skate rental stand, locker rooms, storage areas and a concession stand. In addition, there will be restrooms and showers for visiting hockey teams.

Staheli then spoke about how

the ice rink will be a year-round multi-use facility. In the months from October to March, the facility will host standard ice activities such as hockey, figure skating, and curling. Whereas in the months from April to September, the facility will be converted into a roller rink which will host activities including roller skating, pickleball, and youth group activities.

"We think there is an awesome opportunity and a strong desire from the community to have more multi-use type activities," he said. "(Many) uses that could serve (many) different interests."

According to Staheli, the cost estimate of constructing the facility would come out to 5.7 million dollars. He proposed that the costs of construction be split fifty-fifty between the city and Staheli Recreation.

"We don't want to ask more from the city than we are willing to bring to the table ourselves," he said.

He then stated that Staheli Recreation would obtain their

portion in different forms such as donations, possible grants from private foundations, and a business loan if needed.

Staheli continued by discussing the plans after the facility is built. The building will be donated to the city before operating in it and the Staheli's would be responsible for the facility as well as its operations and maintenance. In return the city would maintain the parking lot.

Architect Mark Wilson then spoke about estimates.

"Cost estimates at this stage are usually quite conservative as far as making sure we don't underestimate the cost of the building," he said. "It is always much harder to go back and to ask for more money than it is to say we have overestimated the cost."

After Staheli and Wilson's remarks, City Councilman Scott Phillips expressed his feelings about the project.

"I think it's a great project and I want to see what we can do to help it (along)," he said.

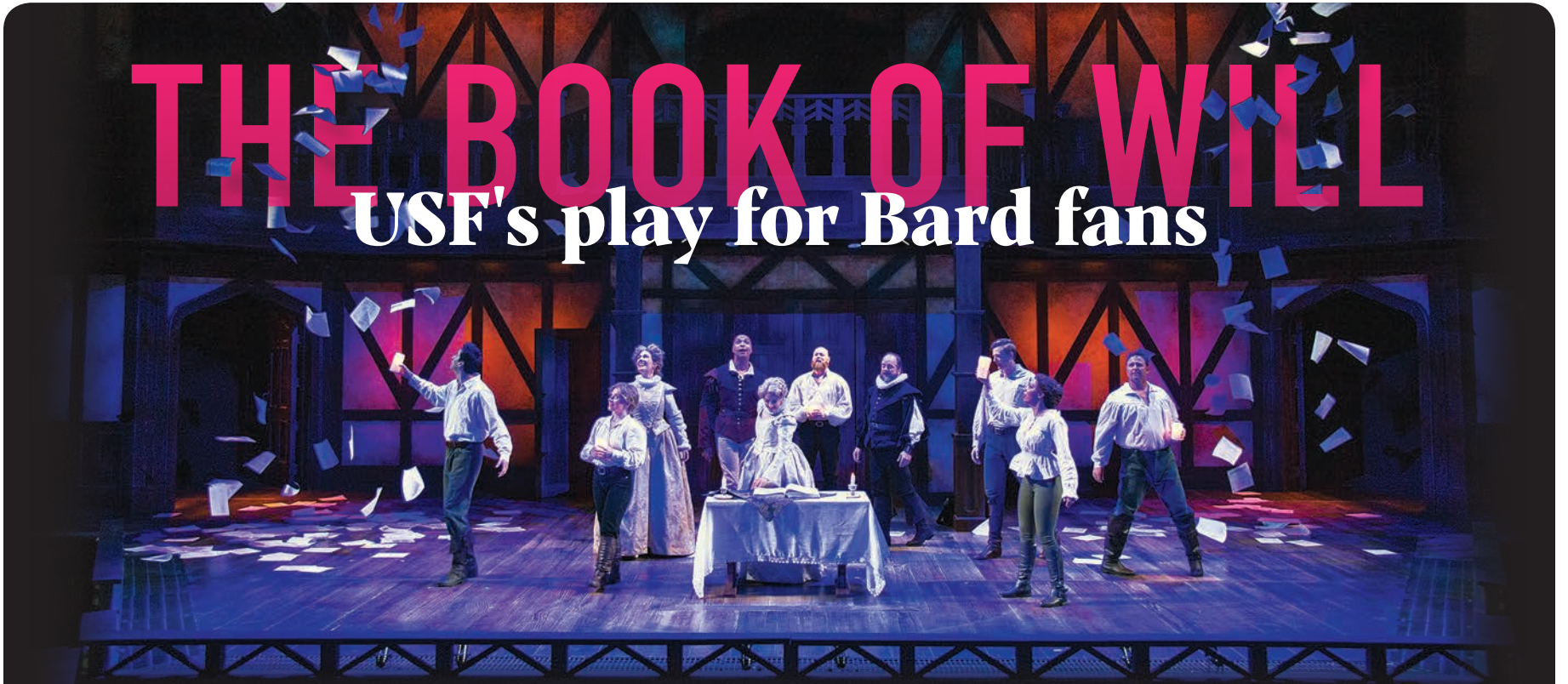

USF's play for Bard fans

A story for lovers of Shakespeare, Shakespeare nerds and lovers of the theatrical process – that is a good description for the ideal audience of Lauren Gunderson's play *The Book of Will* produced by the Utah Shakespeare Festival this season.

There is a serendipitous relevance to a play written by Gunderson, the most produced playwright of the 2017-2018 season, about the most produced playwright ever. So, of course, her homage to the bard strikes curiosity into theatre and bard fans. What will this contemporary playwright bring to the theatrical canon and how will the Utah Shakespeare Festival and Director Melinda Pfundstein unfold her work?

Three years after Shakespeare's death, his acting troupe, *The King's Men*, and their family and friends are horrified at the piracy of their beloved Bard's work which is being performed incorrectly on

stages across London. They hatch a plan to gather the scattered notes, quartos and plays into a folio that will be produced under Shakespeare's name. It is an undertaking that requires masterful planning, manipulation, searching, remembering and dedication as they search for funds, publishing rights

and their own memories for the words themselves.

As usual, and as all of the plays for the 2019 season, the stage and costumes are well designed. Apollo Mark Weaver has put together a simple but very authentic feeling early 17th-century tavern where we spend much of

our time during the play. David Kay Mickelson has designed rich, autumnal costumes for the cast.

This is not an action-packed play. Come prepared for a tamer story-telling experience. The first act is a lot of story building, talking and planning. However, this cast is packed with some fantastic performers who give their characters theatrical oomph. Rene Thornton Jr. gives his character Henry Condell a lot of personality and humor. He, along with Betsy Mugavero as Alice Hemings bring momentum to this portion of the play.

However, for those who need a little more action, emotion and drama I say have patience. The second act does bring all the feels in this play. One of the delights in this play is seeing Festival favorite, Chris Mixon play a very different role than his typical humorous role. It was great to see him as the serious and practical theatre manager, the dreamer, the

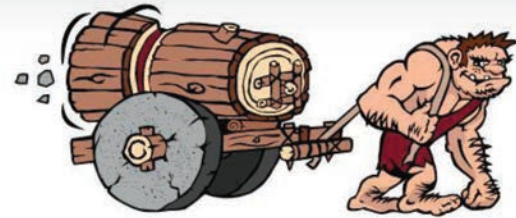

So, what are these wonders worth waiting for you wonder? It's an extensive, but not exclusive list. Graduation? A new car? Marriage? A family? A new career? I'm sure you already have examples of current pursuits that you wouldn't mind waiting for. Or, in the spirit of the more action oriented definition, that you wouldn't mind continuing to sacrifice your time, talents and treasures for.

Whatever you're waiting for, the difficulty is not so much in the waiting as it is that we often don't know how long we will have to wait. This can create a limbo or laziness that can add stress and worry to the weight of waiting. Remember to take things one day at a time. Whatever your goal is, pursue it with perseverance, passion and active patience. You can set time limits and dead-lines, but don't let them be your focus so much that you stop enjoying the journey.

While you're working on your wait-training regimen, remember to save time for the present. Even with all the roadblocks, red-lights and revisions, don't let your life pass you by in the meantime. If you can adjust your vision towards enduring the necessary evil of waiting, you will find more peace, not be broken in pieces. You will find ways to make the grass greener on your side of the fence and waste less time in between moments and miracles.

To those of you stuck in the rut of impatience, stop and make time—don't wait for it—to create a wait training program to help you get out and stay out of the ruts. Let the wait training begin and the gaining of joy through creating the life you've been waiting for.

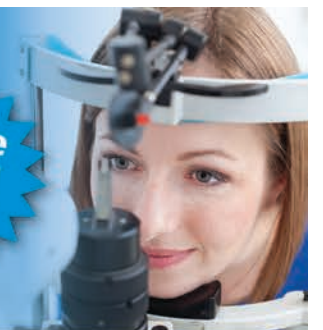

The Dukesne Eagles have been the kryptonite for the Parowan Rams football team of late. Two years of playoff defeats and one step short of a state title only added to the feeling. On Aug. 23, the Rams' frustration continued.

Skylar Ford and Kason Grant scored on third-quarter rushing touchdowns, and the Dukesne defense made it stand up down the stretch as the Eagles rallied for a 22-14 victory over Parowan in the final non-region tune-up

for both teams at Alma Richards Stadium.

"They had a couple of big plays and three ghost calls really killed us," Parowan head coach Carter Miller said. "When they got that safety, it was a totally different game. It starts to bother me a lot when we prepare our tails off and officials take over the game."

The Rams (1-1) had built a 14-6 lead as the second quarter began as Levi Saylor scored twice – once on a 5-yard run set up by a big Nate Goodman kickoff return and the second through a 45-yard TD pass from quarterback Hutch Miller.

Once the second half began, the Eagles would strike twice and seize control of the game, both scores coming as result of a short field.

With the completion of Week 2 of the 2019 high-school football season, there were a few surprises, ranging from Cedar being the lone Region 9 team to win in Week 1 to Snow Canyon's rally for a win against Las Vegas-area school Shadow Ridge on Friday night.

When the dust settled, it left three teams with 1-1 records – the Reds, the Warriors and Dixie – and five of the eight teams still searching for a first win.

This year, having at least one win heading to region play is a bigger deal mainly because of the arrival of the RPI. Cutting to the chase, having a win in the preseason bodes extremely well if you want to have a shot at making the 4A state playoffs come October.

Being 1-1 is big right now because it's good for a 40 percent count towards the RPI score when the first rankings come out from the UHSAA on Sept. 23. Region play adds another 40 percent to the total, so if a team like Cedar can at least split the next four games – three that will be at home to go with a cross-town trip to battle Canyon View – they should be in good shape to be in the top 16 and earn a postseason spot.

There are a total of 22 schools across three regions – 9, 10 and 11 – vying for the 4A playoffs. No more top-four in region required to get in. Just keep winning.

There are additional sports involved in the fall that will carry the RPI through the season, and initial rankings will be released a bit sooner, starting with girls soccer Sept. 5.

With new head coach Steve Newman, Canyon View earned a pair of non-region wins before dropping a tough 2-1 decision on the road at Hurricane. The Falcons have a different feel, approach and outlook that are showing in their play, and while they may not be a playoff contender just yet, Newman said CV will put a scare in a few teams as the season moves forward, including a pair of home games this week against Pine View and defending 4A champion Snow Canyon.

If there was ever a sucker bet

that worked its way to the baseball diamond, it came up last week when the Detroit Tigers were listed as a huge underdog against Justin Verlander and the Houston Astros.

The Tigers have been ridiculously bad all season long, but last week, they made the most out of the least and found a way to make a bet pay off handsomely.

Despite getting only two hits – one in the fifth inning and the other in the ninth – those solo homers by Ronny Rodriguez and John Hicks, respectively, proved to be good enough for a 2-1 Tigers win.

Detroit will probably lose 110 games or close to it, but we'll always have Aug. 21, 2019 as our shining light of future goodness.

spend time together as a team. Passing, fundamentals, footwork. Now it's a matter of getting them to believe they can do it, and this went a long way."



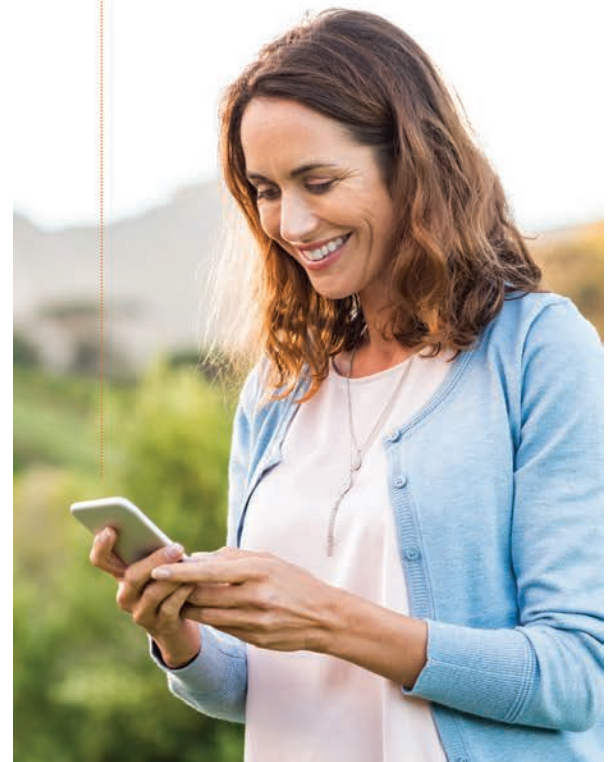
