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# SUU CELEBRATES 123<sup>RD</sup> COMMENCEMENT

Southern Utah University's 123rd commencement exercises took place last Friday, April 29th. A notable 2,309 graduated this year. The class of 2022 awarded 601 master's degrees, 1,504 bachelor's degrees, and 204 associate degrees. SUU's 2022 graduates come from 39 countries and 42 states, and

one U.S territory. Graduates ranged in age from 16 to 67 years old.

Graduates lined up bright and early to prepare for their march through the Carter Carillon Tower, signaling the end of an era at SUU. Following the Scarlet & Black Band the procession made their way down to SUU's America First

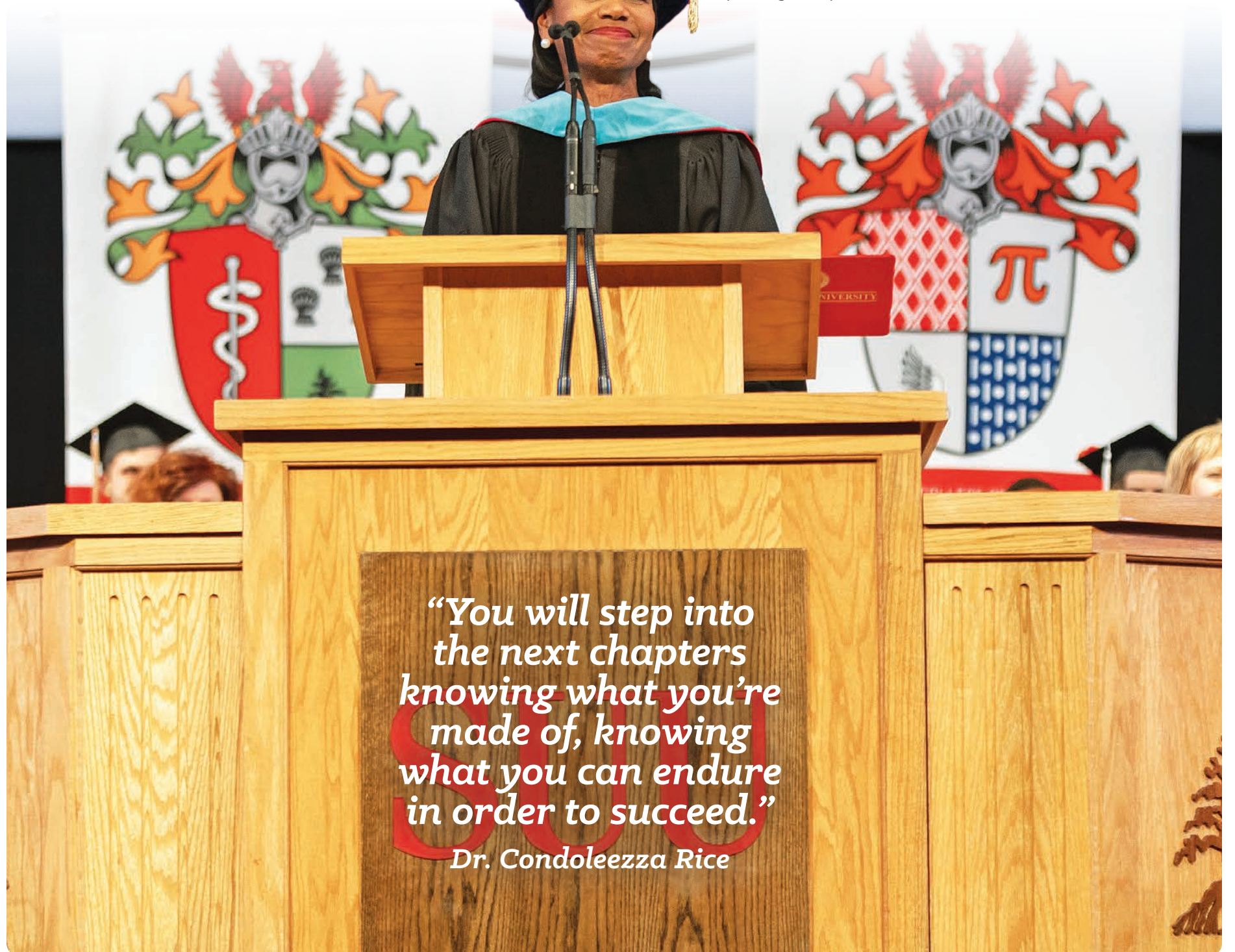
Event Center where the ceremonies continued.

University Interim President Mindy Benson addressed the audience, "Class of 2022, I hope you will always remember the joy, pride, and relief you are feeling today. You didn't get here alone, you were supported and encouraged by caring family, friends,

faculty, and staff. It takes all of us to get it done."

Benson reiterated the story of SUU's founding, relating the perseverance of the founders to that of the class of 2022. "Unprecedented times provide unprecedented lessons, because of your most unusual college experience you've learned to cope

with uncertainty and change. You've learned that you're not as in control as you thought, you've gained clarity in what is truly important to you... you've learned that you are so much stronger and resilient than you imagined."

Following a performance of Climb Ev'ry Mountain by SUU Choirs, the SUU student graduation address was given by Laurel Elizabeth Buxton. Buxton began a poetic and impassioned speech about her experience as an SUU student. "We are all ultimately storytellers, we exist in a world that does not need to be known but we, the curious do, that's why we go to school. Our disciplines whether they are in the world of business, visual arts, education, or any of the other 140+ programs here at SUU, they help us to see the world profoundly... this pursuit of understanding led us here."

After Laurel Elizabeth Buxton's speech, Honorary Doctorate degrees were awarded to Eric O. Leavitt, and Dr. Condoleezza Rice. SUU Interim President Mindy Benson then introduced 2022's Commencement Keynote speaker, Dr. Condoleezza Rice.

From 2005 to 2009, Dr. Rice served as the 66th U.S. Secretary of State, the second woman and first

black woman to hold the position. Rice also served as President George W. Bush's assistant to the president for national security affairs from 2001 to 2005. In addition to this, Dr. Rice also served as Stanford University's provost from 1993 to 1999.

Dr. Condoleezza Rice began a beautiful and witty speech by expressing her gratitude for all the faculty, staff, students at SUU, and for our annual sheep parade. "As a professor I'm always excited to see graduates meet this milestone, I'm aware of the hard work and dedication it takes to get to this moment, but for you the class of 2022, I am especially proud. The majority of your time here has been shaded beneath the cloud of a worldwide pandemic and it took a special kind of dedication and a special kind of perseverance within yourselves and with all who supported you to get to this moment. That perseverance will serve you well throughout your lives, you will step into the next chapters knowing what you're made of, knowing what you can endure in order to succeed."

Following Dr. Condoleezza Rice's speech, university Provost Dr. Jon Anderson, made the class of 2022 official by conferring degrees to all programs. Congratulations to Southern Utah University's Class of 2022!

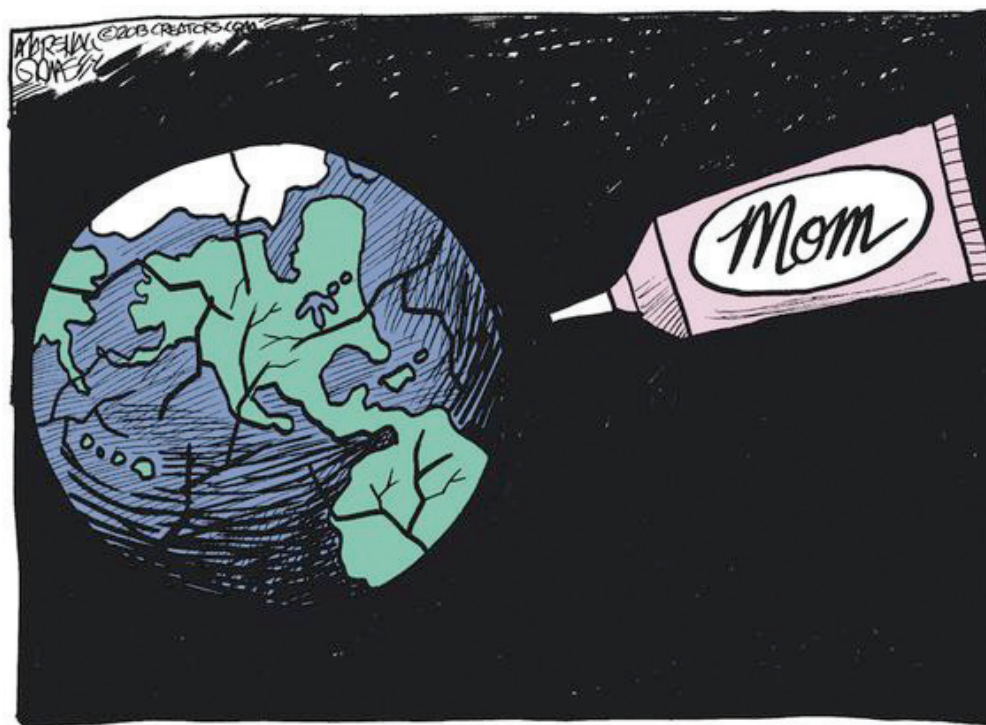

## The economy is not the enemy

It's an old saying: "Pay attention to what a person does, not what he says." This is currently applicable when we are talking about inflation.

Utah pollsters report that we are seriously worried about it. Gas prices are especially galling since we are daily reminded as we routinely drive past the Maverik and the Chevron stations, and we know that housing prices continue spiraling even though it doesn't directly impact us unless we are buying or selling. And then there's the trip to the grocery store; golly, we'll have to cut back on pickle spears this week!

The polls say that Utahns

believe the economy – the entire financial world – is preying upon them. They blame government spending. They fear a recession.

Ironically, their spending is the major component of the thing they worry about: inflation! As the Pogo comic strip once noted, "We've seen the enemy – and it is us!"

KSL-Radio recently reported how inflation has affected the cost of a cheeseburger (lettuce up 12%, mayonnaise up 14%, etc.). But ask the counter guy at Burger King if customers are cutting back on Whoppers with cheese.

National reports say inflation may be costing families \$700 more a month, but the restaurants that I visit are doing quite well. ("Reservations for Thursday night at 6 p.m.? Sorry, but we're full until 7:30.) Yes, the cost of bacon

is up 17% and the avian bird flu has boosted up the price of eggs. But the owner of my weekday break-

# The hidden cost of losing your local newspaper

It was reported by Dylan Walsh that since the turn of the century, nearly 2000 communities across the United States have lost their local newspaper. Additionally, he indicated that 6% of all counties in the United States are unserved by a local newspaper. The reasons are numerous. Depending on the market, some of those reasons might include declining advertising revenue, changing reader habits, political leanings, busy lifestyles, and the list goes on. These reasons will be argued in many circles for years. Regardless of the reason, it is ultimately the community that ends up getting the short end of the stick in these situations.

Dylan's piece comes from a study by Michael Sinkinson, Assistant Professor of Economics at Yale University. In this study, he indicates, "among other things, they serve to keep people informed about corruption and misdeeds among their elected officials, and often break stories with wider reverberations; a small paper in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, revealed the Penn State sexual abuse scandal, for instance. And as local news fades, local politics becomes increasingly nationalized—which, other researchers have found, contributes to political polarization."

He goes on to say, "High-quality journalism is very expensive, and newspapers are competing with other forms of media that are low-cost to operate and free to distribute," he says. "I wish that people valued the local press more than they do."

I would like to add to this information from another study conducted at Notre Dame. In this study, they found in communities that lost their local newspaper, the cost of their local government increased 30% in less than five years. Of course, this is directly indicative of not having a watchdog that holds government feet to their fiscal fire. As they say, "When the cat is away, the mice will play."

Aside from the governmental financial issues

found by Notre Dame, there are many other impacts to a community when they lose that valuable community resource.

The local newspaper is oftentimes the voice of that community to the outside world. They tell the tale of the community in ways that cannot be told in other ways. When companies look to relocate or even start-up in a community, they often go to the community newspaper as it is often the only source of accurate and viable information about the vibrancy of the community. When a community loses that resource, a google search can often lead those looking toward the negative traits about a community because those are the reports that get posted on Facebook, other social media sites, regional news outlets, and so forth.

It should also be noted that newspaper readers are more civically engaged, more likely to vote, more likely to volunteer, and more likely to support local causes.

On the other hand, newspapers must earn the trust and respect of their local communities. They can do this by representing the make-up of the com-

munity. They can do this by supporting those things that benefit the community such as local businesses, Chambers, Main Streets, civic clubs etc. While they must maintain their journalistic integrity, the local newspaper should be the community's biggest advocate and cheerleader. The local newspaper can change the dynamic of a community with strong leadership, strong participation, and powerful vision. A newspaper that exemplifies these traits becomes a community treasure, a treasure to be valued and kept at all costs.

Today's column is for both the community and the newspaper. Communities and newspapers that truly understand how to work together can forge miracles and unbeatable synergies from which great things will occur. When these two entities build a foundation based on trust, vibrancy, and vision, there is nothing that can hold them back. My challenge, if you haven't built this foundation, it is never too late to start. Start now and reap the future rewards which are sure to come.

# An emergency emerges, threatens safety in Iron County – Part 3

It is no longer clear whether Interstate 15 should be called the Fentanyl Freeway or the Heroin Highway. Illegal drugs are so mixed up and deadly these days that all we know is that we should be prepared for anything and that we should never stop on the interstate or other highways to help someone. We don't know if a person stopped by their car is someone really in need or a highwayman looking to take lethal advantage of a good Samaritan. It's best to call 911 dispatch and let the trained troopers and their K-9 officers sniff out the problem. Daily, these detection detectives determine who to stop and arrest for drug trafficking with thousands and even hundreds of thousands of fentanyl pills coming over the open southern border to kill American citizens.

In two previous articles, Lieutenant Randy Riches of the Utah Highway Patrol, Iron County Sheriff Ken Carpenter, and Cedar City Chief of Police Darin Adams were interviewed because they supervise the officers

who are the sentries who protect us when serious, unexpected, and dangerous situations occur and require immediate action. We can rely on them and the officers they supervise night and day to protect our communities and families. A sheriff in Milton, Florida, has been recorded telling the residents of his community that they are more than welcome to shoot burglars; in other words, we all need to be pre-

pared to protect ourselves and families within the law because law officers cannot be everywhere at all times.

Cedar City Chief Darin Adams has also expressed the following: 1) Make sure to alert the police when you see suspicious behavior suggesting drug use or drug transactions taking place and do not confront those individuals by yourself; 2) If you have family members or others you know who

are involved in any fashion in drug related activities, police officers can help by directing those individuals to help whether medical or psychological; 3) All community members are encouraged to speak or write to their elected state and federal representatives and share their concerns so that legislation is created to provide harsher consequences to those who traffic, transport, and sell the dan-

gerous drugs coming through open borders along the national interstate system and then via Interstate 15 into Iron County.

Before you determine which candidate for office you are going to vote for in the coming election, please tell the candidates that they must take a position on southern border protection and stopping the illicit deadly drugs being driven over the

U.S. interstate highway system. # Cedar City encourages voluntary water irrigation restriction schedule

The Cedar City Council has approved a new Voluntary Water Irrigation Restriction Schedule (Resolution No. 22-041301), requesting the community's help to limit culinary water use for irrigating based on house address:

- » *Monday, Wednesday and Fridays:*  
Even-numbered addresses shall water before 8:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m.
- » *Tuesday, Thursday and Saturdays:*  
Odd-numbered addresses shall water before 8:00 a.m. and after 6:00 p.m.
- » *No irrigation on Sundays*

This effort has been made to get ahead of the dry, summer months and is one of the many ways Cedar City is encouraging conservation to address the region's water crisis. Members of the City Council voted in favor of the Resolution to approve the voluntary restriction schedule at the April 13th, 2022, City Council meeting, after City staff presented on the topic at the April 6th meeting.

This schedule applies to all who use culinary water, including city facilities, and is effective immediately through September 30th, 2022. Exemptions to this Resolution would include City facilities, public facilities, and individuals that utilize secondary water for irrigation purposes. The Cedar City Water Division may grant an exemption to those that have planted new sod or seed for a two-week period from the date of planting. Please contact the Water Division to place this request if planting new sod or seed by calling (435) 586-2968.

The new voluntary restriction schedule is in addition to the annual mandatory irrigation restrictions per City Ordinance 37-7.1, restricting culinary water use between 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., which is not optional and is enforced by officials through October 31st, 2022.

"Our community is known for coming together when times are tough," said Cedar City Water Division Superintendent, Robbie Mitchell. "We are looking for voluntary participation in this effort to conserve water on your scheduled day, which will give our basins more time to fill up every week."

On July 1st, 2022, the City will implement a marginal rate increase for both industrial and residential culinary water users. After nearly 10 years with no rate increases, the tiered rate increase structure is also meant to encourage conservation by rewarding those who use less water with a lower bill each month.

Cedar City would like to thank the community for their awareness and effort to come together to conserve our water resources for today, tomorrow, and our future generations, and is committed to addressing the region's drought with researched and practical solutions.

fast spot has seen no decrease in people ordering omelets and bacon sandwiches.

As for coffee, he increased the price 40 cents per cup last month, yet his customers are not decaffeinating.

Airlines have boosted the price of flights, yet Delta reported last week that sales increases are at historic highs...Those long lines at the Swig haven't gone down. Folks are still rewarding themselves with an overpriced Diet Coke with a splash of lime...One would think people could easily reduce their clothing purchases, but the stock price of Lululemon (where you have to take out a second mortgage to buy yoga pants) is sitting close to a new high.

In my own field of work, we have more new printing orders this month than I can ever recall despite rising prices due to the unavailability of many printing papers. Disneyland increased its resort prices, yet no one I know is cancelling their visit to the happiest place on earth. Visit a car dealer, and chances are you will be put on the waiting list for a \$60,000 truck.

I'm not saying that inflation isn't a problem and I assume some people are reducing their travel when they see the price at the gasoline pump. But the Federal Reserve rate increases will tamp down on overheated economy, and most economists see inflation leveling off at about 5% by the end of the year.

So stop all the hand-wringing. Today's inflation is not the Black Plague and, from what I see at the restaurants, airports, and shopping malls, the economy is humming along just fine, thank you.

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## public & health

### Cedar Breaks Scenic Byway (Hwy. 148) and Rim Road open for the summer season

After a very busy winter season, the roads to and through Cedar Breaks National Monument are open. Due to a limited snowpack, and thanks to the hard work of the Utah Department of Transportation crews, the roads are opening sooner than usual. Visitors should be very cautious when visiting the park during this time as snow and ice patches still cover many paths and overlooks. Trails remain buried beneath snow and fallen trees; park crews will clear these trails as soon as possible.

Summer visitor services at the Temporary Information Center including the Zion Forever Project (ZFP) park store will begin on Friday, May 27 (Memorial Day Weekend). Visitors are encouraged to visit the 2022 Visitor Guide webpage ([www.nps.gov/cebr/playourvisit/2022.htm](http://www.nps.gov/cebr/playourvisit/2022.htm)) prior to their visit. This page is updated regularly to provide visitors with the most up to date information available.

In 2021, construction began on the new Cedar Breaks Visitor Contact Station. This new facility will serve an increasing number of visitors to the park through an expanded indoor contact space, exhibits, and park store, new restroom facility, and sheltered outdoor space for public programming. The visitor contact station is part of the Centennial Challenge initiative which leverages public-private partnerships to fund major improvements within the national park system. Private fundraising was spearheaded by Zion Forever Project, the official philanthropic partner of the park.

During construction, expected to continue through 2022, the Point Supreme Overlook is closed to all public access. A portion of the parking lot has been closed for construction activities, though a limited number of spots remain at the South Rim Trailhead. Overflow parking is available at the Temporary Information Center across the street.

### Masking still required In Intermountain facilities, including Cedar City Hospital

Despite masking mandates being lifted at many public sites, such as airports, all Intermountain facilities, including Cedar City Hospital, still require patients and visitors all to wear a mask at all times while inside the facility. The requirement for masking is in place indefinitely.

The Intermountain policy requires that face masks be worn at all times, including, but not limited to: inside the concourse; in all patient areas; in waiting rooms; and inside the hospital café.

Patients and visitors are asked to bring their own masks. However, if they forget, there are disposable masks available at entrances, and at every department inside the hospital.

“We really need the public’s continued help and support with masking inside the hospital,” says Cyndi

Wallace, nurse administrator at Intermountain Cedar City Hospital. “I think there’s an incorrect perception that because of the relaxing of some visitor restrictions at the hospital, or because some masking requirements have changed in other prominent places like schools or airports, that perhaps it would mean masking inside the hospital has also been lifted. That’s not the case.”

“We’re asking for each person who comes to the hospital to continue to support this very important protective measure of masking while inside our hospitals,” added Wallace.

Intermountain’s masking policy is supported by the Utah Hospital Association’s recommendation for all healthcare settings to continue to implement a masking requirement.

“It makes sense to wear a mask at places of healing like our hospital,” said Amanda Cooley, nursing supervisor at Intermountain Cedar City Hospital. “People come to the hospital because they need help and support with their health, sometimes they are fighting for their life. Masking helps prevent the spread of germs – and helps protect those who are susceptible to germs or have compromised immune systems. We work extremely hard to keep the hospitals clean and safe, and masking helps support that work. Along with masking, it’s important to also remember to sanitize your hands as you enter the hospital to continue to keep the hospital as clean and germ free an environment as possible.”

### Forgiveness: how it affects your health and wellbeing

When you set a fitness goal, is it usually a “before and after” photo transformation?

Have you thought about setting a before and after goal that focuses on unlocking new possibilities—such as when you stop looking for power and approval on the outside, and instead focus on your own uniqueness? People are fully integrated beings; the body affects the mind which affects the body.

Do you know that forgiving others, along with yourself, can help your mind and your body?

#### Why Forgive?

If you have been wronged, why would you want to forgive the offending person? Above all, forgiveness cultivates self-awareness and the excavation of our best selves. Forgiveness is a paradox: as we forgive another person, we heal ourselves. Sometimes, something as simple as forgiving ourselves goes a long way towards feeling better. I’ve had clients beat themselves up inside for not following their meal plan, not exercising and gaining weight. I remind them that no one is perfect and they need to forgive themselves in order to move on from that one day that seemed so catastrophic.

The idea of not forgiving (and thus remaining resentful) makes perfect sense, but it’s a mirage. A grudge acts like termites to your soul. From the outside you may look fine, but you are slowly being eaten away. Moreover, in addition to the spiritual and emotional benefits of forgiveness, research reveals quantifiable therapeutic outcomes. Forgiveness is associated with better physical health and it leads to healthier responses to stress, lowers your risk for cardiovascular disease and is linked with less risk of an early death.

#### What Does Forgiveness Look Like?

“Forgiveness is what happens when [you] seek to understand with a compassionate heart,” says Susan Macey, PhD, a psychotherapist and author who works with clients who have experienced trauma and may be wrestling with disordered/emotional eating, anxiety and depression.

“To forgive is to let go of personalizing the actions of others,” she explains. “It frees the mind of judgment and the soul of resentment, giving flight to compassion, understanding and love. You can’t have true forgiveness without compassion. When people are open to understanding from another perspective, they become free to forgive. Once they do, they no longer continue to want the other person to be different. They free their mind from the past hurt and open it to possibilities of the future. They can be more in the here and now and stop living in the past.”

Embracing forgiveness helps cultivate the ability to accept and respect others.

#### Forgiveness and Health

Commit (to yourself) to doing what you must to feel better. Forgiveness is for you, not for anyone else.

Let’s be clear: forgiveness does not necessarily mean you reconcile with the people who hurt you or that you condone their actions. What you want is to find peace. Forgiveness can be defined as the peace and understanding that come from blaming another person less for what has hurt you, taking the life experience less personally and changing your grievance story.

Get the right perspective on what is happening. Recognize that your primary distress is coming from the hurt feelings, thoughts and physical upset you are suffering now, not what offended you or hurt you 2 minutes—or 10 years—ago. Forgiveness helps to heal those hurt feelings.

Practice a simple stress management technique to soothe your body’s fight-or-flight response the moment you feel upset. One of the most effective techniques is “box breathing.” Exhale slowly out of your mouth, clearing the air from your lungs to start. Begin by inhaling through your nose for a count of 4, then hold your breath for 4, then exhale out of your mouth for 4 and hold your breath for 4. Repeat the sequence two or three times (Divine & Machate 2013).

Give up expecting things from other people that they do not choose to give you. Recognize the “unenforceable rules” you have for your health or for how you or other people must behave. Remind yourself that you can hope for health, love, peace and prosperity and work hard to get them. Put your energy into looking for another way to get your positive goals met rather than through the experience that has hurt you. Instead of mentally replaying your hurt, seek new ways to get what you want.

Remember that a life well lived is your best response! Instead of focusing on your wounded feelings (and thereby letting the person who caused you pain have power over you), learn to look for the love, beauty and kindness around you. Forgiveness is about personal strength. Amend your grievance story to remind you of the heroic choice to forgive.

#### Your Future: Forgiveness?

There’s a classic story of two former prisoners of war who meet after many years. The first man asks, “Have you forgiven your captors yet?” and the second man answers, “No, never.” “Well then,” the first man replies, “they still have you in prison” (Kornfield 2009). Will you choose to be a prisoner of your past? Or a pioneer of your future?

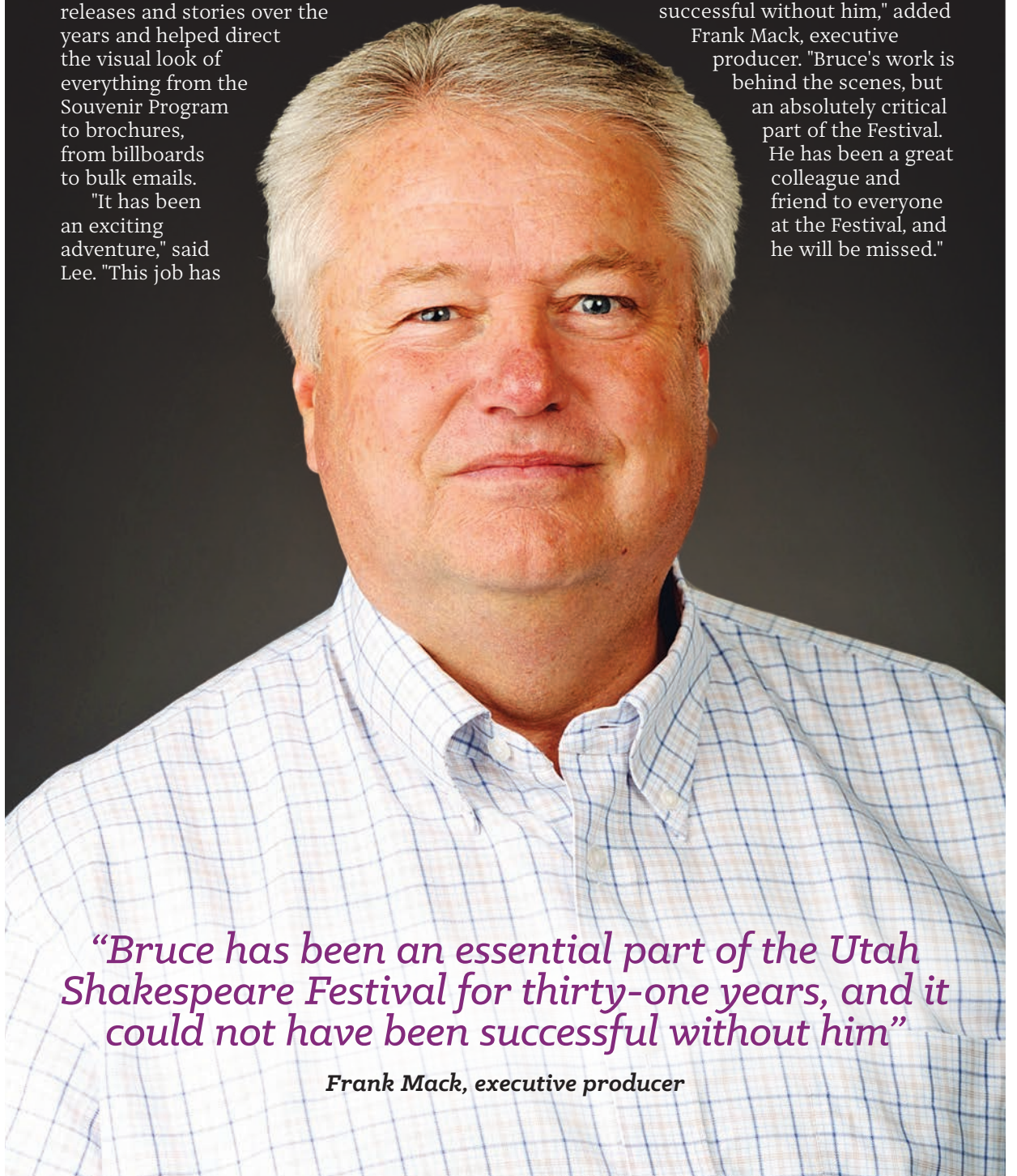
years and helped direct the visual look of everything from the Souvenir Program to brochures, from billboards to bulk emails.

# What's in your wallet—er, grocery cart?

Sometimes when I am standing in the checkout line at the grocery store I look at the items in the cart in front of me and think I wouldn't know how to make a meal out of the items in that cart! This is especially true if the items have an ethnic quality, of course, but plenty of times I see meat I don't know how to cook, beverages I don't drink, and enough canned foods to strain my pantry capacity. No fresh fruit or vegetables or ice cream. Who can live a week without ice cream?

There was big bags of chips and 4—four!—big tubs of ice cream. Ten envelopes of taco seasoning, some broccoli, carrots, and lettuce, and piles of fresh fruit, for smoothies, she said.

Would you be surprised if I told you she feeds 2 teenage sons and a husband, all well over 6 feet tall. (Oh, and by the way, she said her protein and bread items were in her freezer at home.)

Next, I asked a complete stranger, a gentleman in my age bracket, I think. Sure, he said, as he loaded stuff onto the self-checkout shelf. (He was shopping for just himself and his wife.) This was heavy in the convenience-products category. A very big bag of dry cereal, wheat bread, butter, and milk (But no eggs). There were frozen items: 2 large dinners, 2 pot pies, hash browns, and biscuits. He would have to cook the stew meat, pork ribs, and bacon, though. Noodles and pasta kits, bread crumbs, ready-made pudding, and a bag of oranges finished up. I could have cooked out of that cart, but it would be way outside my normal offerings. My husband would look at me and say, "Who are you and what have you done with my wife?"

I finally asked a grocery store friend, someone I've become friendly with because we are creatures of routines that take us both to Smith's on Friday mornings. If I had inadvertently gotten her bags into my trunk, we could have eaten just fine for the week. She had: zucchini, squash, celery, carrots, grapes, strawberries, and salad kits. There were a box of cereal, frozen breakfast sandwiches, orange juice, yogurt, milk, butter, and bread. (Apparently no one is eating eggs these days. They are too expensive!) Protein was provided by hot dogs, pork chops, tuna, cheese, and cheese snacks.

I made my way to checkout. The most I could say for my cart was that it was boring. I tend to buy the same stuff every week.

Exciting things will be happening at your community Farmers Market at IFA this summer with additional food benefits, opportunities for kids to sell their hand-made crafts, live entertainment and much more as the Cedar City Farmers Market celebrates its sixth Anniversary this Saturday, May 7th from 9 am to 1 pm with food and prizes.

Your Cedar City Farmers Market offers an inclusive family fun weekly event every Saturday that provides a welcoming and safe place for all gender, ethnic, income, and ability people to meet and shop with a variety of local individuals and family small business owners.

Starting May 7th, SNAP/EBT users can now get Double Up Food Bucks green tokens every Saturday at the Farmers Market at IFA year-round. "Due to the community's continued use of SNAP/EBT during the winter months and

increased use of Double Up Food Bucks (DUF) at your Farmers Market, we have been given permission to operate the DUF program year-round," said Nancy Dalton, Farmers Market Manager.

The DUF matches dollar to dollar up to \$30 of SNAP/EBT dollars spent each Saturday at the Farmers Market. The Free DUF green tokens can only be used to buy fruits, vegetables, and seeds/plants. "This allows individuals and families to get fresh produce without using their SNAP/EBT funds," said Dalton. It is

a win-win for families facing food insecurity and our local farmers who bring produce to the Farmers Market.

To help with our community's food insecurity issues, our Farmers Market has also been selected by the Utah Department of Human Services (UDHS) to represent one of the rural Farmers Markets for the newly developed Produce Rx program. Selected medical providers provide qualified patients with vouchers to purchase fruits and vegetables from the Farmers Market and grocery stores. Produce Rx was successfully tested last summer at the urban Farmers Markets in Salt Lake City and Ogden. As soon as UDHS finalizes the selected medical provid-

ers, your Cedar City Farmers Market at IFA will begin accepting Produce Rx vouchers.

"We are excited to be able to provide our community with two programs that can provide healthy fruits and vegetables to help individuals and families and to be a part of our community's solution to lessen food insecurity," said Dalton.

Youth under the age of 16 years of age are invited to bring their hand-crafted items or garden produce to sell at the Farmers Market each Saturday. "Our Farmers Market believes in encouraging young people in developing their business skills by operating their own small business," said Dalton, adding that booth fees for youth is \$5 each Saturday.

Our youth entrepreneurs bring garden seedlings/plants, garden produce, hand-crafted jewelry, and crocheted items. With little help from their parents, all three have done well in selling their products.

New Summer monthly activities will include live entertainment from local performers, Free Kids Activities, Live Hands-on Art Demonstrations where people can learn how to create art for a small fee, and educational demonstrations from our local community service non-profit organizations. These activities will occur once a month starting in June and ending in September.

And, as always, we will have our local farmers, bakers, and artisans each week. This summer, we will be allowing a limited number of bakers who are

non-licensed/inspected to join our family-friendly Farmers Market.

## Kathy's CORNER

**W**hat are some of the first fresh garden vegetables you look forward to eating—either from your own garden, local farmer's market, or grocery store? One early vegetable to enjoy beginning in May is Asparagus—sometimes referred to as a “super food” because of its nutrient-dense content, low calories per serving and many health-related benefits.

USDA Nutrition Facts show 1 cup of steamed asparagus has 27-30 calories and 0 grams fat! In addition, this vegetable contains vitamin A, C, E, and K as well as B6. Minerals in asparagus include folate, iron, copper, calcium, along with 3 grams of protein and 3.6 grams of fiber. Other micronutrients make a strong case for the designation of super food.

Breaking this information into more understandable bites related to health and wellness, consider the following provided by Nutrition specialists at the University of Arkansas Extension (<https://uaex.uada.edu/counties/miller/news/fcs/fruits-veggies/>):

- » Asparagus is the highest tested food containing Glutathione, one of the most potent cancer fighters, according to the National Cancer Institute. It is also high in rutin, which helps strengthen blood vessels.
- » Because this vegetable contains both soluble and insoluble fiber, it helps keep you feeling full in between meals because the body digests fiber slowly so you are less likely to get hungry and

turn to unhealthy snacking between meals.

- » Asparagus, along with other green, leafy vegetables, is filled with vitamin K. This vitamin helps your blood coagulate, meaning it helps your body stop bleeding after a cut, and vitamin K helps your body absorb calcium making it good for bone health.

Are there any cautions for consuming asparagus? Those who are generally healthy with well-functioning digestive tracts do fine consuming asparagus. However, individuals who are sensitive to high fiber diets may find that eating asparagus can cause flatulence, stomach cramps, or upset stomach. An additional oddity is that this vegetable contains an acid that when broken down during digestion can lend a different smell to urine.

If you haven't had a good eating experience with asparagus, perhaps it was too old, held too long in the refrigerator, or even over-cooked. Give this amazing vegetable another chance by trying a quick and easy method of preparation:

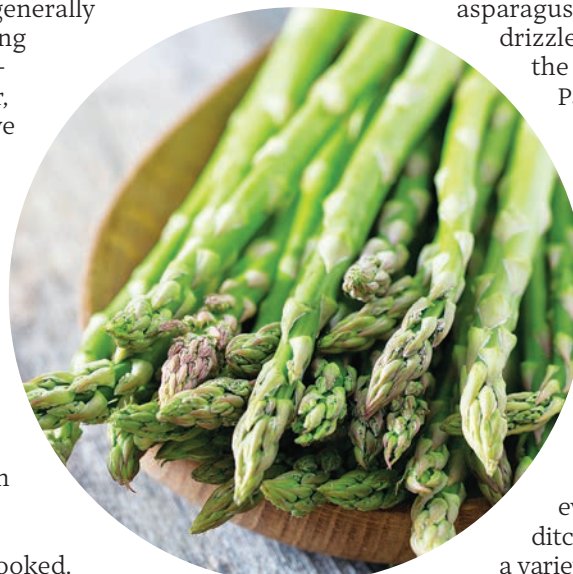
### Oven Roasted Asparagus

- 1 bunch thin asparagus spears, trimmed
- 3 Tbs. olive oil

- 1 ½ Tbs. grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. ground black pepper
- 1 Tbs. lemon juice

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Place the asparagus into a mixing bowl, and drizzle with olive oil. Toss to coat the spears, then sprinkle with Parmesan cheese, garlic, salt, and pepper. Arrange the asparagus onto a baking sheet in a single layer. Bake in the preheated oven until just tender, 12 to 15 minutes depending on thickness. Sprinkle with lemon juice just before serving.

We live in an area where garden produce can be grown in small patio pots or large back yard gardens or even find it growing wild along ditch banks. It can be prepared in a variety of ways, and eaten fresh, or preserved. Why not give asparagus a try?!

## THE BEST MOTHER'S DAY GIFT

A lot of the time, being a mom probably sucks. But moms do it anyway—and if you're really lucky, you get a great one and you turn out alright. If she's lucky, part of you turning out alright means maybe, just maybe, you'll pay that back by remembering Mother's Day. That said, the best way you can show her you remembered is by writing her a card.

Maybe you're thinking a card is just an easy cop-out, a half-hearted way to save face if you failed to remember the one day of the year (other than the day she was born) that you have to remember. You're not wrong—it is the best option for that scenario. But just because something bails you out in a pinch doesn't mean it's not great.

Plus, if the "writing" portion of your genome turned out to be defective, that's at least half her fault anyway. So leave your insecurity at the door. And then try to break through the hardened shell you've wrapped around the spot where your feelings should be, and say something meaningful and true.

Considering that in your teenage years you probably racked up an appreciation deficit so great that you'll never truly be able to pay it off, expressions of gratitude go a long way—particularly if they're encased in an anecdote about something your mom might be surprised you remember, or shocked to learn meant

Or:

*I know that my days of pretending to be Ken Griffey, Jr., in the backyard put an infinite number of holes in your screen porch. I'm lucky to have a mom who put up with me being such a colossal pain in the butt. Please enjoy the accompanying Hamilton Mixtape.*

Or:

*Mom, I know that raising me was probably like getting hit in the face with a tape dispenser, even on days when you weren't actually taking tape dispensers to the face. I'm sorry. I'm trying to do better now. You're the best.*

The best part about writing such a note—other than making your dear mother happy, of course—is that, much like eating a hot pepper or landing a plane in an emergency situation, once you've done it once (and dear God, I do hope this is not your first handwritten note but if it is, welcome), it makes the next time that much easier. 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# HOW MOTHER'S DAY STARTED IN THE U.S.

The real history of Mother's Day in the United States might surprise you. Three women—who championed efforts toward better health, welfare, peace, and love—contributed to the day we all celebrate on the second Sunday in May each year.

The Mother's Day holiday in the United States wasn't born out a desire to simply treat mothers to a day off or to buy them gifts! It essentially began as a women's movement to better the lives of other Americans.

The creation of a national Mother's Day is primarily attributed to three women: Ann Reeves Jarvis, Julia Ward Howe, and Ann's daughter, Anna M. Jarvis.

## Ann Reeves Jarvis

Known as "Mother Jarvis," Ann Reeves Jarvis was a young Appalachian homemaker who taught Sunday school lessons. She also was a lifelong activist who, in the mid-1800s, had organized "Mothers' Day Work Clubs" in West Virginia to combat unsanitary living conditions and teach young mothers how to safely care for their children. During the Civil War, Mother Jarvis had also organized women's brigades, encouraging women to help without regard for which side their men had chosen. After the war, she proposed a Mothers' Friendship Day to promote peace between former Union and Confederate families. "I hope and pray that someone, sometime, will found a memorial mother's day commemorating her for the matchless service she renders to humanity in every field of life," Ann Jarvis once said. "She is entitled to it."

## Julia Ward Howe

Julia Ward Howe was a famous poet and reformer. During the Civil War, she volunteered for the U.S. Sanitary Commission, helping them to provide hygienic environments for hospitals and ensure sanitary conditions during the care of sick and wounded soldiers. In 1861, she authored the famous Civil War anthem, "The Battle Hymn of the Republic," which was first published in February 1862.

Around 1870, Julia Ward Howe called for a "Mother's Day for Peace" dedicated to the celebration of peace and the eradication of war. As expressed in what is called her "Mother's Day Proclamation" from 1870, Howe felt that mothers should gather to prevent the cruelty of war and the waste of life since mothers of mankind alone bear and know the cost.

Howe's version of Mother's Day was held in Boston and other locations for about 30 years, but died a quick

death in the years preceding World War I.

Nothing new happened in this department until 1907, when a Miss Anna M. Jarvis, of Philadelphia, took

Jarvis, died in 1905, Miss Anna Jarvis from Philadelphia wished to memorialize her mother's life and started campaigning for a national day to honor all mothers. She bombarded public

booklets extolling her idea.

In May of 1907, Anna memorialized her mother's lifelong activism with a memorial service held at the Methodist Church in Grafton, West Virginia, where Anna's mother had taught. The following year, on May 10, a Mother's Day service was held at that same church to acknowledge all mothers. Thus was born the idea that the second Sunday in May be set aside to honor every mother, whether living or deceased.

## Mother's Day Gains Ground

Her efforts came to the attention of the mayor of Philadelphia, who proclaimed a local Mother's Day. From the local level she went on to Washington, D.C. The politicians there knew a good thing when they saw it and were quick to lend verbal support.

While West Virginia was the first state to officially adopt the holiday, others followed suit. Proclamation of the day by the various states led Representative J. Thomas Heflin of Alabama and Senator Morris Sheppard of Texas to present a joint resolution to Congress that Mother's Day be observed nationwide. The resolution was passed by both houses.

In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a bill designating the second Sunday in May as a legal holiday to be called "Mother's Day"—dedicated "to the best mother in the world, your mother." For the first few years, the day was observed as a legal holiday, but in absolute simplicity and reverence—church services were held in honor of all mothers, living and dead.

## A Bittersweet Legacy

According to many sources, Ann simply wanted to honor her mother and the work she had done, and claimed that her mother was the originator of the real Mother's Day. She was dismayed to see Mother's Day become more commercialized with the sending of cards and gifts and used as a way to promote other causes. Sadly, Anna spent the final years of her life trying to abolish the very holiday that she had helped to establish!

## Mother's Day Today

Mother's Day endures and evolves. Just as Mother's Day was the creation of multiple women, the modern Mother's Day celebrates the varied roles of mothers today. We commemorate the many ways mothers have fought to better the lives of their children, from social welfare to non-violence. We also honor the way mothers have raised and nurtured their children with love and courage.

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## Choosing a guardian for your children

If you have young children, you've probably thought about who would raise them if both you and your spouse were to die. It's not an easy thing to consider. However, you can make plans now that will put your fears to rest, knowing that your children will be nurtured and cared for.

You can use your will to name the person you want to be the guardian of your children. The judge will appoint the person you nominated in your will as guardian, unless it is not in the best interests of the children for some reason. If you do not name a guardian in your will, anyone who is interested can request to be appointed. The judge then must decide, without your opinion.

Legally, you may name co-guardians, but keep in mind that co-guardians could later go separate ways. Here are some factors to consider when selecting a guardian or co-guardians:

Is the prospective guardian old enough? He or she must be an adult, 18 years or older.

Does your choice have a genuine concern for your children's welfare?

Is your choice physically able to handle the rigors of child rearing?

Does he or she have the time? The resources?

Does he or she have children close in age to that of your children? Is this a benefit?

Does the guardian share your moral beliefs?

Would your children have to move away from other family members?

If you're having a hard time selecting a guardian, talk with the people you're considering. They may not be willing or able to accept the responsibility. Their feelings about acting as guardian may help you decide.

When you and your child's other parent make your wills, you should name the same person as guardian. Otherwise, in the event of both your deaths, the court would be faced with wishes that conflict, and would have to make the choice. If you don't agree on one person, candid discussions with your potential guardians may help you reach an agreement.

Most people want their children to stay together. However, you may have good reasons for naming different guardians for different children. In all cases, you should keep the best interests of your children at heart. In most cases a judge would grant custody to a non-parent only if the surviving parent had abandoned the child or was found to be an unfit parent for some reason.

Most people have strong feelings about how they want their children to be raised. Your concerns may cover anything from keeping the children together to religious teachings. All of these wishes can be expressed in your will.

The decisions are difficult. In all cases, the best interests of the children come first. Selecting guardianship for your children is, in itself, a good reason to make a will. Nothing gives greater peace of mind than knowing your children will be cared for if something were to happen to you.

# Teachers, including the great DGB, honored during May

"They might not need me—yet they might. I'll let my Heart be just in sight. A smile so small as mine might be precisely their necessity." Emily Dickinson

Throughout the month of May teachers will be honored throughout schools everywhere. There will be flowers, candy, plants, and notes of appreciation given to teachers. Reflecting upon past teachers, I suppose we can all recall those who ignited the love of learning within us or lent a helping hand when it mattered most. However, the greater question is: "What sets the good teachers apart from the well not so good? What typifies a great teacher? Is it his or her love of students or is it his or her passion for the subject matter? I believe it is the combination of the two.

Not so long ago, I had the opportunity to sit in the presence of one such great teacher, and he possessed both. It has been 30 years since I last sat in his classroom for AP English, and yet I approached his residence with the same swirling of butterflies in the pit of my stomach – Douglas Bonzo – the great DGB.

Upon entering the door of his modest home, the butterflies left and I was immediately at home. His gathering room mirrored his classroom that I once so dearly loved. There were books everywhere, paintings, pictures of his grandchildren, figurines, an antique organ, and a computer which I might mention he pointed out was only for the use of church work and to email his son. He excused himself momentarily as the buzzer beeped in the kitchen. Fresh rolls were coming out of the oven and he had Navy Bean soup on the stove. His beloved companion, Loraine passed away in 2000. He candidly added when speaking of her, "I'm sure you tasted her divinity." and then commenting on his domestic side, "If you want to eat, you have to learn to cook."

I found myself at home in his presence and smiling. I was feeling the magic again...that same magic he created in his classroom. It was truly a wonderful place to be. My love of learning was ignited and his acceptance of me I always felt. And then he began quoting her—Emily Dickinson. I had forgotten how much I had missed "her" but more than that, I missed the way he read her poetry. I became transformed to a different time and place as he read the poetry that I too had long ago fallen in love with and I joined him in the recitation, "Success is counted sweetest by those who ne'er succeed..."

"You know Amy, teachers are born," he remarked. His teaching philosophy consisted of what he coined as the "Four F's": firm, fair, friendly, and flexible. On his bookshelf, he had several copies of Tuesdays with Morrie. He said that the book captured his vision of teaching. "Why so many copies," I asked. He responded, "I give a copy to visitors who have not yet read it."

Mr. Douglas Bonzo, affectionately known by his students as DGB (incidentally, I might add that his license plate bears these letters.) taught school at Cedar High School for 29 years, 12 years at SUU, one year in Tooele, and 2 years in California. He graduated from BYU with a BS where he majored in political science and minored in English and then attended the University of Southern California on the prestigious Ford

he was to be a teacher.

He has led the life of a devoted teacher. He lived on a teacher's salary—he gave up money to teach. Commenting on the present direction of education he commented, "A good teacher you couldn't pay enough money...a bad teacher shouldn't be in the classroom."

He has taught athletes, musicians and scholars and he has truly loved them all. When commenting upon his years in education, he chuckled while saying, "I have taught everyone, or they are from Delta." DGB was both liked and disliked by his students. Most great teachers are. Unfortunately, those who did not love "DGB" missed out on a great gemstone, and an even greater opportunity to learn.

Mr. Bonzo recounted that several times he went to a student's home and dragged him or her back to class.

Fellowship, and then went on to receive his master's degree from the University of Illinois.

It was at BYU in 1958 that he fell in love with Emily Dickinson and upon receiving the Ford Fellowship he switched educational gears. Changing directions from a career in political service, to one in education. However, looking back, he recalls that it was at the age of 16 while serving in his church that he knew

There are students who failed many classes, but not DGB's. "If you fail a student, you have failed as a teacher," he said.

And if his devotion in the classroom were not it enough, couple it with his 30 to 40 years of service in the community and in his church. His service credentials cite positions on various committees and boards including: The Sterling Scholar Board, The Library Board,

The SUU Executive Committee, the Bicentennial Committee, and the Art Committee just to name a few. However, he seemed most at home with his half-decade of service at Fiddlers Elementary where he took the best and brightest third graders and taught them the elements of the novel. He also served our nation in the Air Force for three years, nine months, and one day as a Chaplain's assistant, and he served a mission for the LDS church in France and the Northwestern States.

He continues to journal and of course converses with "his friends" or books through reading. When I asked if he had a favorite, he responded, "One like me doesn't have a favorite book. I am an eclectic reader." He then rattled off names and authors. Some of the authors names I was shocked by such as Crichton and Grisham. Other such as Tolkien, Shakespeare, Bronte, and Alcott, I was not. I remember him handing a list of authors and their works to me as one of his AP students. The list read, "The Top 100 books of the Best Read Seniors"—the year was 1992. I wonder how many of those books I could cross off now. I then began to mentally cross off my own list as he named some of his most recent reads including: Three Cups of Tea, The Tale of Despearaux, Continuous Atonement, The Last Symbol, The Apology, The Hobbit, Little Men, and Madame Bovary. I might add that I did not do so shabby.

Mr. Bonzo admitted that he was even a fan of Harry Potter and loved Orson Scott Card's science fiction. However, he believes that Tolkien's Lord of the Rings remains to be an absolute phenomena. While he loves Emily Dickinson, he does enjoy Robert Frost, but his preference lies with Russian authors.

I sat in his "classroom" on rare but warm spring day, and he continued to teach me. Again years later, I still have absolute respect for this man. His demeanor commands it and his teaching deserves it. I needed you Mr. Bonzo and your smile was indeed my necessity. I find it only fitting to end with words from Emily, "If you were coming in the fall, I'd brush the summer by..."

Author's Note: Inspired by "DGB, my freshmen English teacher (my mother, Janet Weaver) and SUU's Masterful David Lee, I returned to the classroom last fall after a 23 three year sabbatical, (I enjoyed the privilege of being a stay at home mom of five great kids) to teach Junior and Senior English and Student Government. I absolutely love what I get to do every day.

## Language, Bible in English & Thesauruses – Pt. 9

A thesaurus is a reference book for finding synonyms (and sometimes antonyms) of words. Synonyms are words that mean the same or almost the same. As far as I can ascertain, the English language is the only language that requires a thesaurus to enable a person to be fluent with useful ownership of the best and largest vocabulary to express ideas in a variety of ways and with accuracy. The English language makes foreign words part of English vocabulary, that is English adopts foreign words at a massive rate so that entirely recognizable foreign words become part of normal English vocabulary. English is a language that grows exponentially so that something written 500 or so years ago in English may not readily convey meaning to English speakers and readers today because English vocabulary changes word meanings and adds vocabulary words every year.

The word thesaurus itself comes from a Greek word meaning treasure. The first thesaurus was published in 1572 primarily as a dictionary whereas a thesaurus today is a listing of synonyms. Because the English language is constantly changing as vocabulary grows larger and in complexity, a reader would probably benefit from a balanced and

newly well translated Bible such as the New King James Version, rather than the original King James Version translated in 1590-1611 when the English language was smaller, less diverse, and meanings of words were different than today.

I personally prefer the New King James Version of the English Bible which was commissioned in 1975 by Thomas Nelson Publishers when 130 respected Bible scholars, church leaders, and lay Christians worked for seven years to create a completely new modern translation of Scripture, yet one

necessarily a closet.

• Acts 26:11: As Paul tells his story, he recounts the time he persecuted early believers in Jesus. The KJV says he "compelled" them to blaspheme Jesus; however, the Greek term used is anagkazo and does not imply an association with irresistible force.

• Ephesians 4:22 and Psalm 37:14: both verses speak of conversation in the KJV, but the Hebrew language in Psalms and the Greek in Ephesians is more about a road—that is, the way a person travels through life rather than what is

that would retain the purity and stylistic beauty of the original King James. The following are examples of some words that have changed meaning since 1611 when the King James Version was published:

• Genesis 1:28: God tells Adam and Eve to "replenish" the earth. The word replenish previously meant "to supply fully" and was not a refilling.

• Matthew 6:6: Jesus tells people to go into their closet to pray. The original Greek indicated a place well within your house, a private or secret room. Today we would say bedroom. Jesus means to get away from others and from any distractions in a private place, not

said. Conversation in English 400 years ago referred to conduct or behavior and not to talking together.

These examples only illustrate the fact that misinterpretation may take place. The KJV isn't necessarily wrong, just outdated in places. Those who use it should take care about the meaning they read into words. I also recommend the purchase of a comparative study Bible: A Parallel Bible. Mine presents the following four versions together page by page: New International Version, New American Standard Bible, Amplified Bible, and the King James Version. Next week "Translation Comparison Charts" and numerals in ancient Hebrew.

## "Find Your Wings" (Mark Harris)

What would happen if the calendar didn't remind us to honor mothers this Sunday (May 8th)? 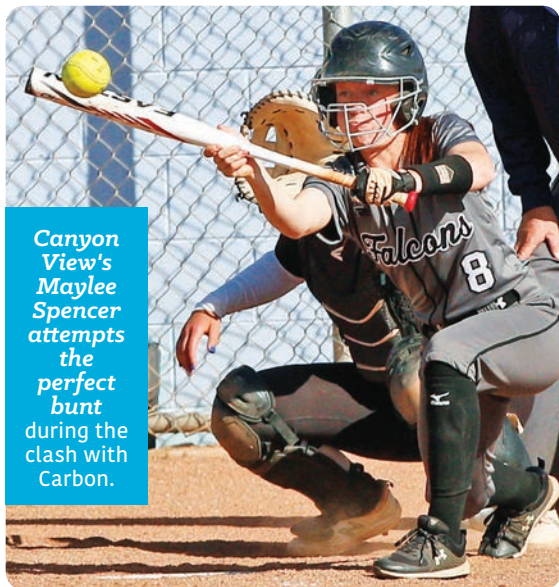

I mention my siblings and I were born in two separate hospitals where my mom was working as a registered nurse at the time. I see another young lady wearing a Lions hat. She admitted she's never seen the Lions win a playoff game and is hopeful that will change soon.

If you look under "longest NFL playoff droughts" on Wikipedia, the Lions will be at the top of the list. The Miami Dolphins rank second at 21 years since it last won in the postseason, and it's been 19 years since the Las Vegas Raiders have won when it counts.

The shuffling of the order of picks started fast and furious when the Washington Commanders traded down, moving from No. 11 to No. 16. The New Orleans Saints took advantage and chose Ohio State wide receiver Chris Olave.

Detroit traded up from its original No. 32 pick, swapping spots with the Minnesota Vikings and taking its No. 12 selection. The Lions used it to draft another pass catcher – Jameson Williams out of Alabama. Uhh...who?

After some quick discussion with the gathered masses and additional research, I learned Williams is on the mend from an ACL tear he suffered in the 2022 national title game against Georgia. He's been projected as a Day 1 starter, but isn't expected to be ready in time for the season opener. Facts can be checked with research, and these days a lot of people use the internet for their research. Unfortunately, not all information on the internet is true and accurate. Here are some tips to help you do research on the internet more carefully.

The News Literacy Project provides a list of 10 questions to help people do research on the internet. Below are three of those questions. To see all 10, go to the source link below.

### Gauge your emotional reaction:

Is it strong? Are you angry? Are you intensely hoping that the information turns out to be true? False?

### Consider the headline or main message:

- Does it use excessive punctuation (!!!) or ALL CAPS for emphasis?
- Does it make a claim about containing a secret or telling you something that "the media" doesn't want you to know?

### Consider the source of the information:

- Is it a well-known source?
- Is there a byline (an author's name) attached to this piece?
- Go to the website's "About" section: Does the site describe itself as a "fantasy news" or "satirical news" site?
- Does the person or organization that produced the information have any editorial standards?
- Does the "contact us" section include an email address that matches the domain (not a Gmail or Yahoo email address)?
- Does a quick search for the name of the website raise any suspicions?
