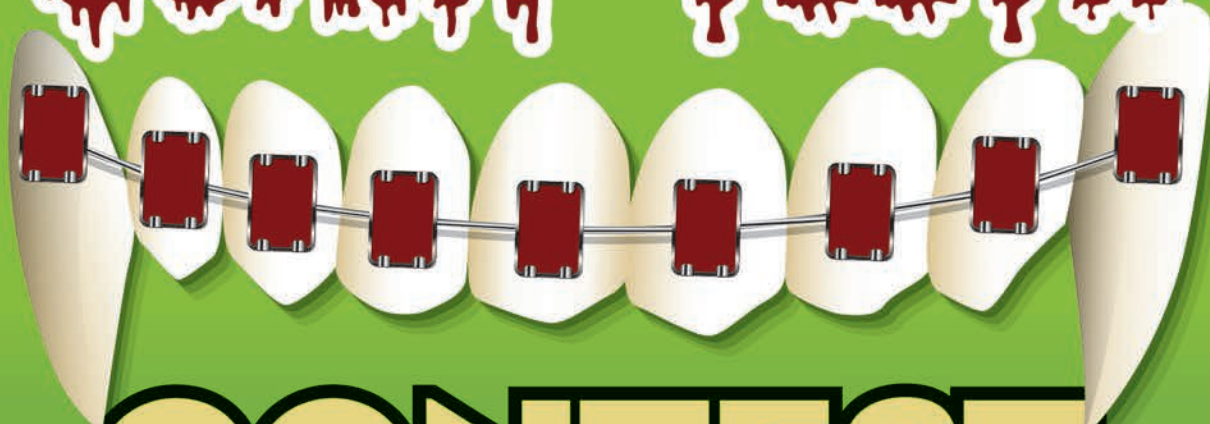

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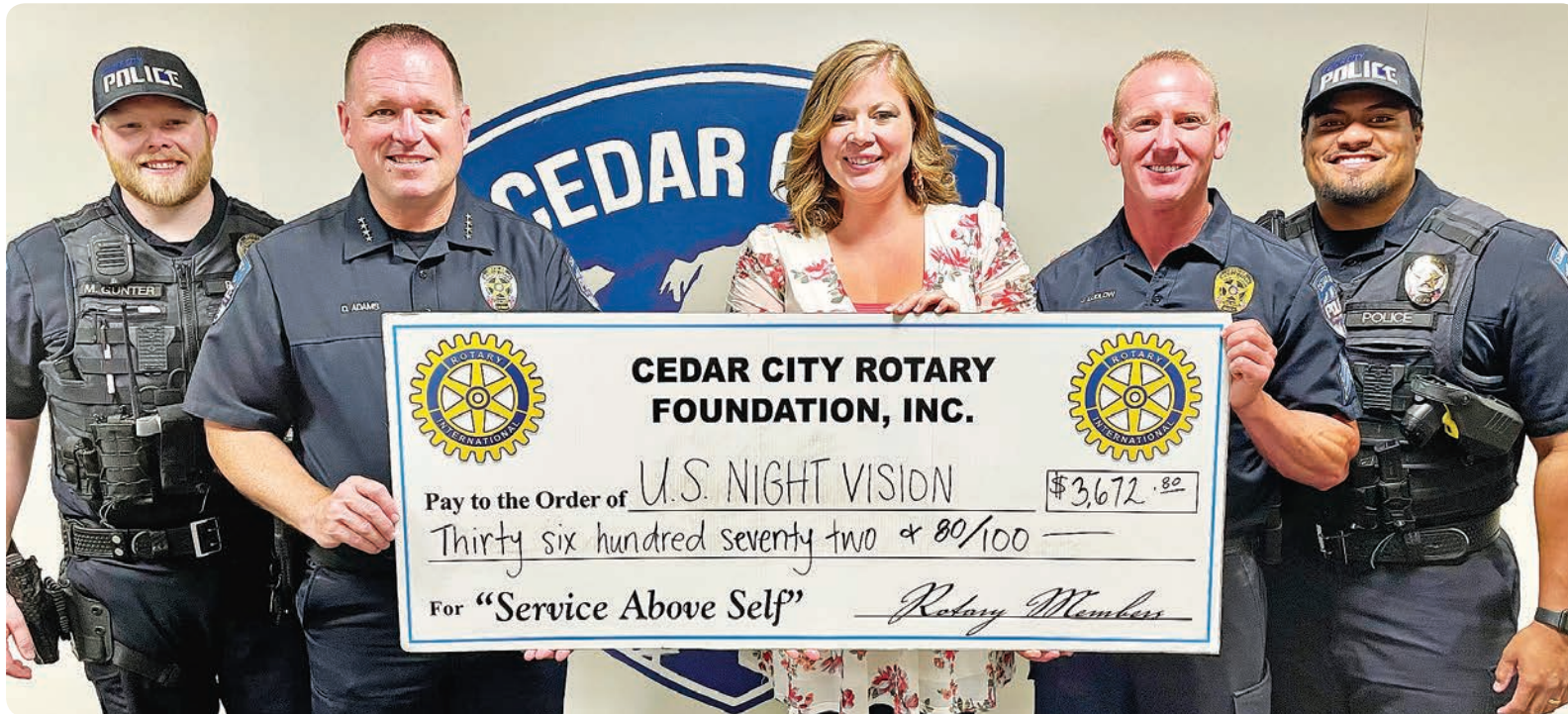

Cedar PD receives generous donation from Rotary Club

CEDAR CITY — Cedar City Police Department (CCPD) recently received a generous donation of \$3,672.80 from the Cedar City Rotary Club to purchase much-needed specialized equipment. Earlier this summer, Rotary Club members and active CCPD volunteers, Rob and Judi O'Brien, contacted Police Chief Darin Adams in hopes of finding a way to support police operations on behalf of the Rotary Club.

"We were honored to hear of the Rotary Club's desire to support us," said Police Chief Darin Adams. "They help so many people and organizations in the community every year and they will continue to make an impact with this generous donation."

According to Rob O'Brien, his decision to join the VIPS (Volunteers in Police Service) was to become involved in the community and support the police officers. "As members of the Rotary Club too, we were happy to be presented with an opportunity to support the CCPD with a financial donation as well as through service."

After evaluating the needs of the department that were not able to make it into this year's fiscal budget, Adams expressed that a pair of updated night vision scopes would be incredibly helpful having only one pair at the moment for the entire Cedar

City police force. The O'Brien's reached out to U.S. Night Vision, who supplied the original scopes purchased by CCPD, and informed them of the Rotary Club's desire to donate updated equipment. U.S. Night Vision was able to offer a saving of \$734.80 as the product had since increased in price.

Cedar City Rotary Club President, Tessa Douglas, expressed the club's gratitude for our local law enforcement agencies and police officers. "When they have the equipment they need, it not only makes them safer, but it also makes our community safer for everyone. We are happy we could contribute to that in some small way."

Night vision scopes are a critical tool in assisting Police Officers during night and low-light operations, from finding a lost child to discretely locating a suspect. Chief Adams explained that the use of these scopes have proven to increase officer confidence and decrease anxiety when performing a specialized operation, providing the officer with the equivalent illumination of a powerful full moon.

"We cannot thank the Rotary Club enough for this donation and supporting us in our commitment to providing a safe community," said Chief Adams. "We are looking forward to implementing this updated equipment and providing our officers with the state-of-the-art tools they need to do their very best."

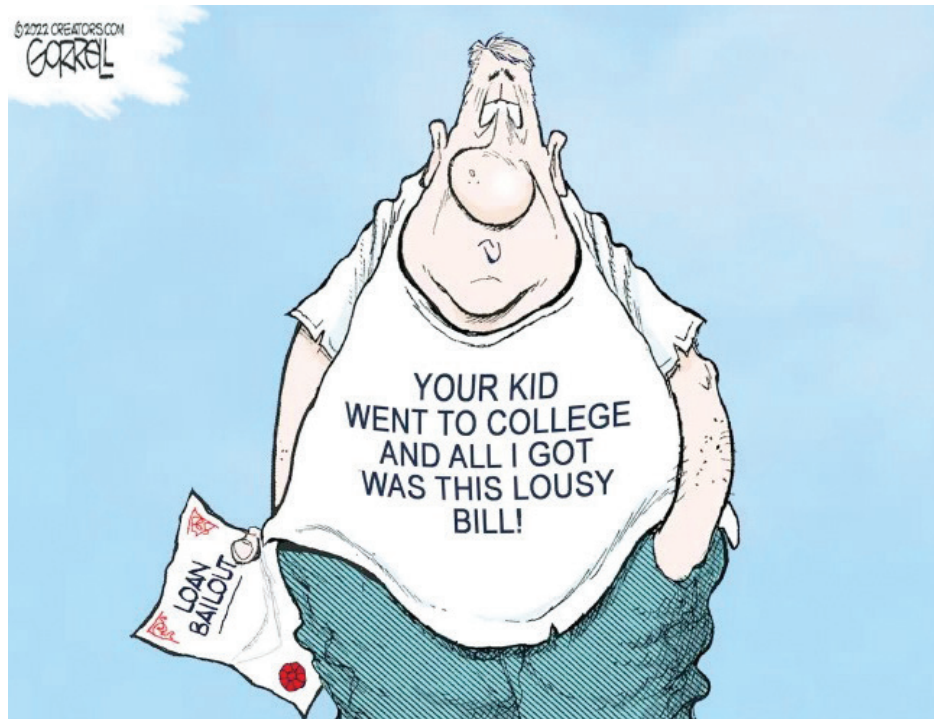

Important facts about crime in Utah & women (Part 3)

Utah's rate of violent crime is notably lower than the national average, except in one category, rape. Studies show, however, that 3 out of 4 rapes in Utah go unreported based on data collected on 7,455 sexual assault cases as far back as 2010. Utah is one of the top 10 states with the highest number of rapes per capita. Iron County has a rate of up to 49.5 rapes per 100,000 of population with a population of 54,839. This data should never be minimized because rape is among the most serious of crimes a person can be accused of in every U.S. state.

A rape conviction can change the life of a person forever, effecting even their family members as well as affecting the victim/survivor with a lifetime of ill effects. Utah's laws define multiple types of sexual offenses that constitute "rape"

covered under Utah Code 76-5-402-404. What is surprising and shocking is the fact that 1 in 8 women in Utah will be raped at least once during their lifetimes.

The most appalling fact is that this seems to continue in Utah year after year without ending despite publicity about it. Why are rapists allowed to repeat their awful crimes against children and women? In 2016 a controversy about unprocessed rape kits developed because of limited funds. Since then, a provision was made for additional funds for Utah public and private crime labs to process rape kits. Most hopeful is the fact that DNA science has developed to the extent that even very old rape and murder cases can be solved using DNA to identify perpetrators.

Perpetrators, be forewarned that you must obey consent laws. Utah is among the few U.S. states that have

separate ages of consent for women and men. For women, the age of consent in Utah is 16 years old (with restrictions between the ages of 16 and 18) while for men consent is 18 years old. Rape of a child 13 years and under is a first-degree or Class A felony with other levels of felony also designated in the law. The best advice to parents is to teach your children that it is okay to say NO and that their bodies belong only to them and not to anyone else whether a stranger, neighbor, or family member.

Not only are children allowed to say no when it comes to their own body, emotions, or personal space, but they also need to allow others to do the same. Consent, saying yes to a behavior, is a two-way street that both parties (or more) should obey and respect. Gang or group behavior is not allowed. Parents can teach this through role-playing.

Parenting is a demanding and constant position of authority, a job

The price of loyalty and all that Jazz

In our society, entertainment rules. Several weeks ago, I expected that many Utahns would be discussing the FBI search of Donald Trump's Mar-A-Lago estate. Some were, of course. But when I entered the first two offices that morning, there was not mention of classified documents; instead, employees were singing Olivia Newton John songs.

"You're the One that I Want" had more interest than "Secret Agent Man."

Last week Utahns were murmuring about the record high temperatures, but even more chatter was on the dismantling of the Utah Jazz roster. It is easier to spout conclusions about Danny Ainge's trades than it is to figure the warring components of global warming. Science will always lose to entertainment. Ice floes lack the personality of Donovan Mitchell.

The Jazz trades have split the team's fan base. As for me, I'm personally skeptical of the "tear down" plan. In baseball, the Chicago Cubs and the Boston Red Sox were both sad sack teams in the 1960s and 70s, but you didn't see the owners booting out Ernie Banks or Carl Yastrzemski to start a youth movement. Similarly, in football, the Green Bay Packers made their budding superstar Aaron Rodgers sit on the bench for several years rather than toss aside legendary Brett Favre.

Sports fans relate to players, especially productive players who become part of the community. Karl Malone, John Stockton, and Jeff Hornacek may not have won an NBA championship but they were "ours", respected and emulated not only by the fan base, but also by Larry Miller who, though competitive, put a premium on loyalty.

The new Jazz owner and front office manage-

ment think differently. Some may call it ego, others see it as wise. To me, if Larry was a rock, Ainge and new owner Ryan Smith are simply riverboat gamblers.

With Rudy Gobert and Mitchell, the Jazz matched every other team for the number of All-Star players. The Jazz were competitive. Sure, it was doubtful the current cast could win a championship, but neither would they embarrass the fans as in Sacramento or Orlando. Also, both players represented Utah well, and Gobert seemed happy to live in Utah. With a previous Sixth Man of the

Year award-winner and a muscular European shooter accompanying them, the Jazz were not a squad any team could take lightly. They had the opportunity to win every single night, bolstering the faith of their fans who opened up their wallets for

tickets and \$15 sodas.

Granted, Mitchell signaled that he would hopefully don a New York Knicks uniform someday. And if the Jazz management were certain he wouldn't re-sign a new contract, a trade isn't to be criticized. But trading Gobert and, presumably, other popular and contributing Jazz players, paints a dim picture for another three to five years.

Draft picks are paper assets. They don't necessarily win championships and neither do they embrace the community, its values, nor the desire to play at the Vivint long term.

The Ainge scenario may work, but we won't really know until the 2027 season. In contrast, the team is expected to be a bottom-feeder for at least several years in which I doubt the price and tickets, beer, and popcorn will be reduced for fans watching a 25-win season.

With a competitive team, it was easy for fans to say, "Just wait for next year." Sorry, Jazz fans, but you'll be waiting a lot longer.

UTAH LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

As we head into another school year, I want to express my gratitude to the parents and teachers across the state who are dedicated to the education of Utah's next generation of leaders. A high-quality education is crucial to Utah's ongoing success. This past legislative session, we appropriated historic funding to education and I look forward to seeing how the additional funds help our students thrive. I wish you and your family the best during this new school year!

Below are a few updates from the legislature. As always, please reach out with your comments, questions or concerns. I appreciate your feedback and I am honored to serve as your Senator.

Public Input Needed on New Utah State Flag

Redesigning the Utah State flag has been a frequent topic of conversation in recent months. In 1922, a seamstress made an embroidered copy of the Utah flag. However, the proportions of the shield were such that she could not fit the date "1847" inside the shield, as required by Utah code. For 88 years, Utah's state flag reflected this mistake. In 2010, the Legislature passed a resolution to align Utah's flag with its original description.

The Legislature is again examining the design of Utah's flag. With deep appreciation for the rich history and symbols used in Utah's current flag, the Legislature has decided to redesign Utah's state flag. To create a flag that reflects the current residents of Utah, the Utah State Flag Task Force is seeking public input on the design of the new flag.

The Task Force received more than 7,000 flag ideas and designs from Utahns. From September 1 until the end of the month, multiple flag design finalists will be posted on the flag redesign website for public feedback. He embraces the mission of the juvenile court and will be an excellent addition. I have been amazed by their accomplish-

ments and know they will serve our state well.

Highlights from August Legislative Meetings

Each month, we hold legislative interim meetings to discuss potential legislation and review study items. During August interim, we discussed a variety of issues, including water conservation efforts, the opioid settlement the state will receive, adoption assistance and more.

Water conservation continues to be a focus as we face one of the worst droughts in state history. During interim, the Legislative

"UTA on Demand" Expansion

UTA on Demand is an important service that provides a more efficient way for people to take advantage of public transportation. Expanding Transportation with the Uinta Basin Railway

On July 14, the U.S. Forest Service signed the Record of Decision authorizing the Uintah Basin Railway. The Uinta Basin Railway will connect Eastern Utah to the national rail system, bolstering rural economies. This is significant for both Duchesne and Uintah counties due to the vast market disadvantage they currently face with the two-lane highway for transportation. The Uinta Basin Railway is a great victory, providing a safer, cleaner, and more efficient transportation system to transport agricultural commodities, natural resources and manufactured goods to markets that are currently unreachable. This is tremendous news for Utah and is supported by state leaders and local and Tribal governments. The Uinta Basin Railway will improve the current transportation system and provide economic expansion for Eastern Utah.

Honoring K9 Arros

Last week, we had the opportunity to remember K9 Arros, a dual-purpose K9 trained in patrol and explosive detection, who recently passed away due to medical complications. Arros honorably served in the U.S. Army and later with the Utah Highway Patrol, stationed at the Utah State Capitol. In July 2021, manufacturers and distributors of opioid pharmaceuticals announced a settlement agreement, resulting in significant financial

assistance programs with the Social Services Appropriations Subcommittee. Currently, adoptive families are provided specialized adoption subsidies and assistance for respite, child care, tutoring and medical costs.

THURGOOD

Interim artistic director to tackle one-man show

Derek Charles Livingston, the Utah Shakespeare Festival's interim artistic director, has taken on quite the challenge: In the one-man show *Thurgood*, he will be chronicling the story of Thurgood Marshall as well as playing several other characters onstage for ninety minutes.

Livingston has played the role before, but it is still a daunting task to bring to life a giant figure in the civil rights movement and the first black Supreme Court justice in the United States.

"It's a one-person show, but it's a full-length show, and so I'm speaking the entire time. One of the challenges is diving back into the text to remember the lines as they're written," Livingston said.

Because he is playing a plethora of characters, studying their individual dialects and becoming a student of history was extremely important as Livingston prepared for the show. In addition to Marshall, he plays Marshall's father, his two wives, one of the judges he faced, a doctor, two attorneys, and a teacher, to name a few.

"YouTube has been one of my great friends to study speech patterns and where they've come from. There's an amazing interview with Marshall's widow, and you get her intonation and the way she speaks, and so I could study that," Livingston explained.

But recorded video isn't available for every single character,

Double-check those theater-going manners

It looked like every family in Cedar City was at the Heritage Theater on Tuesday night to see a production of Cedar City Children's Musical Theatre's "Beauty and the Beast." We made our way to the ticket window only to find out that the evening was sold out! Luckily for us, a woman showed up with some extra tickets and we were able to stay after all, even finding some fairly good seats in a theater already packed. We settled in next to a mom with a couple of little girls who were talking, giggling, and playing with some string toys while we all waited for the play to begin. And they never quit. Talking, giggling, and playing with toys, I mean. I certainly expected a lively audience; it was a show designed for children, after all, but they were so noisy and disruptive that sometimes they interfered with my hearing the dialogue on stage.

I glanced at the mother several times with what I hoped was a pointed but kind expression that said, "Would you mind reigning in those screamers and squealers, please? I want to hear the show." But she didn't respond because—you guessed it: she was sometimes on her phone!

I know what is involved in the production of a show with 247 actors. The producers, families, and young performers themselves hoped for an enthusiastic but respectful audience as a payoff for all that hard work, but at least in my section, that was not our experience. I can only hope, gentle readers, that you don't recognize yourself in the above scenario.

A few nights later, I sat in the Englestad Theater on the USF campus next to a woman who was vigorously fanning herself the whole time, an exercise that sometimes leaked over into my space! Yes, it was very warm, but the constant motion in my immediate peripheral vision practically induced a small seizure. It put me in mind of an experience I had sitting diagonally in back of a teenage girl in the Randall Theater a few weeks ago. She never glanced up at the engaging production of "The Sound of Music", just pulled very slender strands of her hair straight out in front of her face and examined them closely. I wanted to put on my school-teacher voice and tell her to knock it off, but an adult next to her may have been a long-suffering parent, and I'm not sure about the legal aspects of annoyer versus annoyee these days.

Let's remember, Cedar Citians, that maybe you CAN say, wear, or do almost anything you want in public, but we owe it our next generation to teach them that that doesn't mean you SHOULD. A little social outh is much in order.

Beauty and the Beast was worthy of my full attention. Great singing, fabulous costumes—an ambulatory clock!—and a cast of thousands, er, hundreds lined up on stage, wanting to be seen by me. And I wanted to see them. The beast was a real hunk.

and so Livingston also had to improvise. President Lyndon B. Johnson, for example, was easy to research, with recorded political speeches easily accessible. But one of the young attorneys, John W. Davis, Livingston didn't have the opportunity to hear from. "The play tells me he speaks in smooth southern cadence, but his dialect is going to be different from LBJ's," Livingston said. "So I made his dialect up."

The playwright had to remember the voice of Marshall but do it in a way that was interesting to audience members. Livingston also explained that because he lives in the voice of Marshall throughout the majority of the play, he also has to bring his own voice to the character.

"For that span of time you really can't develop that much mimicry. I have to balance the way Marshall spoke, but also it has to sustain my voice as well to speak for ninety minutes," Livingston explained.

The actor said that anyone who loves America and the

constitution should come and see *Thurgood*. "It's an opportunity to get to know someone that had a tremendous impact on this country that people may have not studied or learned about," Livingston said. "He had a great impact on history, but it's also a balanced play, and there are very funny moments and there are really hard-hitting moments."

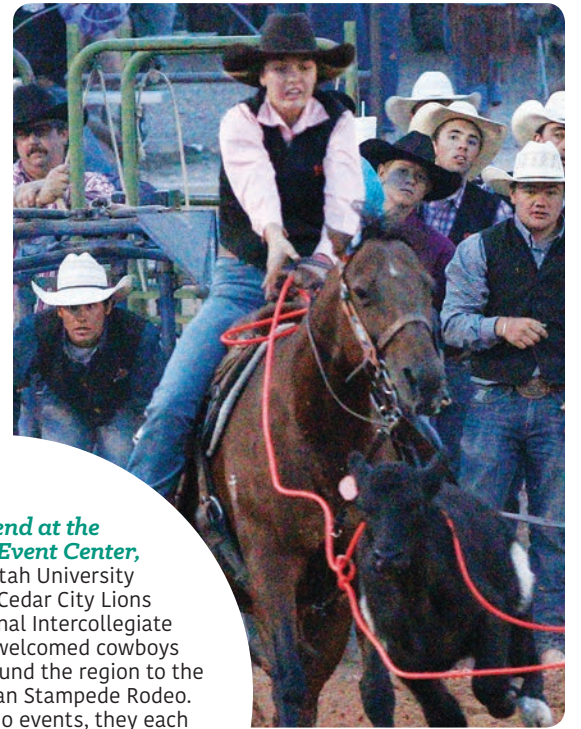

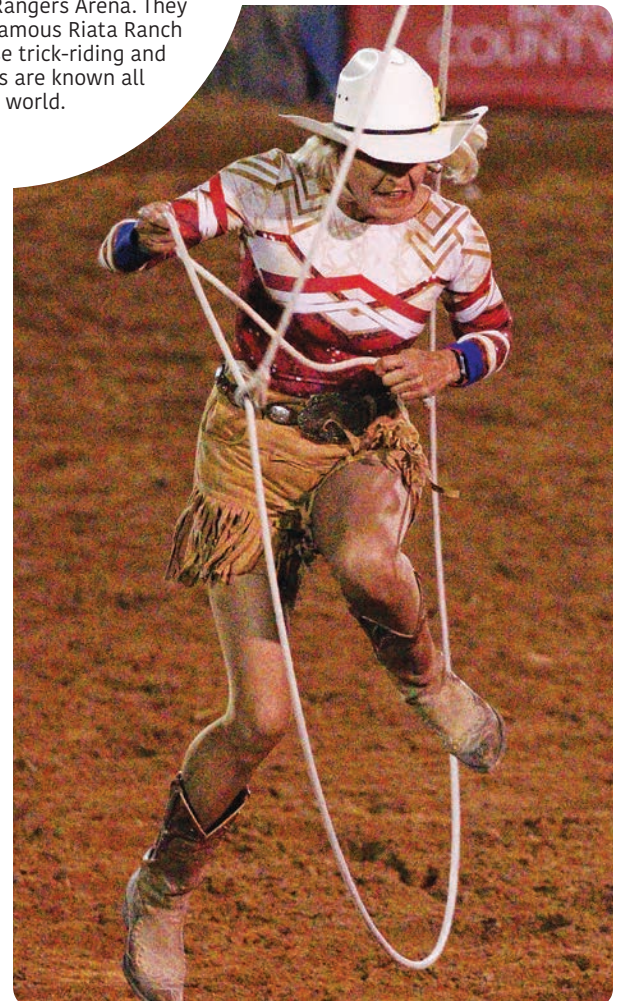

Broncos survive lead changes, beat Falcons

In a duel between sharp-throwing quarterbacks, Canyon View's Jaxon Jensen more than held his own against the high-powered offense of the San Juan Broncos. When everything was played, San Juan had one extra jolt that helped them hang on.

Parker Snyder threw five touchdown passes, the last one to Jersey Nieves with 5 minutes, 58 seconds left, to give San Juan a hard-fought 35-28 victory over Canyon View on Sept. 9.

The unbeaten Broncos (5-0) weaved through three lead changes and three ties to come away with the win in the Falcons' final preseason tune-up.

CV (3-2) struck first when Jensen delivered the first of two touchdown passes to Nick Macias, a 22-yarder, for the 7-0 lead, then connected with Macias again from 15 yards out with 1:32 left in the period for a 14-7 lead.

The Broncos responded with two more Snyder TD passes – a 3-yarder to Garrett Yound and a 4-yarder to Done – to regain the lead, but the Falcons pulled even before the period ended when Jensen hit Scotty Irons on a 3-yard touchdown with 44 seconds remaining.

For Koden Lunt, there was more than enough frustration watching from the sidelines after a knee injury took him out of the second half of last week's loss to Snow Canyon. On Homecoming Night, the Reds' senior quarterback returned and transmitted his energy to help his team dominate the opposition.

Lunt threw five touchdown passes as Cedar broke the game open in the second quarter on the way to a 38-0 shutout over the Hurricane Tigers on Sept. 9, evening its Region 10 record at 1-1 and improving to 2-3 overall.

"He's the leader of our offense, and our offensive line played really well," Cedar head coach Josh Bennett said of Lunt. "I felt like we got an identity going tonight, which was good."

That identity included a strong running game provided by Devin Crenshaw. The junior collected big chunks of yardage on Cedar's scoring drives before Lunt went to work.

After Parker Kucifer got the scoring started with a 27-yard field goal on the first play of the second quarter, Lunt found a wide-open Tredyn Elliott on a 52-yard scoring pass that stretched the lead to 10-0 with 9 minutes, 29 seconds to play in the half. He added a pair of TDs inside the last 2:25 to Conor Hardman — both from 5 yards out — that gave the Reds a 24-0 lead at the break.

Lunt was cleared to play Monday, but had a lighter workload in practice.

"I was so glad to be back on the field," he said. "When I got cleared, it was a great day."

After the Homecoming court was celebrated, the Reds put the game away with two more Lunt touchdown tosses late in the third quarter. Lunt hit Crenshaw with a 10-yard connection with 44 seconds left in the period, and the defense recovered a Hurricane fumble on the ensuing kickoff. Two plays
